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## Editorial Helen Ullmann's $80^{\text {th }}$ Birthday

The aim of the New England Historic Genealogical Society is to advance the study of family history in America and beyond by educating, inspiring, and connecting people through our scholarship, collections, and expertise. In the ongoing effort to fulfill this aim, we rely on staff and members sharing their knowledge, skills, and passion for family history to build and maintain a body of genealogical research that is unparalleled in our field.


One of the stalwart contributors to the success of NEHGS over many years has been Helen Schatvet Ullmann. Helen was born in Bay Ridge, Brooklyn, New York, 30 November 1937, and grew up in Darien, Connecticut. Her father, Charles Einar Schatvet, was three-quarters Norwegian, but his maternal grandmother was an Adams from Massachusetts. Helen's mother, Marjorie Walcott Stevens, was born in New Jersey to parents with early New England ancestry. Helen received her BA in history from Mount Holyoke College and her MA in literature from Northeastern University. In 1959 she married Laurence "Laurie" Emery Ullmann, now a retired high school physics teacher. They had four children. Their son is deceased; their three daughters are all teachers. Helen and Laurie reside in Acton, Massachusetts, and for several years they were directors of the Nashua, New Hampshire, Family History Center.

In 1968 Helen became a member of NEHGS. Since her first article, published in 1983, she has produced hundreds of genealogical books, manuscripts, compilations, and articles, mostly about New England and Norwegian sources and families. The Family History Library catalog and the NEHGS catalog show many entries for Helen's works, as does the website of the American Society of Genealogists (fasg.org/fellows/current-fellows/helen-schatvet-ullmann); Helen was elected a Fellow in 2002.

Helen's exemplary service as a volunteer to NEHGS and its members began in 1990 when she became a reader for Jane Fiske, then editor of the Register. Helen became a Certified Genealogist the same year. Beyond her genealogical expertise, Helen has also lent her service to NEHGS governance. She was a trustee 1991-1994, and a Councilor 2004-2009 and 2011-2013. Since 2015 she has been a Trustee Emerita.

In 1992 she began working as a volunteer consulting editor for NEHGS books, mentoring people who submitted manuscripts. Her work developed into genealogical writing and editing, and she has been involved with and contributed to many Newbury Street Press (NSP) and NEHGS books. In addition, she has written or edited several books for NSP and NEHGS, including two volumes of early Connecticut court records and several books on her own New England families. In 1998 Helen published her first award-winning genealogy, Descendants of Peter Mills of Windsor, Connecticut, which received the Donald Lines Jacobus Award of the American Society of Genealogists. Her book Some Descendants of Roger Billings of Dorchester, Massachusetts (2012) received the National Genealogical Society Award for Excellence in Genealogy and Family History.

In 2001 Helen became volunteer associate editor of the Register. In this position she reviews all the articles received. For accepted articles she reviews cited sources and finds additional material, sometimes working directly with authors. She also writes book reviews and editorials.

In 2009 she took on the volunteer editorship of the Western Massachusetts Families in 1790 study project, for which three volumes have been published and sketches for a fourth volume are available on AmericanAncestors.org.

In their prospectus for creating a scholarship enterprise, the founders of NEHGS wrote that they endeavored to create something of "permanent value as a repository of minute and authentic facts, carefully and methodically arranged on a great variety of subjects pertaining to antiquities, history, statistics, and genealogy. In doing this we cannot but feel that we are performing a great service for the country at large, but especially for New England, and her sons wherever scattered."

NEHGS is truly honored to have such an inspired and inspiring volunteer as Helen to help us carry out the farseeing vision of our founders. Helen has, indeed, created something of permanent value, and we are grateful for all her years of service to NEHGS and for her friendship with so many of us.

## From the Editor

This issue of the Register begins with an article by Helen Ullmann, which was published in the Register in 1995: A Comedy of Errors: Griswold Confusion in Windsor, Connecticut. Helen was trying to establish for her Mills genealogy which Abigail Griswold married Roger Mills in 1771. She found two girls the same age named Abigail Griswold, and determined that the authors of the 1990 Griswold genealogy had chosen the wrong one as the wife of Roger Mills.

The second article is also by Helen, Western Massachusetts Families in 1790 Sketch: Richard Morton of New Salem. This sketch is about Helen's ancestor, who was born in Athol in 1755, lived in New Salem, and died in 1809 in Orwell, Vermont. Perhaps the most extraordinary aspect of the article is that Richard had an illegitimate daughter named Innocence by a woman known as Philinda Morton, who also had an illegitimate daughter named Virtue by another man. An agreement among Richard's heirs in 1811 included Philinda, Innocence, and Virtue as heirs!

Helen is descended from Anne (Lloyd) (Yale) Eaton, whose father was George Lloyd, Bishop of Chester (ca. 1560-1615), and whose second husband was Theophilus Eaton, Governor of the New Haven Colony. The Ancestry of Anne Wilkenson, Wife of George Lloyd, Bishop of Chester, by Scott G. Swanson, is the first installment identifying the Suffolk ancestry of Bishop Lloyd's wife. A portrait of him is on the cover of this issue of the Register.

Margaret Browne, Wife of James ${ }^{1}$ Cade and Nicholas ${ }^{1}$ Baxter, Both of Boston, Massachusetts, by Joan Lince. Margaret had a daughter and a stepdaughter the same age: Mary (Cade) Bull (1640-1723) and Mary (Baxter) (Buttolph) Swett (1640-1721). Fortunately, there was litigation among the heirs over property in Boston and in England, and this generated records that clarified the relationships.

George Barlow, the Marshal of Sandwich, Massachusetts, and His Descendants for Three Generations, by Ellen J. O'Flaherty, treats an unpleasant colonial official who persecuted Quakers in the 1650s and 1660s. He appeared frequently in court records for various offenses, several unrelated to his position as marshal.

In The English Origin of George ${ }^{1}$ Puffer of Braintree, Massachusetts, Randy A. West presents entries from the parish registers of Earl Shilton, Leicestershire, for the marriage of George Puffer in 1624 and the baptisms of three children,

We continue The Higginson Family of Berkeswell, Warwickshire, and Its American Descendants: Daniel Clark of Windsor, Connecticut; Rev. Josias Clark of New York, Boston, and Jamaica, West Indies; Isabel Overton, Wife of Rev. Ephraim Huit of Windsor; Nicholas and Robert Augur of New Haven, Connecticut; Hester (Augur) Coster of New Haven; Robert, Humphrey, and Christopher Higginson of Virginia, by Clifford L. Stott.

Jedediah Smith's Book of the Records of Marriages in Blandford, Massachusetts, by Helen Schatvet Ullmann, is concluded in this issue.

George R. Nye's article on William ${ }^{7}$ Trowbridge alias William Bent (17911853) of Framingham, Massachusetts, and Sherbrooke, Nova Scotia, is concluded in this issue. Several of William's grandchildren died in the U.S. or in Saskatchewan; some of them were buried in Sherbrooke nevertheless.

Additions and Corrections are mostly about Frederick Hart's John Waterbury article in the Register in 2010-2011.

# A Comedy of Errors: Griswold Confusion in Windsor, Connecticut

The latest volume on the Griswold family of Connecticut, The Griswold Family: The First Five Generations in America by Esther Griswold French and Robert Lewis French, ${ }^{[1]}$ repeats statements in earlier volumes, that the Abigail Griswold who married Roger Mills was born at Windsor 18 April 1746, daughter of Hezekiah and Sarah (Barnard) Griswold.

How does one reconcile that with the Windsor deed of 6 November 1789 in which Elijah Griswold, Roger Mills and Abigail Mills, all of Windsor, and Samuel Porter and Mindwell Porter, both of Berlin, quitclaimed to Frederick, Noah, and Hezekiah Griswold, Jr., all of Windsor, 285 acres in Windsor and Simsbury and quarter shares in several rights of land in Vermont "that our honored father Capt. Noah Griswold Late of Windsor dec'd dyed possessed of..."? ${ }^{[2]}$

While the Frenches cite only "Windsor, Conn, records; Stiles: Ancient Windsor II:354" ${ }^{[3]}$ as their sources for Hezekiah's family, neither Stiles nor the Windsor vital records contain any record of the birth of such an Abigail in 1746. Further sources mentioned in the section under Abigail herself, "Wintonbury Church Records; Webster Genealogy p. 107; DAR Patriot Index I:471, ${ }^{[4]}$ also fail to document any daughter Abigail for Hezekiah. The Frenches have reiterated Glenn E. Griswold's account of Abigail in The Griswold Family, England - America, ${ }^{[5]}$ which cites only the sources mentioned above. Her birthdate appears in none of them. Given the date of birth of Abigail's last child on 6 June 1792, ${ }^{[6]} 1746$ is possible though early.

The printed Griswold genealogies all say Noah, son of Capt. Noah, was born 10 August 1746, only four months after Abigail ${ }^{[7]}$ - one can see why Abigail was believed to belong in a different family. However, Noah Jr.s birthdate does not appear in vital records either, and this date is suspiciously close to that of another Noah Griswold born at Killingworth, Connecticut, 8 August

[^0]1746, son of John and Elizabeth (Hull) Griswold. ${ }^{[8]}$ While it may well be that Noah Jr. was born in 1746, it also may have been a bit earlier, since he evidently married about 1764 . On the other hand, Abigail may have been born somewhat later, for she did not marry until 1771. Since neither Noah Jr.'s nor Abigail's birthdates have any presently known source, and, as will be shown below, they were both clearly in the same family, at least one and possibly both of the birthdates given in the printed genealogies must be incorrect.

A further problem is posed by the Connecticut State Library's Hale Collection rendering of the inscription of the Noah Griswold grave at the Old Poquonock Cemetery in Windsor. It says, "Griswold, Noah Jr. (Sergt. 8th Co.,1st Reg. Militia, Rev. War Flag) d. Sept. 24, 1789 age 66."It can hardly be Noah Jr. who died in 1789. On 11 January 1785 Roger Mills, Azubah Griswold, and Roger Newberry posted bond on the estate of Noah Griswold, Jr. ${ }^{[9]}$ A search for any trace of the elder Noah in probate records gleaned nothing. However, deeds suggest that it was he, not Noah Jr., who died in 1789. Glenn Griswold and the Frenches say that Noah ${ }^{5}$ (i.e., Noah Jr.) died 29 October 1785 and was buried at the Old Poquonock Cemetery. ${ }^{[10]}$ Given the date of probate, this too is in error. Two more minor errors in the recording of deeds plus the account of Mindwell Griswold in H.P. Andrews' Porter genealogy complete the "comedy." ${ }^{[11]}$

The following account of information gleaned on Capt. Noah and his son, Noah Jr., resolves these problems. Additional information on the family of Hezekiah and Sarah (Barnard) Griswold follows.

1. NoAH ${ }^{4}$ Griswold (Matthew ${ }^{3}$, Joseph ${ }^{2}$, Edward ${ }^{1}$ ), son of Matthew and Mary (Phelps) Griswold, ${ }^{[12]}$ was born at Windsor 11 September 1722. ${ }^{[13]} \mathrm{He}$ died there 24 September 1789 at age 66 and was buried at the Old Poquonock Cemetery in Windsor, where his stone says "In Memory of Capt Noah Griswold Who Departed This Life Sept 24th AD 1789 Aged 66 Years." ${ }^{[14]}$

He married, first, before 25 October 1745, ${ }^{[15]}$ Abigail Griswold, who was born at Windsor 21 May 1727, daughter of Sergt. John and Abigail (Gaylord) Griswold and sister of Hezekiah. ${ }^{[16]}$ Possibly she died at the birth of Elisha in 1757 or earlier. Noah married, second, after 17 October 1755, (before 16

[^1]June 1771 and probably before 1762), Mindwell (Phelps) Griswold, widow of Isaac Griswold, ${ }^{[17]}$ born at Windsor 30 September 1729, daughter of Daniel and Mindwell (Buckland) Phelps. ${ }^{[18]}$ "Capt. Noah Griswold's wife" died 14 September $1777^{[19]}$ and was buried at the Elm Grove Cemetery in Windsor where her stone evidently had no legible dates at the time of the Hale Collection. However, the DAR volume of Windsor Inscriptions states that she died 17 September 1777. ${ }^{[20]}$ The stone says "wife of Isaac and late wife of Capt. Noah Griswold." Isaac died 21 October ${ }^{[21]}$ or 17 October 1755 aged 37 and was also buried there. ${ }^{[22]}$ This Isaac was another brother of Noah's first wife Abigail. This is an intertwined family!

