

# New Counties


- Windham (1726) from Hartford and New London
- Litchfield (1751) from Hartford and Fairfield.
- Middlesex (1785) from Hartford, New Haven, and New London.
- Tolland (1785) from Windham

# Border Disputes

- 1713 – Connecticut sold land on the northern border line to Massachusetts for 683 pounds. The border towns continued to petition Connecticut for annexation.
- 1731 – border disputes between New York and Connecticut resolved
- 1749 – Connecticut Assembly decided the towns of Suffield, Enfield, Somers, and Woodstock fell within the charter's limits and were returned to Connecticut
  - Middlesex Gore (in Woodstock) was not annexed to Connecticut and remained part of Massachusetts

# Settlement (Pre-Revolution)

- Starting in 1759, New England Planters left for Nova Scotia
- 1763 - French and Indian Wars hamper efforts for interior settlement until conflict ends
- 1775-1783 - Loyalists leave for Canada, UK & Caribbean



# Revolutionary War

- Connecticut was known as the "Provisions State" due to the arms and manufacturing that contributed to the war effort
- Its coastline harbored privateers who would raid British ships
- Not occupied by British armies, but did experience several British raids
  - Fort Griswold in New London in 1781 was led by patriot-turned-traitor Benedict Arnold
- Nathan Hale became the official state hero of Connecticut






# Revolutionary War Statistics

- In June 1775, out of the 37,363 soldiers who enlisted in the Continental Army, 3,700 came from Connecticut



# Post-Revolution



- In 1788 Connecticut becomes a new state
- Westward migration begins into Ohio and other states; former soldiers claim bounty land

# The Connecticut Western Reserve

- Area in the Northwest Territory that was owned, sold, and distributed by the state of Connecticut after the American Revolution
- Western part was the fire lands
  - land reserved for people who lost property during the Revolution
- Eastern part sold to Connecticut Land Company in 1795 for \$1.2 million




# Slavery

- 1779 - Prime and Prince are the first enslaved persons to petition the General Assembly to abolish all slavery
- 1784 – Connecticut passes law for gradual emancipation; enslaved persons that are 25 years old and born after March 1st are freed
- 1790 – The federal census revealed that about half the population was still enslaved; of the 3,763 enslaved in New England, 2,648 lived in Connecticut
- Not officially abolished until 1848

- Originally recorded at the town level
- 1897 – Statewide registration began
- 1915 – General compliance

# Not Every Town is in Barbour Collection

- Bound volumes were not prepared for the towns of Bolton, Coventry, Enfield, Mansfield, New Haven, Norwich, and Vernon.
  - Published compilations of vital records had previously been prepared for these towns

New England's Hidden Histories is a project of the Congregational Library & Archives which has sought to locate, digitize, transcribe, and make freely accessible online the earliest manuscript records of Congregational Churches, Congregationalists, and Congregational organizations. Over the last 15 years, more than 100,000 pages of church records and personal papers have been digitized as part of the project, all of which are now accessible online for students, genealogists, scholars, and anyone interested in New England's early religious, social, and philosophical history.

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Congregational church records offer a rich and remarkable view of life in seventeenth- and eighteenth-century New England. Well before the writing of the Constitution each member in the early Puritan churches had an equal vote, with the power to govern themselves and to choose their own ministers. The records of these congregations document births, deaths, and marriages, but also open a window onto the lives of ordinary people deliberating on matters both sacred and secular. For much of the colonial period, church business was town business, and so beyond the usual information on births, deaths, and marriages, church records show ordinary people making decisions about property, taxation, and their representation in the larger affairs of the Commonwealth.

Many of the documents in New England's Hidden Histories are being made available to the public for the first time. Since 2005 the Congregational Library, in partnership with the [Jonathan Edwards Center](#) at Yale and many local churches across New England, has been rescuing old records from church attics and basements, and making them widely accessible through preservation and digitization. Many of the documents also include transcriptions.

