### **Naturalization Records**

1. Exact birthplace...sometimes!
2. Connect naturalization to arrival
3. Clarify personal name variations

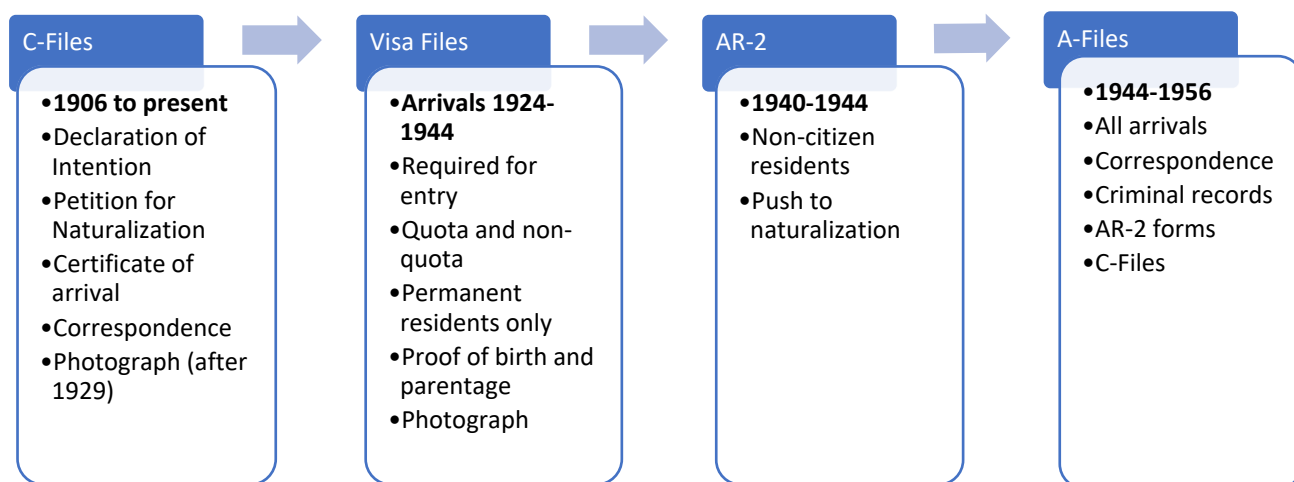
1. Naturalization (C-Files)
2. Visa Files
3. A-Files
4. Alien Registration
5. Passports

### **What are the best sources to locate an ancestor's birthplace?**

1. Naturalizations: More accurate and reliable after 1906. Court of jurisdiction and the United States Citizenship and Immigration Service (USCIS).
  - State and federal records for specific localities indexed at major genealogical websites.
  - Court records available through the FamilySearch.org catalog.
2. Visa files: proof of origins required.
3. A-Files: groups multiple immigration records into a single file. Highly likely to contain an exact birthplace.
4. Alien Registration Forms: Very few survive from WWI, but the WWII-era records include the specific birthplace.
6. Passports: vary in detail, but often include the specific birthplace and naturalization information.

### **What if my ancestor was not naturalized, or naturalized before 1906?**

1. Research extended relatives. Perhaps their naturalization or passenger record will include specific information for their shared origins.
2. Accumulate as many records as possible: military, vital, gravestone, newspapers.
3. Expect variations in reported birthplaces and names. There was no standardized convention for anglicizing Yiddish or Hebrew names (not every Moshe became a Morris!).