In his father's will, Noah was given lands and buildings. On 15 February 1738/9 Noah Griswold, a minor, 17 years of age, chose Daniel Phelps as his guardian. Noah had an elder brother, Matthew. ${ }^{[23]}$ In a deed of 20 February 1743/4, Matthew sold land to his brother Noah, "reserving the use and improvement of both unto my Hond Mother Mary Griswold... according to my father's will." ${ }^{[24]}$ While Noah already held land as an inheritance from his father, this deed may reflect his imminent marriage. On 25 October 1745 Noah Griswold and Abigail, wife to Noah, both of Windsor, sold their rights in the estate "of our Hond father John Griswold" ${ }^{[25]}$ (i.e., Abigail's father).

In October 1772 Noah Griswold was named lieutenant of the 3rd company or trainband in Windsor. In March 1775 he was made captain and he was discharged in May 1776. ${ }^{[26]}$ On 13 September 1773 Noah Griswold of Windsor, for love and goodwill, gave 50 acres to "my son Noah Griswold Jun" reserving the use of it during his natural life. The heading in the deed book refers to him as "Capt.," but he acknowledged as "Lt.," so apparently the "Capt." was an error by the copier of the deed. It was recorded 24 March 1774. Perhaps he was acting as captain before his appointment was confirmed by the Assembly. On the same day Noah gave land to his son Elijah, again reserving the use of it during his natural life. This deed too has "Capt." in the title but was acknowledged by Lt. Noah 13 September 1773. It was recorded 26 April 1784. To add to the comedy of errors, his third deed, another to Elijah, was acknowledged 13 September 1773 but was dated 26 April 1784, the date of recording, ${ }^{[27]}$ clearly a scribe's error.

[^2]In 1789 and 1790 there were a number of other deeds besides that mentioned at the beginning of this study. Also on 6 November 1789 Roger and Abigail Mills, Frederick Griswold, and Samuel and Mindwell Porter deeded the homelot lately owned by Capt. Noah Griswold and nine other pieces to Elijah Griswold in exchange for other lands. The next day, 7 November, there were three deeds. In two Elijah and Frederick quitclaimed to Roger and Abigail, and Samuel and Mindwell. In the third, Elijah and Frederick Griswold and Samuel and Mindwell Porter sold to Capt. Roger Mills and his wife Abigail. On 1 January 1790 Jonathan Palmer Jr. and Aurelia Palmer, both of Windsor, sold to Frederick and Noah Griswold of Windsor, land in the "Pequanack Society," undivided with the heirs of Noah Griswold Junr between Frederick, Noah, Hezekiah, Azubah and the said Aurelia, with reference to "our honored mother Azubah Griswold." Finally on 7 June 1790 Elijah and "Fradrick" Griswold quitclaimed to Roger Mills and Abigail his wife of Windsor and Samuel Porter and Mindwell his wife of Berlin land which had been deeded to Capt. Noah Griswold by Increase Mather. ${ }^{[28]}$

In the deed first mentioned, Noah Jr.'s heirs evidently possessed quarter rights to lands in Vermont, confirming that four children survived Capt. Noah. The Phelps Family attributes four of Noah Jr's children to Noah Sr. and omits Noah Jr., Abigail, and Pamelia. ${ }^{[29]}$ Stiles ascribed Noah Jr.'s children to Capt. Noah, ${ }^{[30]}$ but the Griswold genealogies correct that error.

2. i. NoAh ${ }^{5}$ Griswold, b. possibly 10 Aug. 1746 (see below) or somewhat earlier; m. Azubah Strong.
ii. Abigail Griswold, b. say 1748; d. at "Boardman's Creek" (i.e. Bowman's Creek), Canajoharie, Montgomery Co., N.Y., 4 March $1800 ;{ }^{[31]}$ was "of Poquonock" when she m. at Wintonbury (now Bloomfield), 17 April 1771, Roger Mills. ${ }^{[32]}$
iii. Elijah Griswold, b. ca. 1750 (calc.); d. 12 April 1826 aged 76; buried Elm Grove Cem., Windsor; ${ }^{[33]}$ m. at the Poquonock Cong. Ch. 10 July 1777 Eleanor Phelps, ${ }^{[34]}$ who d. 18 Aug. 1834 aged 85 and was buried with Elijah.
(uncertain with first or second wife):
iv. Elisha Griswold, bp. 23 Dec. 1757; ${ }^{[35]}$ poss. the cause of Abigail's death; d. evidently young. Glenn Griswold says b. 10 April, d. 25 Dec. 1757. ${ }^{[36]}$

[^3](with second wife, Mindwell Phelps):
v. Mindwell Griswold, b. ca. 1762 (calc.); d. 28 June 1810 aged 47 or 48; buried at Berlin; ${ }^{[37]} \mathrm{m}$. Samuel Porter. ${ }^{[38]}$ Samuel Porter of Berlin applied for a pension for service in the Revolutionary War, deposing on 1 Aug. 1832. He said he was 82 , born at Windsor 14 June 1750 and was living there when he served. In 1784 he removed to Berlin, where he died 28 Jan. 1838. ${ }^{[39]}$
vi. Pamelia Griswold, bp. at the Poquonock Ch. in Windsor 16 June 1771; d. June 1771. ${ }^{[40]}$
2. NoAh ${ }^{5}$ Griswold (Noah ${ }^{4}$, Matthew ${ }^{3}$, Joseph ${ }^{2}$, Edward ${ }^{1}$ ), son of Noah and Abigail (Griswold) Griswold, was perhaps born 10 August 1746. ${ }^{[41]}$ Since he probably married in 1764, it seems likely he was born a bit earlier than 1746. The DAR Patriot Index says he died 27 October 1784 but the DAR's book on Windsor Cemetery inscriptions says 29 October 1785. ${ }^{[42]}$ Since bond was posted on Noah Jr.'s estate 11 January 1785, the earlier date is clearly more acceptable although its source is unknown.

Noah married before their daughter Aurelia's baptism, probably in 1764, Azubah Strong, who was born at Windsor 17 May 1744, daughter of John Wareham and Azubah (Griswold) Strong. ${ }^{[43]}$ Azubah married, second, George Griswold, and she died 16 February 1826 aged 82. ${ }^{[44]}$ On 21 November 1767 Nathaniel Burr and Abigail his wife and Noah Griswold Jr. and Azubah his wife, all of Windsor, deeded land received "of our honored mother Azubah Strong of Windsor," their right in the estate of their father John Wareham Strong late of Windsor. ${ }^{[45]}$

An undated list of "Inhabitants of Windsor and Belonging to the Eighth Co. or Train Band in 1st Regt. of Militia" includes David Barber as captain and Noah Griswold as a sergeant. ${ }^{[46]}$ David Barber was appointed captain of the

[^4]8th Co. in the 1st Reg. in May $1778{ }^{[47]}$ so the list must be as of or after that time. From May 1777 to February 1781 Roger Newberry was colonel. ${ }^{[48]}$ Noah Griswold, Jr., sergeant, signed a petition at Windsor in 1780. ${ }^{[49]}$

As mentioned above, on 11 January 1785 Roger Mills, Azubah Griswold, and Roger Newberry posted bond on the estate of Noah Griswold Jr. The children were listed on one account, Frederick being the eldest son followed by Noah, Hezekiah, Aurelia and Azubah. ${ }^{[50]}$

i. Aurelia ${ }^{6}$ Griswold, b. ca. 1765 (calc.); bp. 23 June 1765; d. 7 Jan. 1847 aged 82; buried Old Bloomfield Cem.; ${ }^{[51]}$ m. at Wintonbury 19 Oct. 1786, ${ }^{[52] \text { JonA- }}$ than Palmer.
ii. Frederick Griswold, bp. 26 April 1767; d. 15 Nov. 1829 aged 63; buried Old Bloomfield Cem. ${ }^{[53]}$
iii. Noah Griswold, b. ca. 1771 (calc.); bp. 15 Sept. 1771; d. 8 Oct. 1849 aged 78; buried Old Bloomfield Cem.; ${ }^{[54]}$ m. Rhoda Pinney, b. ca. 1773(calc.); bp. 13 June 1773, dau. of Abraham and Lucretia (Barnard) Pinney, d. 2 April 1865 aged 91 or 92 , buried with Noah. ${ }^{[55]}$
iv. Azubah Griswold, bp. as "Zuba" 14 May 1775. ${ }^{[56]}$
v. Hezekiah Griswold, bp. 25 Jan. $1778 ;{ }^{[57]}$ called "Hezekiah Jr." in the 1789 deed, surely to distinguish him from his grandmother's brother (and grandfather's second cousin) of the same name who was still living in Windsor and is treated below.

Hezekiah ${ }^{4}$ Griswold (John ${ }^{3}$, George ${ }^{2}$, Edward ${ }^{1}$ ), son of John and Abigail (Gaylord) Griswold, was born at Windsor 6 September $1715,{ }^{[58]}$ and he died probably shortly before 3 December 1802, when his daughter declined to administer his estate. He married, first, 14 December 1738, SARAH BARNARD, ${ }^{[59]}$ who died 13 September 1777. ${ }^{[60]}$ He married, second, at Windsor Second Congregational Church at Poquonock, 8 November 1781, Rachel Pinney. ${ }^{[61]}$

[^5]Hezekiah was lieutenant of the 5th company in 1769 and captain of the 3rd company in October 1772. ${ }^{[62]} \mathrm{He}$ was admitted to communion at the Poquonock Church in Windsor 4 June 1775 and chosen deacon 2 January 1778. ${ }^{[63]}$ On 12 November 1793 Capt. Hezekiah Griswold, with the "consent and approbation of Elihu Griswold, Esq., my conservator," quitclaimed on land in the Parish of Pequanack to Abner Weller, both being of Windsor. ${ }^{[64]}$ No further deeds appear for Capt. Hezekiah although there are three from "Hezekiah 2nd," clearly the son of Noah Jr. ${ }^{[65]}$

On 3 December 1802 Marcy Weller declined administration on the estate of "Deacon Hezekiah Griswold My honored Father," and the next day letters of administration were granted to Elihu Marshall. The inventory included several pieces of land in Windsor, including one called the Iron Works Lot, and some in Barkhamsted. The court on 2 May 1804 recorded an agreement that Hezekiah had made "previous to his intermarrying with Mrs. Rachel Pinney of Scotland Simsbury" in which she was to receive half of his house, barn, and lot while she remained his widow. The distribution to widow Rachel occurred 5 June 1804, but no further distribution appears. ${ }^{[66]}$ On 11 March 1795 Abner Weller and Marcy Weller, both of Windsor, mortgaged two pieces of land in Windsor, one at Round Swamp and one at Spruce Swamp, to Elijah Griswold; Abner signed and Marcy made her mark. On 14 February 1804 Marcy Weller of Windsor mortgaged the same 80 acres at Great Spruce Swamp to Elijah Griswold, Jr., and on 18 September 1807 Marcy sold to Elijah Griswold Jr. the Iron Works Lott, $301 / 2$ acres on the Windsor Ferry River. On 7 March 1813 Marcy sold, "in consideration of a lease of lands" to Isaac and Abiel Griswold, four pieces of land including the 20 acres at Round Swamp as well as her homelot. ${ }^{[67]}$

By these deeds Marcy disposed of almost all of the land in Hezekiah's inventory remaining after the Barkhamsted property was sold to pay the creditors. Clearly she is Hezekiah's sole living child. There is no sign of Roger Mills and his wife Abigail in the disposition of Hezekiah's estate. Abigail was deceased by then, but surely her children would have inherited equally with Marcy if she were Hezekiah's daughter. Of the two daughters supposedly born in Windsor, Abigail (18 April 1746) and Prudence (6 June 1748), no trace has been found in any of the sources named by Griswold or the Frenches.

i. Sarah's Griswold, b. 5 June 1740; bp. Windsor 1st Ch. 11 June "in extremis"; d. 14 July $1740{ }^{[68]}$
ii. Hezekiah Griswold, b. 28 Feb. 1741/2; d. 28 Feb. 1742/3 [sic]. One wonders if this copy of the vital records made an error in the year of death. ${ }^{[69]}$