We are regularly obtaining new documents. For the sake of clarity we have arranged New England Hidden Histories documents into three series, one dealing specifically with **records created by local churches**, another for **items created by individuals**, including sermons,



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## Series 1: Church Records

This series contains collections of church records documenting early Puritan, Congregational, and Christian (denomination) history in New England. These collections describe the founding and operating of these churches, their concerns, difficulties, and triumphs. They speak to the lives of their ministers, the events and concerns of their communities, the civil affairs of the town, and the lives of the people who sat in the pews.

In this series you will find records of: church meetings and votes; births, deaths, baptisms, and marriages; church discipline, including admonitions, confessions, censures, and excommunications; ecclesiastical council minutes. Of particular note are the personal conversion narratives, called "relations", found in several of the collections. These documents, prepared by any individual seeking church membership, offer insight into many under-documented populations including women, children, Native Americans, slaves, and indentured servants.

## The Collections

### **Abington, Mass. First Congregational Church (1714-1877)** TRANSCRIPTION AVAILABLE

The First Congregational Church of Abington, MA was established in 1711. The First Church in Abington also housed a Sunday school that was established in 1818 and is thought to be one of the oldest Sunday schools in the country. The motto of the church is "None too old to study the word of God!" In 1968, the First Congregational and the North Congregational Churches on Abington merged and reformed as the Church of Christ in Abington.

### **Barnstable, Mass. East Parish Church (1717-1816)** TRANSCRIPTION AVAILABLE

The East Parish Church in Barnstable was officially gathered in 1723 after the town of Barnstable was split into East and West Parishes in 1717. In 1836 the original meeting house was replaced by a new structure. This meeting house was destroyed by fire in 1905; construction on the third and final meeting house was completed in 1907. During the nineteenth-century the church joined the Unitarian movement and became the Barnstable Unitarian Church. The church continues to serve the local community today. This collection contains the earliest records of East Parish Church in Barnstable and includes meeting minutes, vital records, and records of church discipline.

## DIGITAL COLLECTIONS

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### **Lebanon, Conn. First Church and Society (1697-1796)**

Like many churches in early New England, people complained about the distance they had to travel to attend meetings. As settlement spread, more and more ecclesiastical societies sought to build their own churches and call their own ministers. The same was true in the town of Lebanon, Connecticut. This collection consists of petitions to create separate ecclesiastical societies within the town of Lebanon; discussions about location and fund raising for building meetinghouses; lists of ratable estates and taxes due; minutes of church meetings; deeds; pew rentals; repairs to the meeting house; and society meeting minutes.

### **Litchfield, Conn. South Farms Church (1781)**

In 1768 the South Farms Church was gathered in the recently designated South Farms Parish of Litchfield, Connecticut. In 1772 George Beckwith Jr. was installed as the first minister of the church. He was removed in 1781 after an ecclesiastical council found him guilty of adultery. The South Farms Church, now Morris Congregational Church, continues to serve the local community today. This collection contains the records of the ecclesiastical council which removed Beckwith from his ministerial duties at the South Farms Church.

### **Lyme, Conn. Second Church and Society (1767)**

The Second Society of Lyme, Connecticut, became the First Congregational Church of East Lyme when the East Lyme residents petitioned to have their own church so they did not have to travel so far on the Sabbath. Evidently in 1767 there was some sort of schism in the church, prompting someone to write up "The Last Will & Testament of the 2nd Scot of Lyme Sirnamed Niantic." The will is written with a great deal of sarcasm; the church bequeaths its ignorance, folly, knavery, and religion to various local congregations. The will is "witnessed" by Orange, Oswegotche and Spithead. The church is now known as the Niantic Community Church.

