Cluster Research (Use the F.A.N.)

1. Family Members-
 - a. Those with the same surname
 - b. Others too: In-Laws, Cousins, Grandparents, Great-Grandparents, and step siblings
2. Associates-
 - a. Persons: politics, religion, education, and occupation
 - b. Places: place of birth or death
3. Neighbors-
 - a. Persons who share the same address
 - b. Persons from the same neighborhood, town, or county
 - c. Same cemetery plot or neighboring church pews

Witnesses and Sponsors

Look for members of your ancestor's F.A.N.

- Witnessing a legal document (ex. land deed, will)
- Witness to a wedding
- Godparents at a baptism
- Providing an affidavit for a military file or homesteading claim
- Providing sworn testimony in court (ex. naturalization petition)

Keeping Organized

- Five generation charts
- Family group sheets
- Family tree software
- Annotated research log

Using Cluster Research for Immigrant Origins

- Step #1 – Start with the known
 - Gather as much information found in the U.S. as possible
 - Review vital records, census records, naturalization records, draft registration cards, etc.
- Step #2 – Pull together family members
 - Use census records to identify any family members that immigrated to the U.S. besides your ancestor (siblings, parents)
 - Examine neighbors
 - Identify maiden name of mother
 - Review church records for godparents/sponsors/witnesses



- Step #3 – Track siblings forward
 - Research where siblings migrated to
 - Use newspapers, probate records, land deeds to locate details
- Step #4 – Research in Ireland
 - Use web sites like RootsIreland and IrishGenealogy.ie to locate vital records, baptisms for family members identified

Identify and Research Candidates

- When the paper trail goes cold, identify candidates with same surname living within the same townland or county of your ancestor
- Identify the candidate's family members
- Track their children forward
 - Look for those that emigrated. Where did they end up?
 - Look for marriages on sites like www.irishgenealogy.ie and rootsireland.ie

RootsIreland.ie Tips

- In addition to searching by county, search by parish (if known) to narrow results
- Enter an approximate year or leave blank to see all results
- If no baptism or birth record found, search for marriage records to help verify parents
- Note: These are transcriptions. Always seek out the original record.

IrishGenealogy.ie Tips

- This site has the civil records for births, marriages, and deaths. For church records, use RootsIreland first.
- Use the more search options feature for an advanced search screen
- Search by mother's surname for births
- Search by 2nd party to locate a specific marriage if you know of one party's surname
- Click on image to see the original – has more details than the transcription. If image not available, you can purchase a copy. See web site for details.
- Use the 1851 townland index to identify registration district for searches

- Ask questions in Facebook groups to gain assistance with your genealogy brick wall
- Use county specific Facebook groups to identify local resources. Groups are listed on Katherine Wilson's genealogy Facebook group list - socialmediagenealogy.com/genealogy-on-facebook-list/
- Interact with other genealogists on platforms like Twitter and Instagram
- Tell a story about your ancestor through social media or blogging – this is cousin bait!