Mercy Griswold, ${ }^{[70]}$ b. 29 June $1744 ;{ }^{[71]}$ living in 1813 (see above); m. at the Windsor First Congregational Church 1 April 1784 Abner Weller. ${ }^{[72]} \mathrm{He}$ probably died shortly before 30 March 1802 when letters of administration on his estate were granted to Abiel Griswold. His inventory, which totalled \$13.34, included no land. ${ }^{[73]}$ Elijah Griswold Jr. and others posted bond on the estate of Mercy Weller late of Windsor 6 March 1817. Her inventory included 70 acres of "Plain Land" and " 4 islands in the little River near the Indian Field so called" and totalled \$1011.01. ${ }^{[74]}$
iv. Frederick Griswold, b. 6 June 1748; d. 1 April 1751. ${ }^{[75]}$

# Western Massachusetts Families in 1790 Sketch: Richard Morton of New Salem

Morton, Rich ${ }^{\text {D }} 1-3-1-0-0$
New Salem, Hampshire County ${ }^{[1]}$
Richard Morton, son of Martin and Jerusha (Twitchell) Morton, was born in Athol, Worcester County, Massachusetts, on 16 June 1755. ${ }^{[2]} \mathrm{He}$ died in Orwell, Vermont, between 31 October 1809, when he deeded land, and 22 December 1809, when his administrator, Pliny Smith, first met with the probate judge. ${ }^{[3]}$ Richard married first in New Salem on 30 May 1782, Thankful Eaton, ${ }^{[4]}$ who was born in Middleborough, Plymouth County, Massachusetts, about 1763 and died about February 1790, daughter of Silvanus and Deborah (Caswell) Eaton. ${ }^{[5]}$ He married second in New Salem 2 December 1790, Deborah Eaton, ${ }^{[6]}$ sister of Thankful, born about 1765. Deborah died between 1 December 1791 and 5 July 1796, ${ }^{[7]}$ almost certainly childless.

The probate records of her father, Sylvanus Eaton, in 1792 and those of her brother, Sylvanus Eaton $2^{\text {nd }}$, in 1795, both of New Salem, name Thankful, Deborah, and Thankful's children. On 23 April 1796, Richard Morton

[^8]requested that Seth Twitchell of Athol be appointed guardian to his children. Seth Twitchell was not only Richard's uncle (his mother's brother), he had also married Huldah Eaton, sister of Thankful and Deborah. At the settlement of Sylvanus Eaton, Sr.'s estate 5 July 1796 the accounting reads: "to Deborah Morton (she being now dead . . . to be paid to her husband). ${ }^{[8]}$

Richard married third, sometime before 23 December 1807, and probably a few years earlier, Electa Powell. On that date "Mrs. Electa Morton now residing in Sudbury," Vermont, was warned out of town. ${ }^{[9]}$ Since Richard was clearly a resident of Orwell, one wonders whether she had left him, taking her child, and the town of Sudbury did not want to incur expenses on their behalf. After Richard's death, Electa married again in Orwell on 6 December 1810, James Ballard ${ }^{[10]}$ According to one account, he was born about 1784 in Rhode Island, died in 1882 in Monroe County, New York, married in Rutland County, Electa Powell, born in Massachusetts about 1792 and died in 1880. They had eight children. ${ }^{[11]}$ However, it appears that Electa was born considerably earlier, in Lanesborough, Berkshire County, Massachusetts, on 17 December 1785, and was baptized at St. Luke's Church in Lanesborough on 15 September 1793, daughter of Miles Powell and his first wife. ${ }^{[12]}$

On 16 November 1820, James Ballard of Ogden, Monroe County, New York, sold to Levi Ballard his right as an heir to the estate of Luke Ballard. On 18 October 1827 Elizabeth Ballard and Levi Ballard of Orwell and Gideon and "Maribah" Morton of Sudbury quitclaimed to John Jackson of Orwell on two pieces of land in Orwell, "all the lands that Luke Ballard died possessed of excepting James Ballard and Huldah Sisters [sic, a surname?] share as heirs to sd estate." ${ }^{[13]}$ The relationship between them all to Luke is not mentioned, but they were probably his widow and children. There is no probate for Luke in Fair Haven District. ${ }^{[14]}$

[^9]At some point, apparently after his marriage to Electa, Richard fathered a child by Philinda Morton. While she was not Richard's daughter (see below), Philinda was probably a fairly close relative unless she was the wife of someone named Morton.

It was probably this Richard Morton who enrolled in the First Baptist Church in Athol in 1773. There was also evidently a Baptist church in New Salem to which many of the West Royalston (Athol) members moved in the 1790s. ${ }^{[15]}$ However, no trace of any Mortons has been found in Orwell Baptist church records. ${ }^{[16]}$

Richard was a private in Capt. Ichabod Dexter's Company, Col. B. Ruggles Woodbridge's Regiment. He enlisted 1 May 1775 and served three months, eight days. He signed a receipt for advance pay at Cambridge Camp 20 June 1775. ${ }^{[17]}$ This was three days after the Battle of Bunker Hill, so presumably Richard was among the 1,200 men under Colonel William Prescott and Major-General Israel Putnam who occupied Breed's Hill on the night of June 16 and faced three waves of British assaults the next day. Although the Americans had to retreat, the British suffered 1,054 casualties in contrast to the Americans' 420, and the incident aroused the confidence of the colonies that they could succeed. ${ }^{[18]}$

Probably the first land Richard Morton bought was two tracts totaling 58 acres in Athol for which he paid his father $£ 100$ silver on 1 May 1780. Six weeks later, on 16 June 1780, Richard Morton and Eleazer Graves bought part of lot 4 "in what was called Kendall's farm" from Josiah Kendall of Lancaster for 316 bushels of rye. ${ }^{[19]}$ On 22 April 1784, Richard "of Athol" sold to Jesse Kendall one of the tracts he had bought from his father. Evidently, some deeds were not recorded; the only other deed of sale in Worcester County was on 1 April 1796 when Richard, being of New Salem, sold $151 / 2$ acres in Athol. ${ }^{[20]}$

As noted above, at the 1790 census, Richard, three males under 16, and one female (daughter Sarah) were living in New Salem. On 20 November 1796, Richard Morton of New Salem sold two 4th division lots in New Salem (lots 115 and 36), 50 acres each, to Amos Adams of Charlestown for $\$ 500$. ${ }^{[21]}$

In 1800 Richard was in Orwell along with his father Martin and brother Martin Jr. Richard's household contained, besides himself, one female 10-16

[^10]and a male $10-16,{ }^{[22]}$ presumably Sally and Gideon or Elisha. Thus Richard married Electa after the 1800 census was taken.

On 9 March 1801 Richard Morton "of Orwell" bought "at vendue" (i.e., auction) some land from Pliny Smith, Collector. ${ }^{[23]}$ In March 1804 Richard "Mortin" was elected a surveyor of highways, and 10 March 1807 he was chosen hayward. ${ }^{[24]}$ On 31 October 1809, he deeded the farm he was living on to Pitt W. Hyde who would maintain Richard's parents. ${ }^{[25]}$

Administration on the estate of "Ritchard Morton" of Orwell took place in Fair Haven, Vermont, Probate District. ${ }^{[26]}$ The agreement between the heirs, which was signed 5 March 1811, reads:

We Gideon Morton, Elisha Morton, Sally Morton, Phila Morton and Electa Ballard late widow of the sd Ritchard Morton now the wife of James Ballard and the said James Ballard for himself have agreed that . . . shall be appointed a committee . . . to divide . . . the sd Gideon and Elisha is to have set over to them . . . each two parts out of ten as in other words to have each one for himself double the value and amount out of said estate to either of the girls and the late widow now Electa Ballard and her daughter [sic] Abigail and Phila and her two daughters Inocence and Virtue and Sally who is daughter to the said Ritcher shall all receive equal . . . [signed] Gideon Morton, Elisha Morton, Philinda Morton, Sally Morton, Electa Ballard, James Ballard; [witnesses:] Pliny Smith, Joab Smith. ${ }^{[27]}$

Thus Electa, Abigail, Phila, Innocence, Virtue, and Sally received the remaining six equal shares after the two sons took their two double shares. This is confirmed by the distribution document dated 10 July 1812 in the probate book but recorded 27 June 1811 in town records. In this, land was first set off to Sally and Abigail and then,

Recently set off to the Remainder of heirs to said Estate to wit Gideon Mortin Elisha Mortin Philinda Mortin and her two Children Innocence and Virtue though not Legal heirs yet by an Express agreement of all the Legal heirs to said Richard Mortins Estate the said Philinda Mortin was to Draw and Receive three tenths of the whole of said Richards Estate Both Real and Personal for the support of her self and two Children Innocence and Virtue and as a consideration to the said Philinda for indemnifying said Estate against a bond which the town of Orwell held against said Richard Mortin previous to his Decease for the sum of four hundred Dollars conditioned that the said Richard should save said town or the inhabitants thereof from all or any Expence in supporting the said Innocence ["and Virtue" is written and crossed out in the probate district copy] one of said children which was supposed and considered to be the said Richard Mortin's child though not born in lawful wedlock and of course not a Legal heir to any part of said estate also to Electa Ballard, the Late widow of the said Richard Mortin Deceasd, making in the whole Eight tenths of said Estate and set off all together in one peice [sic] on the South Part of the said Richard Mortins farm as the said Gideon Elisha Philinda and Electa and her

[^11]Present Husband James Ballard Requested they having each one for themselves sold their undivided share of said land to Joab Smith, Esq. ${ }^{[28]}$
This document as it appears in town records was signed by "Phylinda" Mortin, James and Electa Ballard and Elisha and Gideon Mortin. Miss Philinda Morton married in Orwell on 5 October 1814, Jared Palmer of Castleton, Rutland County. ${ }^{[29]}$ For further disposition of Richard's estate, for speculation as to Philinda's identity, and for additional detail on the children listed below, see the author's papers cited in notes 2 and 40.

Children of Richard and Thankful (Eaton) Morton, birthdates of the first four from a paper in Silvanus Eaton's probate file:
i. Gilbert Morton, b., probably in Athol, 27 April 1783; living 23 April $1796 ;{ }^{[30]} \mathrm{d}$. before administration on his father's estate.
ii. Gideon Morton, b. Athol or New Salem 20 May 1787; d., probably in Sudbury, Rutland Co., Vt. ${ }^{[31]} 2$ April 1870, aged 82 years, 10 months, and was buried in Hill Cemetery, on the main road just north of the center of Sudbury. ${ }^{[32]}$ He m. in Orwell, Vt., 5 Feb. 1810, Marybath Ballard, ${ }^{[33]}$ probably daughter of Luke and Elizabeth ( $\qquad$ ) Ballard and sister of the James Ballard who married Gideon's stepmother, Electa. Marybath was b. 11 April 1792, ${ }^{[34]}$ d. 4 Feb. 1854, aged 61 years, 9 months, and was bur. in Hill Cemetery. ${ }^{[35]}$
iii. Elisha Morton, b. Athol or New Salem 29 April 1788; d. probably Chester, Geauga Co., Ohio, before the 1870 census; probably m. Betsey $\qquad$ , b. ca. 1785. ${ }^{[36]}$
iv. Sally Morton, b., probably in New Salem, 8 Feb. 1790; d. Athol 20 Dec. 1827, aged $38,{ }^{[37]}$ bur. Central Cemetery there; ${ }^{[38]} \mathrm{m}$. New Salem 13 Feb.

[^12]1815, "Bartholomus Woodard" of Athol, ${ }^{[39]}$ son of Joseph and Hannah (Woodward) Woodward. ${ }^{[40]}$ b. ca. 1785; ${ }^{[41]}$ d. Athol 6 March 1827 aged 42 years, bur. Central Cemetery in Athol. ${ }^{[42]}$ They are ancestors of the author.

