#### **Naturalization Records**

### What are the best sources to locate an ancestor's birthplace?

- 1. Naturalizations: More accurate and reliable after 1906. Court of jurisdiction and the United States Citizenship and Immigration Service (USCIS).
  - State and federal records for specific localities indexed at major genealogical websites.
  - Court records available through the FamilySearch.org catalog.
- 2. Visa files: proof of origins required.
- 3. A-Files: groups multiple immigration records into a single file. Highly likely to contain an exact birthplace.
- 4. Alien Registration Forms: Very few survive from WWI, but the WWII-era records include the specific birthplace.
- 6. Passports: vary in detail, but often include the specific birthplace and naturalization information.

## What if my ancestor was not naturalized, or naturalized before 1906?

- 1. Research extended relatives. Perhaps their naturalization or passenger record will include specific information for their shared origins.
- 2. Accumulate as many records as possible: military, vital, gravestone, newspapers.
- 3. Expect variations in reported birthplaces and names. There was no standardized convention for anglicizing Yiddish or Hebrew names (not every Moshe became a Morris!).