## Browse the First Church and Society records in Lebanon, Connecticut

### ^ Lebanon, Connecticut. First Church and Society records, 1697-1796.

The area which would become known as Lebanon was originally part of a Mohegan settlement called Poquechaneed. The town of Lebanon has its origins with the settlers of Norwich, Connecticut, who wanted to expand beyond the "nine miles square" they had bought from the Mohegan sachem Uncas. From 1663-1692, various parcels of land were deeded to settlers in the area by Mohegan rulers including Uncas and his son, Sachem Owaneco. The town of Lebanon was incorporated by the General Assembly of the Connecticut Colony on October 10, 1700, with the First Church and Society of Lebanon formed in the same year. Rev. Joseph Parsons was called as the first minister and served until 1708.

Nine men formed the original membership of the First Congregational Church of Lebanon, and the first meeting house was built in 1706. Rev. Samuel Welles was the church's second minister from 1711-1718, followed by Rev. Solomon Williams from 1722-1776. By 1724, northerly residents were less willing to travel and pay for the upkeep of a meeting house on the original location at the town common. The First Society's decision to replace the building in that year provoked these members to argue for its re-location to a plot of land owned by parishioner Jedediah Strong. Those living on the south side countered the northerners' requests by invoking an 'ancient agreement' which had been established by the town proprietors, in which it was verbally agreed that the meeting house should never be moved from its current locale on the town common.

The ensuing conflict over the meeting house's location, which lasted approximately 80 years, became known as "The Meeting House War." Church members formed two factions, known as the North Society (also sometimes referred to as the "village people") and the South Society, who lobbied for the meeting house to remain adjacent to the town common.

# 1798 Direct Tax

- Congress enacted a \$2 million direct tax to help fund a military if we went to war with France.
- Each state was required to create their forms and assess the value of property, including enslaved persons, and collect their portion of the tax
- The tax had 3 parts:
  - Dwelling houses more than \$100 were taxed based upon value
  - Slaveowners were taxed 50 cents per enslaved person between the ages of 12 and 50 who were not precluded from working based on permanent illness or disability
  - All other real property (i.e. "land"), dwelling houses less than \$100
- Original records are kept at the Connecticut Historical Society



Thomas Lyon, brother of Henry, ante, was b. abt. 1621, and d. at Greenwich, Fairfield Co., Conn., in 1690. He m. (1) Martha Joanna Winthrop, grandda. of Governor John Winthrop. Her father, Henry Winthrop came to America, but was drowned in Salem Harbor, July 2, 1630, the day after his arrival. His widow, with her infant da., Martha J., came to America the following year, and m. Robert Feake of Watertown, Mass., and after a few years they removed to Greenwich, Conn. Later, Mrs. Feake and her da. lived in Stamford, Conn., and here Thomas Lyon assumes the role of son-in-law.

Mr. Lyon m. (2) abt. 1654, Mary, da. of Simon Hoyt (Hoyt Family)

During the latter years of his life, Mr. Lyon lived in Rye, just over the Connecticut line, in what is now Port Chester, N. Y. He had two children by his first wife and eight by second wife Mary.

## Township Records at the Nova Scotia Archives

Search

The early township records held at the Nova Scotia Archives collectively provide the richest and most significant accumulation of community-based 'official' records surviving from the colonial period in this province. The database presented here offers concise information about the contents of **35 township books or record collections**, each township being one of a series of early communities established by the colonial government and scattered across mainland Nova Scotia.

On 12 October 1758, the Governor of Nova Scotia, Charles Lawrence, issued a proclamation to encourage settlement of the largely unpopulated colony for which he was responsible. Years of warfare, plus the catastrophic Grand Dérangement (Deportation of the Acadians) had resulted in the loss of almost the entire French-speaking population of Nova Scotia, and English-speaking colonists had never been numerous.