Child of Richard and Electa (Powell) Morton:
v. Abigail Morton, b., probably ca. 1803-1807; no guardianship found. On 28 May 1811, Pliny Smith of Orwell, for $\$ 1$, deeded to Abigail Morton of Orwell 10 acres and 12 rods of land, "the same piece set off to Abigail Morton as her share of the estate of her father Richard Morton . . . reserving the use and improvement of the same for Martin Morton during his own and his wife's natural life.." ${ }^{[43]}$ She was still a landowner in 1823 in Orwell. ${ }^{[44]}$

Child of Richard Morton and Philinda Morton:
vi. Innocence Morton, illegitimate, b. ca. 1807-1808; d. 12 Sept. 1841 in her 34th year; bur. in the Old Castleton Cemetery, Castleton, Vt., where her stone says "Innocence P.," suggesting she used her stepfather's name, Palmer; ${ }^{[45]}$ m. Оbadiah C. Smith, b. ca. 1808, d. 27 Oct. 1871 age 63, bur. Hillside Cemetery, two stones away from Innocence's mother, Philinda, along with his second wife, Roxana Seamans. ${ }^{[46]}$ In 1850 in Castleton, Obadiah C. Smith was 42, a farmer, with Roxana 45, Orson 14, Mary 12 and Julia 10, all b. Vt. ${ }^{[47]}$

Child of Philinda Morton, included in the settlement of Richard's estate:
vii. Virtue Morton. When her mother Philinda married in 1814, she was called "Miss Philinda Morton," so Virtue was probably born out of wedlock. Given the language in the probate record, it appears that Richard was not Virtue's father even though his legal heirs agreed that she should have a share in the estate.

# The Ancestry of Anne Wilkenson, Wife of George Lloyd, Bishop of Chester 

Scott G. Swanson*


#### Abstract

There have long been reports, little investigated, that George Lloyd, Bishop of Sodor and Man (1600-1604), then Bishop of Chester (1604-1615), ${ }^{[1]}$ married Anne Wilkenson, ${ }^{[2]}$ daughter of John Wilkenson of Norwich. ${ }^{[3]}$ The source generally cited as evidence of the marriage is British Library MS Lansdowne 879, which, nonetheless, has nothing to say about it. ${ }^{[4]}$ So far as I can tell, there


[^14]is no conclusive evidence to show that the bishop was the man who married Anne Wilkenson in Norwich. ${ }^{[5]}$ The circumstantial evidence, however, is strong. The evidence from Cheshire and the evidence from Norwich, Norfolk, fit together neatly as pieces of a puzzle. An account of John and Cecily (Bacon) Wilkenson and their children is given below, followed by accounts of the Bacon and Calle families. The Wilkenson family may well defy efforts to determine earlier generations, but there is certainly more to be discovered about earlier generations of the Bacon and Calle families.

## Evidence from Cheshire

The parish registers of Heswall, Cheshire, which benefice George Lloyd held, ${ }^{[6]}$ identify the children of George and Anne Lloyd from 1599 to 1607: ${ }^{[7]}$

John Lloyd, bp. 9 October 1599
Alice Lloyd bp. 20 March 1602/3
Edward Lloyd, bp. 1 May 1604
George Lloyd, bur. 11 May 1605
Henry Lloyd, bur. 19 June 1607

Anne Lloyd's will, dated 4 November 1640, with a codicil dated the same day, proved 8 January 1648/9 in Chester, ${ }^{[8]}$ named son David Lloyd; daughter Eaton; son Edward Lloyd (if he be living); daughter Mary Paget (who had previously been married to Mr Bruen); cousin Francis Gamull, esquire, his eldest daughter and his daughter Alice; cousin Mrs Jane Wright and her sister Mrs Eleanor Mynshall; ${ }^{[9]}$ and cousin Jane Plimley. It appears that the cousins named in her will belonged to her husband's family. None of them, so far as

[^15]they can be identified, appear to have had connections with Norwich. Francis Gamull was mayor of Chester in 1634, MP for Chester in the Long Parliament in 1640, and royalist defender of Chester during the English Civil War. ${ }^{[10]}$

Two of the children mentioned in the 1640 will, David Lloyd and Anne ["daughter Eaton"], had to have been born before their father was appointed to Heswall in 1597. Anne's marriage license with Thomas Yale, dated 13 April 1612 , suggests that she was the eldest. ${ }^{[11]}$

Finally, the Dean and Chapter of Chester Cathedral, on 30 November 1608, leased the rectory of Shotwick in Cheshire to Henry Wilkinson for three lives, namely, Anne wife of George Lloyd, Bishop of Chester, and his sons David Lloyd and John Lloyd. ${ }^{[12]}$ Depositions in a Star Chamber suit repeat the same information a few years later. ${ }^{[13]}$ Almost invariably leases were taken out for the lives of close family members, so Anne Lloyd and Henry Wilkenson evidently were close kin.

## Evidence from Norwich

The most important evidence is the marriage record at St. George Colegate, Norwich, Norfolk, 13 May 1594: "George flude single man \& minister of St. Peter Mancroft and Anne Wilkenson single woman of this parish were married the xiii of maye 1594." ${ }^{[14]}$

Other records identify George Fludd as a curate of St. Peter Mancroft. ${ }^{[15]}$ Matthew Reynolds, who knows the Norwich records well, identifies him as a chaplain and preacher (appointed by the corporation of Norwich) at St. Peter Mancroft from 1588 to $1597 .{ }^{[16]}$ So far as I can tell, no biography of the bishop identifies him as associated in any capacity with St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich. Yet only two men of that name are found in the Clergy of the Church of England Database [note 1] as ministers in the Church of England during the reigns of Elizabeth and James: the George Fludd who served as curate of St. Peter Mancroft till 1597, and the George Lloyd who was appointed rector of Heswall in 1597, then bishop of Sodor and Man in 1600, and Chester in 1604. ${ }^{[17]}$

[^16]The registers of St. George Colegate in Norwich, moreover, record the baptism of George's son David ffloyde 26 June 1597. ${ }^{[18]}$ If this is indeed the bishop's family, we would expect to find Anne Lloyd's baptism in the parish register in 1594 or 1595, which would place her at about the right age to be married in 1612. It is now impossible to tell whether or not it was recorded there because the folio recording baptisms from 1589 to 1596 is missing from the register. ${ }^{[19]}$ David's 1597 baptism is the last record of George Fludd's family in Norwich registers before they left Norwich for Heswall, and makes it reasonably likely that George Lloyd's wife was, as Burke first stated, Anne, daughter of John Wilkenson of Norwich. George and Anne, moreover, named children John, Henry, and Alice, which, as we shall see, reflect the names of Anne Wilkenson's father and maternal grandparents.

Children of George and Anne (Wilkenson) Lloyd:
i. Anne Lloyd; b. Norwich say 1595-1596; d. England 1658-1659; ${ }^{[20]}$ m. (1) by license dated 13 April 1612, Thomas Yale, son of [Dr.] David and Frances (Lloyd) Yale, d. between 15 Oct. 1619 and 27 March 1620 (dates of will and probate); ${ }^{[21]} \mathrm{m}$. (2) by 15 April 1628 (baptism of first child), Theophilus Eaton, bp. Stony Stratford, Buckinghamshire, 15 Aug. 1591, son of Rev. Richard and Elizabeth (Okell?) Eaton, and widower of Grace Hillier. Theophilus d. New Haven Colony 7 Jan. 1657/8, bur. on the New Haven Green. ${ }^{[22]}$ He left a will dated 12 Aug. 1656, evidently proved in New Haven Colony on an unknown date. ${ }^{[23]}$
ii. David Lloyd, bp. St. George Colegate, Norwich, 26 June 1597; bur. St. Mary-on-the-Hill, Chester, 27 Oct. 1672; ${ }^{[24]}$ will dated 25 Dec. 1668, proved Chester 19 Dec. 1672; ${ }^{[25]}$ m. (1) Mary Garard; m. (2) Anne _ , the executrix of his will. Mrs. Anne Lloyd was bur. St. Mary-on-the-Hill 20 July 1681.

[^17]iii. John Lloyd, bp. Heswall 9 Oct. 1599; dead by 1649.
iv. Alice Lloyd, bp. Heswall 20 March 1602/3; bur. St. Mary-on-the-Hill 27 June 1631. ${ }^{[26]}$
v. Edward Lloyd, b. Heswall 1 May 1604; left Cheshire or England and lost contact with his family, but possibly alive 4 Nov. 1640.
vi. George Lloyd, bur. Heswall 11 May 1605.
vii. Henry Lloyd, bur. Heswall 19 June 1607.
viii. Mary Lloyd, m. (1) John Bruen; (2) by 4 Nov. 1640 $\qquad$ Paget.

## Genealogical Summary: Wilkenson of Norwich

Norwich records afford a fairly clear picture of Anne Wilkenson's immediate family. Since, for some centuries before him, no freemen of Norwich bore the name Wilkenson, her father John most likely came to Norwich at the time he was apprenticed to "Master" Wynter of the Grocers' Company. ${ }^{[27]}$ Whatever his origins, John Wilkenson quickly established himself amongst the governing families of the city. He was admitted freeman of Norwich 3 September 1571, elected alderman to represent the ward of St. Peter Mancroft in 1584, and chosen by the common council as one of two candidates for the mayoralty in 1591. ${ }^{[28]}$ In 1589 he and his servant James Fawcett were summoned before the Privy Council. ${ }^{[29]}$ Given his local prominence, it is unusual that neither burial nor probate records can be found for him. He married at St. George Colegate,

[^18]Norwich, 11 October 1568, ${ }^{[30]}$ Cecily (Bacon) Walters, daughter of Henry and Alice (Calle) Bacon, ${ }^{[31]}$ baptized there 13 September 1543, buried at St. George Colegate 17 July $1608 .{ }^{[32]}$ Cecily was the widow of Robert Walters, whom she had married at St. George Colegate 14 May 1565. ${ }^{[33]}$ Robert left a will dated 1 September 1566, proved 21 October $1566 \cdot{ }^{[34]}$ He was a member of the Grocers' Company and was admitted freeman of Norwich 26 October 1564. ${ }^{[35]}$

Children of John and Cecily (Bacon) Wilkenson:
i. Alice Wilkenson, b. say 1569-1571; d. after 14 March 1603/4 (date of husband's will); m. St. George Colegate 12 Oct. 1590, Thomas Clement, ${ }^{[36]}$ bp. St. Simon and St. Jude, Norwich, 25 May 1564, son of Ralph and Joan (___) Clement, ${ }^{[37]}$ bur. St. George Colegate 20 March 1603/4. ${ }^{[38]}$ Thomas made a nuncupative will dated 14 March 1603/4, proved 19 March 1603/4. ${ }^{[39]}$ He was a member of the Grocers' Company, and was admitted freeman of Norwich 9 March 1593/4. ${ }^{[40]}$
Children of Thomas and Alice (Wilkenson) Clement; some records possibly lost in a missing folio of St. George Colegate baptismal records (1587-1596):

St. George Colegate 13 May 1594, George Lloyd, b. ca. 1560, son of Meredith Lloyd and his wife, Janet Conway, d. 1 Aug. 1615, bur. Chester Cathedral. ${ }^{[42]}$ Anne left a will dated 4 Nov. 1640, codicil dated the same day, proved Chester 8 Jan. 1648/9, described above.
iii. Henry Wilkenson, bp. St. George Colgate 24 Feb. 1577/8; ${ }^{[43]}$ most likely the man of that name bur. Shotwick, Cheshire, 19 May 1641. ${ }^{[44]}$ Henry Wilkenson followed his sister to Cheshire and hoped to make his fortune there. If so, the bishop's early death was for him a stroke of misfortune which might explain why Henry did not emerge more distinctly in Cheshire society or records. He left but faint traces, most in connection with a fight which broke out at Shotwick over his taking possession of the rectory. ${ }^{[45]}$ Why, as the only son and heir of a prominent citizen of Norwich, he did not choose to remain in Norwich, or why he did not, after the bishop's death, return to Norwich to take up his rights as a freeman, are both curious.

