Assess What's Available

- Research the towns where your ancestors lived to understand what records survived and where to
 access them

Types of Repositories

- USC Office (Urzad Stanu Cywilnego) is a Civil Records Office
 - o Typically store records less than 100 years
- Regional Archives

Types of Records

- Census Records
- Metrical Books
 - Vital records, usually recorded by local churches
- Tax Records
- Revision Lists
- Emigration Records
- Internal Passports

- Military Records
- Duma Lists
 - Lists of eligible voters who participated in elections for Russian Parliament
- Other Voter Lists
- Cemetery Records
- Synagogue Records

FamilySearch

- Finding Jewish Records by Town
 - Search for the town under "Place" in the catalog <u>https://www.familysearch.org/search/catalog</u>
 - o Review the different categories available
 - **Important:** Don't discount Church Records; Metrical books for Jewish people were recorded by local churches.



- Finding Jewish Records by Country
 - Search for "Jewish Records" in the Catalog under the town or region where your ancestors lived
 - o Search for "Jewish Records" (Search by keyword) in the Catalog

JewishGen.org

- Search by a combination of surname and locations to identify resources available that may pertain to your family
- Use the Family Finder database to identify other researchers searching that same surname. You may find new cousins in the process!

- Contact a local university's foreign language department to ask about students/faculty who can assist with a request
- Hire a professional genealogist or translator through the Association of Professional Genealogists website

Tips for Hiring a Researcher

- Do your homework on finding a researcher that can travel to the archives that you need records from that are not digitized.
 - The Association of Professional Genealogists (https://www.apgen.org/cpages/home) has an online directory that you can search by location and expertise on. Many genealogists will list what archives they regularly go to.
 - Regional societies may have an approved list of researchers (ex. Polish Genealogical Society of America)
 - o Pick someone with a closer proximity to archives to cut down on travel costs.
- Set a clear expectation on hours and budget that you're willing to pay for.
- Review prior work samples before signing any contracts and agreeing to any financial terms or wiring money.
- Ask for references.
- Discuss hourly costs and what the final product should look like.



Hiring the Archive

- Archivists will have institutional knowledge of their holdings. However, they may not be thinking
 of other records that can be searched that are held in their repository.
- If you are ordering specific records, it may be more cost effective to order directly from the archive. Many archives will email you the records after receiving payment.
- Archive wait times may be significantly longer than hiring a researcher.
- You may deal with some language barriers if the archivists do not correspond in English.