Governor Lawrence looked to the Thirteen Colonies, especially Massachusetts and Rhode Island,

#### Index to Loyalist Connecticut court records, 1776-84

This index covers the years 1776-84 and references 867 individuals who were in some way charged as a Loyalist during the Revolutionary War. These original documents are from various County & Superior Courts primarily from Fairfield, Hartford, Litchfield, New Haven, and New London Counties; Middlesex and Tolland Counties were created in 1785 and there is only 1 record from Windham County in the index. **Please keep in mind that this index is not comprehensive and additional information may be found within the un-separated files and records of each court.**

This index includes the surname and given name of the individual, residence, year of hearing, specific notes about the case, the Connecticut court where the case was heard along with drawer/box number where the original document is found. The bulk of the documents are either warrants for an arrest or a personal or Grand Jury complaint registered against an individual. Notes include such bits of information such as the person's rank, the reason for the charge, the verdict in the case, or a petition to reduce the sentence. Of particular interest are three "Negro" men who were accused of treason, and accusations against several men who lived out of state but owned land in Connecticut. Loyalism, not surprisingly, also seemed to run in families.

Perhaps as many as 50 000 or more individuals were Loyalists - estimates range from 30,000 to over 100,000. To be a Loyalist, one had to have been:

- > Either male or female, as of 19 April 1775, a resident of the American colonies, and joined the Royal Standard prior to the Treaty of Separation of 1783, or otherwise demonstrated loyalty to the Crown, and settled in territory remaining under the rule of the Crown; or
- > a soldier who served in an American Loyalist Regiment and was disbanded in Canada; or
- > a member of the Six Nations of either the Grand River or the Bay of Quinte Reserve who is descended from one whose migration was similar to that of other Loyalists.

However, there were others who qualified too – for example, if a Loyalist was killed in action, and his family then moved to Canada and settled around the time of the Treaty of Separation in 1783, they might qualify.

An objective of the UELAC is to develop a **directory of people of the Loyalist era, and to categorize them, especially those who met the qualifications as a United Empire Loyalist** and who earned the right, along with his heirs forever to the designation or post-nominal U.E., standing for Unity of the Empire.

In 2004 a project was begun by a few UELAC volunteers brought together into a Committee to organize and present Information on Individual Loyalists. The first phase entailed transcribing the UEL Executive List which was created by the government of Upper Canada in the late 1700's. That list has about 3,000 names but there is very little information for each individual.

Since then names have been added from several sources – the Loyalist certificates issued since 1871 by UELAC; a historic list of Loyalists of New Brunswick; a child's passenger list; and data from

# Naturalization Records

# First Naturalization Act (1790)

- Any free, white, adult alien, male or female, who had resided within the limits and jurisdictions of the U.S. for a period of 2 years was eligible for citizenship
- Applicant would apply to any court in any one of the states where they resided at least one year
- Citizenship was granted to those who showed they were of good moral character and took an oath of allegiance to the Constitution
- Children under 21 years automatically became citizens if they had a parent who successfully naturalized

# Naturalization Act of 1795

- Increased period of residence from 2 to 5 years
- Applicants were required to declare publicly their intention to become citizens of the United States and to renounce any allegiance to a foreign prince, monarch, state, or sovereignty 3 years before admission as citizens
- Immigrants who had any hereditary titles or of the nobility class were also required to renounce that status

# Searching for Naturalization Records

- New England Petitions for Naturalization Index, 1791-1906
  - Index cards created for each immigrant that indicate when they naturalized, what court, what country they were from, where they live, and the reference information to find the naturalization records
- Search at the county level where the person resided in FamilySearch for any digitized naturalization records
- Contact county courthouses to check their naturalization indexes and court minutes that are not digitized

This is an index to photocopies of naturalization documents filed in courts in Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont from 1791 to 1906. The index consists of 3x5 inch cards arranged by state and thereunder by name of petitioner, arranged according to the soundex system. The index refers to the name and location of the court that granted the certificate of naturalization, and to the volume and page number (or certificate number) of the naturalization record. - A project was started to rebuild the War Department Papers, led by Ted Crackel; the project team visited more than 200 repositories and about 42,000 documents collected and scanned