# Margaret Browne, Wife of James ${ }^{1}$ Cade and Nicholas ${ }^{1}$ Baxter, Both of Boston, Massachusetts

Nicholas ${ }^{1}$ Baxter, fisherman, was in Boston, Massachusetts, as early as 25 November 1639, when he was allowed to be an inhabitant. ${ }^{[1]}$ In February 1639/40, the birth of his daughter Mary was recorded in Boston Town Records. ${ }^{[2]}$ The baby's mother was recorded as Ann. On the 25th day of the 6th month [August] 1644, Nicholas Baxter, mariner, was received into the First Church in Boston, ${ }^{[3]}$ but his wife Ann does not appear in the church records, or in any other Boston records. On the 1st day of the 7th month [September] 1644, "Mary Baxter the Daughter of our brother Nicholas Baxter" was baptized. ${ }^{[4]}$ The space in the record for her age is left blank.
On 3 April 1658 Nicholas had a wife named Margaret, as shown in an agreement by Charles Stockbridge to build a fence for them..$^{[5]}$ On 20 December 1661, Nicholas and Margaret Baxter of Boston deeded an orchard to Stockbridge. ${ }^{[6]}$ On 12 December 1668, Nicholas Baxter, for "naturall love and affection . . . towards John Bull . . . and Mary his wife, the daughter of my wife Margaret," deeded a parcel of land to John Bull. ${ }^{[7]}$ This shows that Margaret also had a daughter Mary, who had married John Bull.
In his will dated 5 April 1680, Nicholas Baxter gave his daughter Mary [by then Mary Swett] his house and land in Boston, "except that piece or parcell of Land lying in my Lott which I gave to my son in-law John Bull the twennvth [twennyth?] of December sixty \& eight . . . which I still reserve \& maintaine to him his heires \& Assignes for ever. ${ }^{3 /[8]}$ Nicholas died 10 January 1691/2, ${ }^{[9]}$ and the will was proved 29 April 1692. If everyone in the family had accepted the terms of the will, we might not know the full names of his second wife and her daughter. But in 1694 Nicholas's daughter Mary (Baxter) (Buttolph) Swett brought suit against John Bull, claiming he was trespassing on land that was

[^21]rightfully hers. She lost, but appealed in 1704, and during the appeal John Bull submitted a statement explaining why he had a right to the land. It reads, in part: ${ }^{[10]}$

And a great dele of reson Mr. Baxster had to grant to the apelle [John Bull] what he is in poseson of by reson of the sayd Baxsters selinge of a house and land of the apelle wife mothers in bedifor in the west of England as capt prout if he were alif wold have testified being there with heime[?] when sold and by his prom[isin]g[?] to make the apelle wif eagull in portion with his owne dafter this house is knowne by Mr Aburham Gordinge who knew the appelle wifs grandfather who[se] name was Mr Browne.
The parish register of Bideford in Devon shows the marriage of Margrett Browne to James "Kade" on 21 August 1633. ${ }^{[11]}$ Knowing James Cade's name made it possible to find published research about Margaret's marriage before her marriage to Nicholas Baxter. ${ }^{[12]}$ James Cade, shipwright, formerly of Northam, Devon, and Margaret his wife are shown to have been in Boston on 4 December 1638, when, according to Lechford's Notebook, they granted "a lien and enfeoffe" to George Strange to arrange to sell property in Northam. The document also mentions that James and Margaret hold for the life of Margaret "one mesuage [dwelling house with the adjacent buildings and adjoining lands] or Tenement with the appurtenances lying in Biddeford in the said County." ${ }^{[13]}$ Northam and Bideford are less than two miles apart. Apparently James and Margaret did not complete the sale of the Bideford land during James's lifetime, assuming this was the land that John Bull referred to in 1704 in his litigation with Mary Swett, as the land in Bideford that Margaret had permitted Nicholas Baxter to sell.

This litigation strongly suggests that Margaret, wife of James Cade, was the same Margaret who subsequently married Nicholas Baxter - and that Margaret and Nicholas both had daughters by their first marriages, namely, Mary Cade (born 4 October 1640) and Mary Baxter (born in February 1639/40), both born in Boston. ${ }^{[14]}$

## Genealogical Summary: Cade

An account of this Cade family in England was published in 1992, ${ }^{[15]}$ and is the basis for the Genealogical Summary below.

1. James ${ }^{\text {B }}$ Cade of Northam, Devon, perhaps the James Cade baptized there 29 June 1550, no parents named. ${ }^{[16]}$ He died after 29 December 1624 when he was named in the will of his granddaughter Phillippe Cade (see below). Perhaps his wife was Phillipa Cade, buried in Northam 24 November 1622.

One annuity or yearly rent of five pounds issuing out of certain messuages, lands \&c. called Knap als Lower Knapp, in Northam to wife Mary and sons James, William and John (as above). A certain estate in Hartland to sons John, William and James (as above), they to pay to my sister Ellinor Bante every year during the life of Clase Middleton three pounds \&c. To son William all my fishing nets and all my salt and caske in Ireland, all my wearing apparel and implements for the sea and twenty pounds \&c. To son James twenty pounds. To my daughter Phillipp Fifty pounds, and forty pounds more to her at day of marriage if she marry with consent of my overseers. To my daughter Thomzin Cade ten shillings. The residue to wife Mary whom I make sole executrix.

Presumably she was the goody Baxter who was mentioned on 9 November 1673 in the records of the First Church in Boston. ${ }^{[25]}$ Apparently she had died by 5 April 1680, when Nicholas made his will without mentioning her.

John Bull was described at various times as feltmaker, wharfkeeper, and innkeeper. He built and maintained a wharf which was large enough to launch a ship of 400 tons. ${ }^{[28]}$ Bull's Tavern was at the foot of Summer Street, in a place that is now the site of Boston's South Station. ${ }^{[29]}$ On 11 November 1678 he took the oath of allegiance in Boston. ${ }^{[30]}$ He was a member of the South Company of Boston, which was comprised of volunteer watchmen who served regularly in their neighborhood, and often met at Bull's Tavern. In his diary Samuel Sewall mentioned meetings of the watchmen at John Bull's, and a comfortable time had during a watch. But on one occasion, when a decision was to be made to choose an ensign to lead the watch, and John Bull removed himself from consideration for health reasons, Judge Sewall wrote in his diary, "and as to me, [Serjt Bull] is not of any Church, nor a Freeman, nor of Estate, besides the former objections." ${ }^{[31]}$ John Bull died in Boston 20 January 1712/3, but his estate was not administered until 30 September 1723, a month after the death of his widow. ${ }^{[32]}$ After John Bull's death, his widow Mary, who was then in her early seventies, was granted a license to continue selling strong drink as an innholder. ${ }^{[33]}$

## Genealogical Summary: Baxter

Nicholas ${ }^{1}$ Baxter, fisherman, was in Boston as early as 25 November 1639, when he was allowed to be an inhabitant. He died in Boston 10 January 1691/2. He married first, before February 1639/40 (birth of only known child), AnN
$\qquad$ . On 25 August 1644, Nicholas Baxter, mariner, was received into the First Church in Boston. On 26 February 1654/5, his tax rate for the year 1653 was remitted, on the request of his wife, "sister Baxter," who explained that he had been taken at sea and lost what he had in the year 1653. ${ }^{[60]}$ He married

[^27]second Margaret (Browne) Cade before 3 April 1658, when Charles Stockbridge agreed to build a fence for them. Perhaps they were married before 26 February 1654/5, because the naming in the tax rate of Nicholas Baxter's wife as "sister Baxter" (the term "sister" was often used in church records to refer to a church member) suggests that his wife at that time was Margaret, who is known to have been a member of First Church by then. There is no record of the church membership of Nicholas's first wife, Ann. On 12 December 1668, Nicholas granted a part of his land to John Bull and Mary his wife "daughter of my wife Margaret." Nicholas made his will 5 April 1680, proved 29 April 1692, mentioning daughter Mary Swett and son-in-law John Bull.

Nicholas probably was the Nicholas Baxter who was a "gunner at the castle $1674-1676,{ }^{[61]}$ and whose arrears of salary were ordered to be paid 24 October 1691. ${ }^{[62]}$ However, the gunner is shown as a son of Nicholas and Ann in a 1994 account, citing Savage. ${ }^{[63]}$

# George Barlow, the Marshal of Sandwich, Massachusetts, and His Descendants for Three Generations

Part I. The "Notorious" Marshal George Barlow

A great deal has been written about George Barlow, the "notorious marshal of Sandwich," whose persecution of Quakers has become almost legendary. Many of the stories about him cannot be verified; some are clearly apocryphal. ${ }^{[1]}$ After charging that the initial allocation of land in Sandwich in 1640 grossly favored men of aristocratic background, the early Yarmouth historian and genealogist Amos Otis wrote, "By the aid of the notorious Barlow . . . they maintained their ascendancy twenty-five years, when they were succeeded by a better class of men. ${ }^{[2]}$ This astonishing statement, in which Otis attributes to Barlow the ability to help preserve an alleged inequitable division of power for seventeen years before he had even arrived in Sandwich, is testament to the extraordinary degree to which Barlow's reputation has come to exceed any possible reality. This article has two purposes. One is to examine the contemporaneous colony and town records of Barlow's tenure as marshal. The second is to document his descendants through the third generation.
Quakers had begun arriving in the colonies from England in the mid-1650s. They were welcomed in certain Sandwich households and were preaching there. Sandwich, because of its location, was particularly vulnerable to incursions by "foreign" Quakers, often from Rhode Island, who came to preach

[^29]their heretical gospel and sometimes to disrupt sanctioned religious services. Plymouth's initial edicts in 1657, stipulating expulsion of foreign Quakers and a fine for refusal to take the oath of fidelity, ${ }^{[3]}$ were followed by a detailed set of requirements spelling out fines and ordering whippings for a variety of offenses including hosting a Quaker and holding or attending a Quaker meeting. Quakers could not be admitted freemen or could be disfranchised along with any who were "manifest Incurragers of them." ${ }^{[4]}$

Foreign Quakers continued to arrive in Plymouth and to return after they had been sent out of the colony. Sandwich continued to host Quaker meetings. In June of 1658, in view of the "many desturbant persons" in Sandwich, the Court in Plymouth created a new position of marshal. ${ }^{[5]}$ The marshal was to be based at Sandwich with responsibilities at Sandwich, Barnstable, and Yarmouth. His charge was threefold: to assist Plymouth's chief marshal, ${ }^{[6]}$ to carry out the provisions of special warrants directed to him by the Court, and to act as a constable in the performance of regular constabulary duties. ${ }^{[7]}$ The marshal was to receive ten percent of every pound or pound's worth of goods seized in payment of fines. George Barlow was appointed marshal for an initial term of one year. Having taken the oath of fidelity at Sandwich in 1657, ${ }^{[8]}$ Barlow was made a Sandwich townsman by the Plymouth Court in June of 1659. ${ }^{[9]}$

George Barlow took up his new position with enthusiasm. He not only fined Quakers but also confiscated their household goods when they were unable to pay the fines. Fines were regularly levied for refusing to take the annual oath of fidelity and for hosting or attending a Quaker meeting. And almost immediately, he found additional reasons to levy fines.

Barlow had been appointed to a position that was locally unpopular from the start and was designed to encourage abuse, and it would have been almost impossible for him not to have aroused opposition. Resistance to his activities began immediately and continued without abating. Men were called to order and fined for abusing the marshal either verbally or physically. ${ }^{[10]}$ Others refused to assist him in the performance of his duties. ${ }^{[11]}$ At least two men

[^30]were fined for refusing to serve as constable, and in at least one case the fine was given to Barlow. ${ }^{[12]}$ While many of these men were Quakers, not all were.

