To find your ancestor's place of origin in Ireland, it helps to understand the history of Ireland at the time they left. What was pushing them out of their homeland? Studying the migration paths and settlement patterns of our ancestors can serve as clues for discovering the origins of our Irish ancestors.

Migration to 1775

Political refugees 1798 rebellion	Chain migration – follow one's family and friends

1717-18	Boston and then to New Hampshire and Maine Ports of Philadelphia and Charleston, SC
1725-1729	Southeastern Pennsylvania
1740-1741	Port of Philadelphia and the Great Valley
1754-1755	North Carolina
1771-1775	Carolinas
1749	Nova Scotia, Halifax
1760-1765	Nova Scotia, Truro, Londonderry, Pictou, Granville

Population growth	Work – canal building, timber
Sub-divided land plots and landlord consolidating holdings	Group settlement activities
Agrarian terrorism	Land
Political refugees 1798 rebellion	

Famine to 1880 Migration

More emigrants went to the U.S. rather than Canada, in part because the 1847 emigration experience resulted in high death rates on “coffin ships.” Typhus and then cholera infected many of the 1847 passengers to Canada. The diseases spread to Quebec and Montreal and prompted the imposition of a head tax on immigrants in 1848.