William Newland and Thomas Butler, both Quakers, were frequently in conflict with Barlow. Newland complained in March 1658/9 that he had suffered much damage when Barlow had entered and "brake up" his house during the night, and in October of that year it was formally noted that Barlow had attached one of Newland's horses without notifying him. ${ }^{[13]}$ A month later, Newland was among three men whose homes were ordered by the Court to be searched for "falce, scandalous, and pernisious" papers. ${ }^{[14]}$ Thomas Butler was fined ten shillings in March 1659 for refusing to aid the marshal. ${ }^{[15]}$ His son Daniel was whipped for publicly helping a foreign Quaker whom Barlow was trying to apprehend, and Thomas and his wife were fined forty shillings for their "turbulent cariages" the night their home was searched in an attempt to apprehend their son. ${ }^{[16]}$

As soon as these and other stories about Barlow's actions had begun to circulate, he began to bring suits claiming outsized damages for defamation of character. ${ }^{[17]}$ At first, these suits were typically decided in Barlow's favor, generally with the award of damages much lower than those he had demanded. For example, in the case of William Newland, Barlow brought an action of defamation, asking $£ 50$ damages, for Newland's claim that he had lost many things from his house during Barlow's night raid. The Court found for Barlow, awarding five shillings and the cost of the suit. ${ }^{[18]}$

But it soon became clear that marshal Barlow's enforcement of the Plymouth Court's edicts had had no effect on the adherence of the Sandwich Quakers to their beliefs, and if anything had drawn others into sympathy with them. Word of the growing opposition would have reached Plymouth quickly, and in mid-1660 it spread to England. An important source, a letter from Captain James Cudworth of Scituate to a friend in England, described Plymouth's atmosphere and Barlow's predations: "The antichristian, persecuting spirit is very active . . . He that will not lash, persecute and punish men that differ in matters of religion, must not sit on the bench, nor sustain any office in the Commonwealth . . . We are wrapped up in a labyrinth of confused laws, that the freeman's power is quite gone . . " "[19] When this "scandalous" letter

[^31]reached England, it was published and returned to Plymouth. Cudworth was disfranchised in June $1660 .{ }^{[20]}$ He was not reinstated until 1673. ${ }^{[21]}$

The Plymouth Court persisted. In June 1660, in an effort to eliminate the Quaker threat that carries a tinge of desperation, Plymouth entered into the record an expanded and more detailed version of the laws enacted earlier. The revised regulations included the direction that a cage was to be built in each town, especially at Sandwich, Duxbury, Marshfield, and Scituate, where Quakers were most troublesome. Apprehended Quakers could be confined in these cages rather than in the stocks. ${ }^{[22]}$ Nonetheless, it appears from the record that public opinion was beginning to moderate the Court's actions. Plymouth was under pressure from the Bay Colony to follow its lead, but the problems in the two colonies were vastly different. Boston was most concerned with foreign Quakers. Plymouth's most pressing concern, in Sandwich and in other towns, was the large number of resident Quakers. While foreign Quakers did appear from time to time in Sandwich and preached there, they were often on their way to Boston when they did so. Boston could send its foreign Quakers out of the colony. Plymouth's actions threatened serious damage to its own towns.

The Court's judgments became more tempered. William Bassett, one of the most respected men in Sandwich, was fined ten shillings in March 1660 for having given out various reports of Barlow that were shown to be untrue. ${ }^{[23]}$ That Bassett had joined in the general gossip concerning Barlow is telling, but what is perhaps of greater significance is that the fine covered only Barlow's court appearance costs. No damages were assessed. For having Benjamin Allin sit in the stocks at Sandwich most of a night without cause, as well as for other offenses against him, Barlow was fined twenty shillings in March 1660/1, to be paid to Allin, and was directed to return to Allin a shirt and other small linen. At the same court session and after Barlow's invasion of the Butler household, a twenty-shilling fine that Barlow had levied on Thomas Butler for his wife's and son's attendance at a Quaker meeting was ordered returned to Butler. ${ }^{[24]}$ In October 1660, the Court fined a group of Sandwich townspeople who had attended a Quaker meeting, and convicted but did not fine a group of men who had refused to take the oath of fidelity. ${ }^{[25]}$ The following March, men who had refused to take the oath of fidelity were again convicted but not fined. ${ }^{[26]}$ In May 1661, men were still fined for refusing to aid the marshal; but those who had entertained foreign Quakers in Sandwich were not. ${ }^{[27]}$

Plymouth may have been losing interest in prosecuting Quakers, but the Bay Colony was becoming harsher. Three Quakers had been executed in Boston by May 1661 and one was in jail awaiting execution when King Charles was made aware of the extreme measures taken against the Quakers of New England.

[^32]The king responded with a letter to Massachusetts Governor John Endecott, dated 9 September 1661, dictating that any of "His Majesty's subjects called Quakers" condemned to death "or other corporal punishments" were to be sent to England to be dealt with there. ${ }^{[28]}$ All Quakers imprisoned in Boston were forthwith released. While Boston continued to whip Quakers and expel them from the Bay Colony, the king's letter brought an end to George Barlow's predations at Sandwich. Barlow never again appeared in the Plymouth records as marshal of Sandwich, and no other marshal was ever appointed.

## George Barlow's Family

George Barlow married Jane Besse, widow of Sandwich townsman Anthony Besse, probably about the time George became a townsman in 1659; John, the older of their two sons, was born by mid-1660. ${ }^{[29]}$ Jane already had eight children: six of them daughters and all of them minors. ${ }^{[30]}$ The Barlow family was not a happy one. Three of George's stepdaughters, Anne, Dorcas, and Mary Besse, appeared at the March 1661/2 session of the Court. "Anne Bessey, for her crewell and unaturall practice towards her father in law, Gorge Barlow, in choping of him in the backe, notwithstanding the odiousness of her fact [act?], the Court, considering of some sercomstances, viz, her ingeniouse [ingenuous] confession, together with her present condition, being with child, and some other particulares, have sentenced her to pay a fine of ten pounds, or to bee publickly whipt att some other convenient time when her condition will admitt thereof." Her sisters Dorcas and Mary Besse were sentenced to sit in the stocks. George and Jane were chastised for "theire most ungodly liveing in contension one with the other" and, in a stunning example of patriarchal public denial, were "admonished to live otherwise." ${ }^{[3]]}$ Three months later, a cow willed by Anthony Besse to his daughter Jane but held by Barlow was ordered by the Court to be returned to the overseers of Besse's estate. ${ }^{[32]}$

George, at least, did not begin to live otherwise. In May 1665 he appeared before the Plymouth court to answer for "attempting the chastity of Abigaill, the wife of Jonathan Pratt, by aluring words and actes of force, being to the affrighting and much wronging of the said Abigaill in the house shee dwells in, being then alone . . " Although Barlow denied the accusation, the Court

[^33]required a bond of $£ 20$ to guarantee his appearance at the next General Court session. ${ }^{[33]}$ The outcome is not on record. The following year, Barlow was fined ten shillings by the Plymouth Court for being drunk the second time. ${ }^{[34]}$ Presumably these offenses took place in Plymouth, but Barlow later caused disturbances also in Sandwich. In June of 1677, the Court had received a complaint that he was acting so "turbulently" in Sandwich that the disturbance threatened to drive away the minister, Mr. Smith. Barlow, appearing at the next court session, acknowledged that he had indeed spoken as claimed, but that it was only upon great provocation. He promised to support the minister henceforth, to encourage others to do so, and to "indeavor to bury . . . in oblivion" the particulars of the provocation that had so angered him. ${ }^{[35]}$ A year later he was before the Court again for the same offense. ${ }^{[36]}$ At about the same time, Jane Barlow was presented for selling liquor to an Indian, an offense sometimes committed by those who needed money. The Court, having taken note of Jane's claim that she did not know that what she had done was wrong and her promise never to do it again, released her without a fine. ${ }^{[37]}$

George Barlow had come to Sandwich as an outsider, and he remained essentially an outsider. Although he had arrived in Sandwich by 1657, he does not appear in town records until February 1660/1, when he was simply noted among a list of persons to whom the town owed money. ${ }^{[38]}$ He was not granted the opportunity to buy a homestead lot in an area where other homestead lots lay. Later, he did take a limited part in Sandwich government. He was chosen constable in June of $1663,{ }^{[39]}$ and as constable he called the town meeting in May of $1664 .{ }^{[40]}$ In February 1675/6, he was chosen one of two agents for the collection of fines from men who had refused to respond to an order from the Council of War. ${ }^{[41]}$ He was named a grand juryman in 1681. ${ }^{[42]}$

George Barlow's residence has been a subject of some uncertainty. The first survey of property ownership in Sandwich was concluded in 1667. It covered properties lying along the town shore at Scusset Harbor, Shawme Marsh, and Scorton Harbor. Noting that three men known to be residents of Sandwich at that time did not appear in the survey, Lovell speculated that all three had already moved from the town center to those sections of the Buzzard's Bay shore that were then part of Sandwich but later became villages in the town of Bourne. ${ }^{[43]}$ For Ezra Perry in Monument Beach and Robert Lawrence in

[^34]Cataumet this is probably correct, ${ }^{[44]}$ but there is nothing to suggest that George Barlow ever lived in Pocasset. ${ }^{[45]}$ George's son Nathan Barlow was resident in Pocasset in 1695 when the town of Sandwich agreed that he "mought dwell upon the [Pocasset] land where he had built which he hired of Will Numack Indian and that he might also purchase it of the sd Will if it is to be purchased, ${ }^{[146]}$ but the location of Nathan's home in 1695 does not necessarily have any bearing on George's whereabouts three decades earlier.
Since Jane Besse's two sons were minors at the time of her marriage to George, George and Jane Barlow with their children could have lived in the home of Jane's deceased first husband Anthony Besse. But in 1664, Jane's son Nehemiah Besse came of age and was given permission by the Plymouth Court to "enter upon the full enjoyment and posession of his fathers inheritance." ${ }^{[47]}$ If he was living there, Barlow presumably would have had to move out.
George Barlow owned land in Sandwich village, but it was not in the homestead area covered by the 1667 survey. In 1660, he was one of three men granted permission by the Court in Plymouth to seek out land "for their accommodation towards the south sea. ${ }^{[48]}$ The south sea was Nantucket Sound, but the instruction was directional only. The men evidently bought land at a loosely defined region called Nonesuch, which Lovell situates near the junction of today's Routes 6 and 130 (Water Street) at what would have been the southern end of Sandwich village. ${ }^{[49]}$ Barlow still owned this land in 1684 when he made his will. ${ }^{[50]}$
Conventionally, after some bequests of livestock, George left one-third of his household goods to Jane and two-thirds to their sons John and Nathan Barlow. But George and Jane Barlow possibly were not living together. George was evidently living in leased property, because he suggested that after his death Jane should "Live in the house as I now Live in the whole tearme that I am to hold it." All his real estate, "being att a place Called Non Such being eight acres more or Lesse," he left to Jane during her life or widowhood, and then equally to his sons John and Nathan Barlow. There was a house on the Nonesuch property, but only John lived there: "I also give them [his sons] the house that my son John Liveth in." Eight acres of upland valued at $£ 10$ were listed in the inventory, along with a house valued at $£ 2$.

[^35]Jane was provided for after the lease on George's rented house ran out. The bequest of the Nonesuch property to John and Nathan contained the proviso that "my two sons build theire Mother an other house near Scapett Necke ${ }^{[51]}$. . . if my [wife] desire it, and after her decease my sonnes shall have said house." Ten years later, Jane bequeathed to her son John Barlow "my dwelling house and all my Land on which it stands and Land adjacent to him." ${ }^{[52]}$ Neither land nor house was in the inventory of her estate; their disposition had already been provided for in George's will. Whether George and Jane Barlow themselves ever lived together at Nonesuch is unknown.

As mentioned above, Nathan Barlow left Sandwich village for Pocasset at some time before the 1684 date of George's will. The Barlow family had had a presence in Pocasset that could have led directly to Nathan's move. In 1672, to satisfy a debt owed to William Paybody, William Numacke and his brother Moses had agreed to a ten-year mortgage on some of William's land lying along the Pocasset River. ${ }^{[53]}$ In 1682, William Numacke successfully went to court to order George Barlow, who had leased the mortgaged land from William Paybody, to cease mowing it. ${ }^{[54]}$ This would have been two years before George's death. Perhaps it was Nathan, not George, who had been improving the land, and perhaps he remained there through an arrangement with William Numacke after termination of the ten-year mortgage. In any case, Nathan was not living in Sandwich in 1684, and he had probably been living in Pocasset for some time in 1695 when he received permission to purchase the land he had been leasing from William Numacke and on which he already had a house.

# The English Origin of George ${ }^{1}$ Puffer of Braintree, Massachusetts 

Randy A. West

An article in this journal in 1868 by William S. Appleton presented information on the family and descendants of George ${ }^{1}$ Puffer of Braintree, Massachusetts, ${ }^{[1]}$ which the author expanded and corrected in a publication in 1882. ${ }^{[2]}$ In 1915 Charles Nutt published a volume on this immigrant which included additional generations of descendants. ${ }^{[3]}$ Nutt's work indicated that an unsuccessful effort was made to find the immigrant's English origin. ${ }^{[4]}$ George Puffer was first of record in New England when he received a grant of twenty acres in Mount Wollaston [i.e., Braintree] for "five heads" on 24 February $1639[/ 40] \cdot{ }^{[5]}$ Both Appleton and Nutt agreed that George had a son James, born about 1624, based on his age at death, and a son Matthias. ${ }^{[6]}$ Nutt also stated that the immigrant possibly had a son William. ${ }^{[7]}$ The only research to shed light on the family of George Puffer since the publication of the 1915 volume was an article by Eugene Cole Zubrinsky in this journal in 1997. ${ }^{[8]}$ Zubrinsky showed that there is no evidence that George had a son William, ${ }^{[9]}$ demonstrated that a daughter of George almost certainly married Jonathan ${ }^{2}$ Bliss of Rehoboth, Massachusetts, ${ }^{[10]}$ and made a persuasive argument, using onomastic evidence, that this daughter was very likely named Rachel. ${ }^{[11]}$

Records have now been found in the parish registers of Earl Shilton, Leicestershire, ${ }^{[12]}$ which match with what is known about the family of George Puffer - including a daughter Rachel baptized in 1630 (and thus the right age

[^37]to have married Jonathan ${ }^{2}$ Bliss). In these records, which follow, the surname is spelled as Paugher/Pougher with the "gh" being pronounced like "ff", similar to the spelling of the surname in England for immigrant Edward ${ }^{1}$ Goffe of Cambridge, Massachusetts, as "Gough." ${ }^{[13]}$

A "Georgius filius Georij Pougher" was baptized in Earl Shilton 15 March 1580/1, but he seems to be too old to have been the immigrant, and no relevant probate records were found. The baptismal record of "Johannes Paugher filius Georgij" in Earl Shilton 5 June 1635 is almost certainly for a contemporary George Pougher, who married in Mowsley, Leicestershire, 10 September 1634, Elizabeth Simkin ${ }^{[14]}$ and had additional children baptized in Earl Shilton from $1636 / 7$ to $1653 .{ }^{[15]}$

## Genealogical Summary

George ${ }^{1}$ Puffer was born say 1599 (assuming age 25 at marriage). He married in Earl Shilton, Leicestershire, 15 November 1624, Martha Hoare. Neither his parentage nor that of his wife has been discovered. George and his family immigrated to New England by 1639 and settled in Braintree, Massachusetts. He died there 27 September 1639 as "George Pocher," according to his death record, but appears to have been living when granted land on 24 February $1639[/ 40] \cdot{ }^{[16]}$ The given name of his wife is not mentioned in any New England record. She died in Braintree 18 February 1676[/7] as "The Widow Poffer." ${ }^{[17]}$ No probate records were found for either George or his wife.

3. Robert ${ }^{\text {B/C }}$ Higginson (Thomas ${ }^{\text {C/D }}$, John ${ }^{\mathrm{D} / \mathrm{E}}$ ) was born say 1539. He was buried in Solihull, Warwickshire, 31 March 1614. ${ }^{[34]}$ He was mentioned in his grandfather's will dated 10 December 1540, and inherited Follolande/ Fullowelande and Wasperton in his father's 1573 will. Robert was undersheriff of Warwickshire in 1581. ${ }^{[35]}$ The name of his first wife is unknown. Robert married second in Solihull 24 January 1572/3, Alice Thorne. ${ }^{[36]}$ Her burial has not been found. Robert married third Joane $\qquad$ , who was mentioned in his 1610 will, but no marriage record has been found. In 1595 Robert's wife (not named) received a legacy of 5 shillings in the will of his cousin Marie Hill. Robert was made overseer of the will of his uncle William Willmer of Daventry, Northampton, in 1592. ${ }^{[37]}$

The will of Robert Higginson of Solihull, gentleman, was executed 7 December 1610 and proved 10 May 1614. The following is a partial transcription: ${ }^{[38]}$

And if any of the children doe die before they shall accomplish the age and tymes Then my will is that the money shall goe to the longest livers $\mathrm{w}^{\text {ch }}$ three pounds is in my sonne Overtons hands to be paid by him or his Executors It[e]m my will is and I doe give unto Joane my wife all the rest of my goods unbequeathed, movable and unmovable to discharge my debts, and funerall expenses whom I make my sole Executrix. In wittnes therof I have herunto put my hand the day and yeare above written. I have received the $\mathrm{x}^{1} \mathrm{w}^{\text {ch }}$ my sonne Overton had for Sara $\mathrm{w}^{\text {ch }} \mathrm{I}$ will shalbe put forth to the use of Sara Elliott, and shalbe delivered at her full age.

In her 1595 will, Marie Hill, widow of Meriden, Warwickshire, left 5 shillings to her cousin Isabel Benyon. Thomas Benyon, yeoman, was appointed overseer in the will of Rev. William Stockton of Berkeswell, dated 2 March 1593[/4?]. ${ }^{[42]}$ His son Jonas Stockton

[^41]was one of the ministers in Elizabeth City, Virginia, in 1621. ${ }^{[43]}$ Thomas was also mentioned in the 1596 will of his brother John Benyon of Stoneleigh. ${ }^{[44]}$ The will of Thomas Benyon of Berkeswell, yeoman, was executed 19 June 1608 and proved 26 November 1608. The following is a partial transcription: ${ }^{[45]}$

I geve and bequeathe unto my eldest daughter Marie Benyon the Some of Threescore and sixe poundes Thirtene shillinges and fower pence . . . over and besides a Legacye of Sixe poundes thirtene shillings fower pence more $\mathrm{w}^{\text {ch }}$ was given unto hir by hir Godmother Mistris Marie Hill. Item I give and bequeathe unto my daughter Margerie Benion Threescore six poundes thirtene shillings \& fower pence . . . Item I give and bequeathe unto my daughter Elizabeth Benyon Threescore six poundes thirtene shillings \& fower pence . . . Item I give and bequeathe unto my daughter Ursula Benion Threescore six poundes thirtene shillings \& fower pence . . . to be payde to everie of them at the daies of theire severall marriadges yf they doe marrie by the consent of Isabel Benion their mother Thomas Higginson of Barkeswell theire unckle Thomas Higginson of Sollihull their kynsman Silvester Warner theire Brother in lawe and George Benion their eldest brother or by the consent of any twoe of them And my will is that if any of my said daughters doe live unmarried untill the age of thirtie yeares and my wief be then deceassed that then everie suche of them shall have hir whole porcon at hir owne discretion And my will is further that everie of my saide daughters shall have the one halfe of the use made or receavyd for hir portion orells [or else] five marks in money by yeare yearlie payde by my Executor towards their maintenance untill they receyve their porcons. Item my will is that yf any of my saide daughters doe wilfullie marrie $\mathrm{w}^{\text {th }}$ oute the consent of those their frendes abovenamed or any twoe of them that the one half of the portion of them soe marrienge shall goe \& remayne amongest the rest of their sisters equallie and thother half to hir owne use .. . Item my will is further If any of my said daughters doe die before they be married That shee shall or maye dispose and give the one half of hir portion at hir deceasse unto hir freindes who shee shall thincke good and the other halfe thereof shall goe and remayne unto Gabriell Benion my youngest Sonne. Christopher was probably in Virginia before 24 April 1640, when Richard Kemp, Secretary of Virginia Colony, wrote to Sir Francis Windebanke, Secretary of State under Charles I, regarding Kemp's entanglement in a bitter struggle between the royal governor Sir John Harvey and the governor's Council. The letter and accompanying documents were presented in England "by the hands of one Mr. Christopher Higgison a neare kinsman to the Lord Bishop of Ely." How Higginson was related to Matthew Wren, Bishop of Ely, is unclear, but Kemp was evidently hoping for Wren's assistance, which is apparent in another letter of the same date to Robert Reade, a brother-in-law of Secretary Windebank. ${ }^{[55]}$ Christopher was clearly in Virginia by 17 Jan. 1642[/3?] when Hugh Gwyn, Gent. received a grant of 1,900 acres for transporting 37 persons into the colony, among them Christopher Higginson, "[transported] twice," and Elizabeth Higginson, possibly his wife. ${ }^{[56]}$

The 1666 will of his brother Humphrey, who had returned to England, mentioned "my brother Christopher Higginson now resident upon my plantation called Harrop in Virginia be maintayned upon and out of the same during his natural life."[57]

Christopher is said to have a large posterity, a statement apparently based on the proliferation of the Higginson family in the area of Harrop in James City County, although reliable evidence of relationships has not been found. ## Additions and Corrections

SCARRITT. "Richard Scarritt of New London and Branford, Connecticut," 162 (2008):204-211, 276-289, by Diane LeBlanc Delbridge. At 288 the wife of John ${ }^{4}$ Scarritt was probably not Eunice Merriman, even though her marriage record calls her Eunice Merriman (Wallingford First Congregational Church records, 2:44 [FHL 0,006,053]). More likely she was Eunice Cook, born in Wallingford 6 December 1770, daughter of Merriman and Mary (Osborn) Cook. Commemorative Biographical Record of New Haven County, Connecticut . . . , 2 vols. (Chicago: J. H. Beers \& Co., 1902), 1:1:150, shows John and Eunice (Cook) Scarritt with an oldest son Marcus Cook Scarritt. Davis, Early Families of Wallingford [note 181], 81, also shows Eunice Cook as the wife of John Scarritt.

The age at death (66) of Eunice Scarritt in 1836 agrees with a woman born in 1770 rather than in 1766 . The 1830 census shows John Scarritt aged 60-69 with a female age 50-59 in his household, which also agrees with a woman born in 1770 rather than in 1766 ( 1830 U.S. Census, New Haven, New Haven County, Connecticut, roll 9, p. 7). Nevertheless, neither age statement is determinative.

WATERBURY. "Reuniting the Family of Lt. John Waterbury (1753-1829)," by Frederick C. Hart, Jr., 164 (2010):254-265; 165 (2011):44-52. At 164:255 read the date of Lt. John Waterbury's marriage to Rebecca Weed as "probably about 1777 " and delete the name of the place. Also, in the same paragraph, change the fifth sentence to read, "Since we know that Lt. John Waterbury was known as John $3^{\text {rd }}$ at this time (see below), this land transaction confirms his identity as Rebecca's husband;" and delete the associated note 11 . The cited 8 December 1778 marriage at the Middlesex Congregational Church was for an undetermined John Waterbury and an Abigail (not Rebecca) Weed. As noted in the article, an image of the original church record was viewed and not a transcription, so that an uncorrected error for the recorded bride's name is very unlikely. Citing this church record in the original article was simply a mistake. No record of Lt. John and Rebecca's marriage date or place has yet been found.

The identities of the persons in the 1778 recorded marriage have now been investigated without reaching a satisfactory conclusion. There were six adult John Waterburys in Stamford at the time (including the Middlesex Parish) and they were commonly distinguished in the records by using a title such as Jr., $3^{\text {rd }}$, $4^{\text {th }}$, etc. Our subject Lt. John Waterbury was the $5^{\text {th }}$ in line during his military service in 1775-1777, becoming known as John Waterbury $4^{\text {th }}$ some time in 1778 , and then John Waterbury $3^{\text {rd }}$ in 1780, as described more fully in the article. No title was used in the marriage record, unfortunately. Since the titles were changing during 1778, the groom or the minister might have felt that no title would be better than a confusing one. It would be unreasonable in this case to conclude that the lack of a title implied that the man being married was the oldest of the six John Waterburys.

One possibility might be that this marriage was an earlier marriage for Lt. John Waterbury since the date of his marriage to Rebecca is still unknown and theoretically could have been any time before 1794 when she was identified in a land record as a daughter of Sylvanus Weed. No evidence has been found to support this possible solution. Rebecca did have a sister named Abigail Weed, but that sister has been identified as the wife of Hoyt Scofield in their marriage record of 6 April 1783 (Barbour Collection of Connecticut Vital Records, citing Stamford Vital Records, 2:1), and in another deed of gift by her father, Sylvanus Weed (Stamford Land Records, N:196).

Who, then, might the 1778 couple have been? There were five other adult John Waterburys in Stamford at the time of this wedding, four of whom, listed here in the order of their ages, may be dismissed from consideration. Unless otherwise noted, all information on these men is from Jacobus and Banker, as cited in note 2 of the article. An additional John ${ }^{6}$ Waterbury (Isaac ${ }^{5}$, John ${ }^{4}$, David ${ }^{3}$, John², William $^{1}$ ), born in May 1752, does not appear to have remained in Stamford.

- John ${ }^{5}$ Waterbury ( John $^{4-3-2}$, William ${ }^{1}$ ) was a much older man, born say 1712, and married a woman named Hannah in 1737, who survived him when he died in 1780 .
- John ${ }^{5}$ Waterbury (John ${ }^{4}$, David ${ }^{3}$, John ${ }^{2}$, William ${ }^{1}$ ) was also much older, born about 1724, and married a woman named Mary in 1750, who survived him when he died in 1804.
- John ${ }^{5}$ Waterbury (Thomas ${ }^{4}$, John ${ }^{3-2}$, William ${ }^{1}$ ), born in 1744, married Martha Winchell in October 1768, and lived in Stamford until his death in 1813 at age 70 (Connecticut State Library, Church Records Index, Stamford Congregational Church, 181, citing original 3:278). Although no death or burial record has been found for Martha, she was living at least until 1781 when their child Azariah Waterbury was baptized (ibid., 178, citing original 1:A), and therefore Abigail Weed could not have been a second wife for him in 1778.
- John ${ }^{6}$ Waterbury (Nathaniel ${ }^{5}$, John ${ }^{4-3-2}$, William ${ }^{1}$ ), born in 1750, was a Loyalist who absconded to Canada earlier in the year 1778 (Mrs. Rogers [Lois] Bayles, "A Study of the Loyalists from Stamford, Connecticut," unpaged typescript, 1975, at the New Canaan Historical Society, entry for John Waterbury), apparently unmarried at the time. Even if he had married in Stamford in December 1778, it probably would not have been in the Rev. Moses Mather's Middlesex Congregational Church that was such a strong center of patriot activity (see, for example, Louise H. McLean, "Brothers at War," The Darien Historical Society Annual, 3:2 [Bicentennial Edition]:3-43, at 7).
The remaining candidate is John ${ }^{6}$ Waterbury ( John $^{5-4-3-2}$, William ${ }^{1}$ ), born in 1754, who appeared in the 1790 census of Stamford with only two other persons in the household: one a female, presumably his wife, and one a slave (1790 U.S. Census, Stamford/Norwalk, Fairfield County, Connecticut, roll 1, p. 315). No further record of any wife or children has been found and his household in 1800 included only himself (age 45 and over) and a younger male (age 26-45), with no females (1800 U.S. Census, Stamford, Fairfield County, Connecticut, roll 1, p.

214, "John Waterbury $4^{\text {th }}$ ). In 1787, as the "only son," he had received the major portion of his father's estate including 82 acres and two houses on the homestead (Stamford Probate District Records, 6:897-898). But within a few years he had fallen into debt, gradually selling off or mortgaging several small portions of his property for cash before 1807-1809 when legal action was eventually taken against his remaining assets (Stamford Land Records, P:150, 212, 258). The time and place of his death have not been found. He was not listed as a head of family in the 1810 census of Stamford. It may be significant that he owned land in Middlesex Parish (Stamford Land Records, L:11 [1784], N:244 [1796] N: 426, 450 [both 1798]), as well as in other parts of Stamford. Although the available evidence is entirely circumstantial, this John Waterbury, called John $4^{\text {th }}$ from 1780 (when his father died) until 1804 (when Lt. John's father died) and then John Waterbury $3^{\text {rd }}$ from 1804 until his last mention in town about 1809, is the most likely candidate for husband of Abigail Weed in 1778. If so, it appears to have been a short-lived, childless marriage.

The number of Abigail Weeds in Stamford was even higher, and distinguishing among them even more difficult because they were usually differentiated by using the names of their fathers or husbands, and not with suffix titles such as were used for the men. Sixteen different Abigail Weeds were considered in the Stamford records whose ages would have ranged from eleven to thirty-seven years in 1778. Using abstracts of vital and church records, land and probate records, and the extensive Weed family manuscript records of Edward Franklin Weed (New Canaan Historical Society Collection, GE-24), and Judge Penfield Comstock Mead, Weed Family Dictionary (New Canaan Historical Society, 2004), thirteen of them could be eliminated for various reasons, including dying young, but mostly by having married someone else either before or after 1778. The three remaining candidates are as follows:

- Abigail ${ }^{5}$ Weed, born 16 September 1744, daughter of Jonathan ${ }^{4}$ Weed (Jonathan ${ }^{3}$, Jonas ${ }^{2-1}$ ). Nothing has been found regarding her later life including no marriage or death record, but she would have been 34 in 1778.
- Abigail ${ }^{5}$ Weed, born 14 November 1747 (or 1746, records vary), daughter of Josiah ${ }^{4}$ Weed (Jonathan ${ }^{3}$, Jonas ${ }^{2-1}$ ). No further records were found for her and she was not named in her father's estate distribution in 1775. She would have been 31 or 32 in 1778.
- Abigail ${ }^{5}$ Weed, born between 1757 and 1760, daughter of Nehemiah ${ }^{4}$ Weed (Daniel ${ }^{3-2}$, Jonas ${ }^{1}$ ). She would be the most likely candidate on the basis of age if still living ( 21 in 1778). She was not named in her father's will made in 1785 , but she could have received her portion before that time, possibly at marriage.
Unfortunately, although there are at least three potential Abigail Weed candidates for this marriage, insufficient evidence has been found to confirm that any of them was the bride in the 1778 marriage to a man named John Waterbury, who is also still unidentified. Therefore, the Abigail Weed-John Waterbury marriage in Middlesex Parish, Stamford, Connecticut on 8 December 1778 remains a puzzle waiting to be solved.

## Reviews of Books*


#### Abstract

The Descendants of Robert Winthrop of New York, by Scott C. Steward and Chip Rowe (Boston: Newbury Street Press, 2017. xiv +494 pp., illustrations, charts, bibliography, every-name index. Hardcover, \$64.96 plus shipping). Order from NEHGS online at AmericanAncestors.org/ Store or by phone 888-296-3447.


This superb book is focused on Robert Winthrop of New York City (18331892). Part I covers the Winthrop family in England. Part II covers the male line from John ${ }^{1}$ Winthrop, Governor of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, down to Robert Winthrop, with full treatment of siblings. A son and a grandson of Robert Winthrop married distant Winthrop-descended cousins, and their lines are fully covered in Part II as well. A chart on the front end pages and page 254 illustrates the connections.

There are many charts throughout the book, often linking a Winthrop line to various notable people. Numbering and format follow Register style with extensive documentation. A center section includes portraits and photographs of family members and houses.

While not attempting to repeat already-published works on the early generations, the sketch of each family includes interesting biographical material and stories. One can see that the first Adam, "an organizer and financier" in the English cloth industry, inaugurated the family tradition in the business world. The principal subject, Robert of New York City, was a banker and financier. But in his section, he is overshadowed by a lengthy account of his colorful wife, who did her own investing.

This is an important work on a major American family. It is also a very readable family history, treating scores of descendants who come alive in the account of each family group.

Volume 3 includes seventy-five documented sketches of families appearing in the 1790 census of Berkshire and Hampshire Counties (Hampden and Franklin having been set off after 1790). These sketches are in addition to those

[^59]published in Volumes 1 and 2, and dozens of unpublished sketches appear on this project's database on AmericanAncestors.org. Each sketch treats the head of the family and his children (or her children, in two instances); many of the children would later settle in Vermont, New York, and/or the Midwest.

Several of the sketches are for persons with the same surname, usually related. As a result, only fifty-seven surnames are treated: Arnold, Barnard, Bartlett, Berry, Birge, Bradley, Brooks, Browne, Burch, Chamberlin, Corse, Cowles, Crafts, Dalrymple, Davis, Donelson, Edson, Ferry, Fowler, Fuller, Gardner, Gibbs, Hall, Herrick, Ingell, Joyner, Kendall, Lilly, Luce, Lyon, Martin, Mayhew, Needham, Newell, Norton, Payne, Peirce, Pepper, Phillips, Porter, Powell, Presho, Safford, Shumway, Smith, Snow, Stockwell, Taylor, Thayer, Trask, Wells, West, White, Williams, Wise, Worden, and Yale.

The three volumes of Western Massachusetts Families in 1790 and the unpublished sketches online are an essential resource for New England research.

> Royal Families: Americans of Royal and Noble Ancestry, Volume Four: Pelham-Avery-West: Descendants for Nine Generations of Thomas West, 2nd Baron de la Warr: The Possible American Progeny of King Henry VIII, by Marston Watson (Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing Co., 2017.xv+901 pp., bibliography, index. A surprisingly large number of descendants of Thomas West, 2nd Baron de la Warr (ca. 1556-1602), and his wife, Anne Knollys, settled in the American colonies, and much work has been done on them. This book treats the couple as the first generation and traces their immediate descendants. After the third generation, however, the author devotes about two-thirds of the text to the descendants of Gov. John West of Virginia (no. 6) and the remaining onethird to the New England and New York descendants of Gov. West's nephew, Herbert Pelham of Massachusetts (no. 11), and Gov. West's great-niece, Anne (Humphrey) (Palmes) Miles (no. 14).

The possible descent from King Henry VIII alluded to in the title is through Anne (Knollys) West, daughter of Sir Francis Knollys and his wife, Catherine Carey. Catherine was ostensibly the daughter of William Carey and his wife, Mary Boleyn. However, Mary Boleyn (sister of Anne Boleyn) had been the mistress of King Henry VIII, and he may have been the father of her Carey children. This was first revealed in a ground-breaking 1997 article.

This is the fourth volume in this series; the three previous volumes treated the descendants of Gov. Thomas Dudley, Anne (Marbury) Hutchinson and her sister, Katherine (Marbury) Scott, and Samuel Appleton. As with the previous volumes, the citations are uneven; many are to secondary sources, some of unknown quality. Even though in a work of this length and complexity there are bound to be mistakes and omissions, this is an impressive work.

As noted on the website cited above, this book "presents nine generations of former California Genealogical Society's president Frederick 'Rick' S. Sherman's family as they moved from New England and Kentucky westward to California." The author had written most of the book before his unexpected death in 2008, so his family and members of the Society polished and indexed the manuscript.

Descendants of this family will enjoy paging through this account of their ancestors, particularly those of the first four generations, as there are dozens of photographs. The scope of the work extends through the seventh greatgrandparents of the author, many of them living in New England in the 1600s. Paragraphs for each ancestor appear in an ahnentafel format, though unfortunately without a conventional numbering system, which would have made following a line easier. Thus the index is indispensable.

While there is copious information on the later generations, some earlier ones are covered in more detail than others, reflecting the extent of the author's research and desire to describe interesting aspects of the person's life. Documentation is lacking, except for comments here and there in the text. However, readers looking for more data can consult the Sherman Manuscript Collection at the Society, a detailed description of which is in Appendix C.

Anyone considering compiling a book on one's ancestors could find much to emulate here.

This latest "silver book" treats the sixth-generation descendants of John Billington of the Mayflower plus the seventh generation - and occasionally the birth of the eighth. As with most of the other volumes in this project, documentation is a combination of abbreviated in-text citations and "sources cited" at the end of each family group. Two pages of additions and corrections to Volume 21, Part 1, are included.

This is the first sixth-generation silver book, and Part 3, not yet published, will complete the sixth generation for John Billington.

The Luke Ballard of Montgomery County is the author's ancestor on an entirely different line. Berkshire County deeds show that the Luke in Adams was a resident there at least from 1784 to 1793 . His wife's name appears as Elizabeth in three deeds (Berkshire County Deeds, Middle District, 27:213, 217, 219; Northern District, 3:131, 132, 293, 296). He owned land together with an Ichabod Ballard whose wife was named Rhoda. A Luke Ballard took the freeman's oath in Orwell, Vermont, 6 September 1808 (Orwell Deeds, 5:519, mentioned in Helen S. Ullmann, "Beyond the Printed Genealogy: Some Descendants of Sherebiah ${ }^{3}$ Ballard," Register 146 [1992]:120, which distinguishes between the two Lukes. The Luke Ballard of Orwell,

    What, then, explains Sanders's citation? In 1898 Sanders referred a fellow reader to the Cheshire Sheaf 2 (February 1882):312-313, which did set out three funeral certificates from Lansdowne MS 879: "[you] will find some particulars respecting Bishop Lloyd's ancestry in The Cheshire Sheaf, First Series, ii 312. These particulars are mainly extracted from the Lansdowne MS. 879" (Notes and Queries, 9th series, 2 [July-Sept. 1898]:195). The particulars which he mentions, including the Lloyd-Wilkinson marriage, however, did not come from the funeral certificates themselves, but from the editor's supplementary notes. Sanders read the notes back into the manuscript.
