




What is NARA?

- National Archives and Records Administration
 - Established in 1934 as the nation's record keeper
 - Mission: "... to provide public access to Federal Government records in our custody and control"







NARA Records

- Created by a federal agency, bureau, commission or on behalf of the federal government
- Determined to be important for legal or historical reasons (2%-5% of all federal records created each year)
- By the numbers:
 - Textual records 13.3 billion
 - Maps, chart, architectural drawings 10 million
 - Photographs 44.4 million

Record Hierarchy

- Record Groups (RG): documents from a specific federal agency, bureau, or commission
- Collections: Artificial grouping of records from different RGs for
- Series: Documents accumulated and used by the agency for a specific time or purpose
- **File Unit:** Group of documents within a series
- **Item:** Smallest archival unit, for example a report, or letter

African Americans - Reference Reports

Records created by post-Civil War Federal agencies are perhaps some of the most important records available for the study of African American genealogy. Reconstruction-era Federal records document the black family's struggle for freedom and equality and provide insight into the Federal government's policies towards the nearly four million African Americans freed at the close of the American Civil War. The records help bridge the gap for the transitional period from slavery to freedom. African American Reference Reports describe research strategies for some of the most frequently used records relating to African American genealogy, including service in the United States Colored Troops (USCT), Buffalo soldiers, District of Columbia emancipation records, the Freedmen's Bureau, Freedman's Bank, and WPA Slave Narratives.

Patients and Staff at the Freedmen's Hospital, Washington, DC, in the Federal Censuses, 1870–1940

The Freedmen's Hospital in the District of Columbia was established in 1862. In 1863, Dr. Alexander Augusta, the head of the Freedmen's Hospital in Washington, DC, became the first African American to head a hospital. By 1869, the hospital relocated to the grounds of Howard University where it served as a teaching hospital. In 1975, the Freedmen's Hospital became Howard University Hospital.

Enumerating the Staff and Patients

The Federal census for the District of Columbia includes information about individuals living at institutions. This included the staff and patients at the Freedmen's Hospital. The hospital appears as the Freedmen's Hospital in 1870. In 1880, it appears as the Freedmen's Hospital Grounds. The 1890 census schedule is no longer extant. The hospital is listed as the Freedmen's Hospital in the 1900–1930 census schedules. From 1870 to 1930, census schedules list both the patients and staff of the hospital. The following information will help you locate the enumeration of the Freedmen's Hospital among the records.





Census Records

Census records can provide the building blocks of your research. The first Federal Population Census was taken in 1790, and has been taken every ten years since. Because of a 72-year restriction on access to the Census, the most recent year available is 1950. The **1950 Census** was released on April 1, 2022.

The National Archives has the census schedules available from 1790 to 1950, and most have now been digitized by our digitization partners. Family researchers generally find it most helpful to begin with the most current census and work backwards as a strategy for locating people in earlier generations.



Experienced genealogical researchers use clues found in one record to find **other** records about the same individual. This page describes some of the clues found in census records.

Date of birth

- The 1900 census (column 7) indicates the person's month and year of birth; the 1850-1880 and 1910-1940 censuses indicate the person's age.
- The 1870 census (column 13) and 1880 census (column 7) indicate the month in which the person was born, if born "within the year," that is between June 1, 1869 and May 31, 1870 for the 1870 census, or June 1, 1879 and May 31, 1880, for the 1880 census. The official census day was June 1 in both 1870 and 1880, although the enumerator may have visited the household at a later date.
- While the person's age is not an exact date of birth, it at least provides a "ballpark" figure useful (1) for tracking the person from one census to the next, especially if other people have the same name, and (2) for locating the person in any existing vital records.

Place of birth

• The 1850-1940 censuses indicate the person's state or country of birth, which helps narrow the geographic scope of search for the specific town of birth.

Date of marriage

- The 1850 census (column 10), 1860 census (column 11), 1870 census (column 14), and 1880 census (column 12) indicate whether the person had married within the
 year.
- "Within the year" means during the year before the official census day, that is, between June 1, 1849 and May 31, 1850, for the 1850 census; between June 1, 1859 and May 31, 1860, for the 1860 census; between June 1, 1869 and May 31, 1870, for the 1870 census; and between June 1, 1879 and May 31, 1880, for the 1880 census. The official census day was June 1 in each of these census years, although the enumerator may have visited the household at a later date.
- The 1900 census (column 10) and 1910 census (column 9) indicate the number of years of marriage for each married person.

Number of children

The 1900 census (column 11) and 1910 census (column 10) indicate how many children were born to each woman. The 1900 census (column 12) and 1910 census (column 11) indicate how many of those children were still living. These clues can help determine whether the researcher has identified all children in a given family, and whether any were deceased when either census was taken.

Naturalization Records

Naturalization is the process by which an alien becomes an American citizen. It is a voluntary act; naturalization is not required.

Prior to September 27, 1906, any "court of record" (municipal, county, state, or Federal) could grant United States citizenship. Often petitioners went to the court most geographically convenient for them. As a general rule, the National Archives does not have naturalization records created in state or local courts. However, a few indexes and records have been donated to the National Archives from counties, states, and local courts. Researchers should contact the National Archives facility serving the state in which the petitioner resided to determine if records from lower courts are available. In certain cases county court naturalization records maintained by the National Archives are available as microfilm publications. Records from state and local courts are often at state archives or historical societies.

In an effort to assist patrons seeking dual citizenship to understand what the National Archives can and cannot assist them with, we've compiled some of the most frequently asked questions.

Beginning September 27, 1906, US naturalization law imposed a fee structure that encouraged the transfer of naturalization to Federal courts. It took time for the lower courts to let go of the practice, so researchers may need to look at lower courts if the National Archives does not maintain a record of naturalization from the early-mid 20th

In general, naturalization was a two-step process* that took a minimum of five years. After residing in the United States for two years, an alien could file a "declaration of intention" ("first papers") to become a citizen. After three additional years, the alien could "petition for naturalization" ("second papers"). After the petition was granted. certificate of citizenship was issued to the new citizen. These two steps did not have to take place in the same court. [*Exceptions can include cases of derivative citizenship, processes for minor aliens 1824-1906, and special consideration for veterans.]

If a naturalization took place in a Federal court, naturalization indexes, declarations of intention (with any accompanying certificates of arrival), and petitions for naturalization will usually be in the National Archives facility serving the state in which the Federal court is located. No central index exists.

To ensure a successful request with the National Archives researchers should include:

- · name of petitioner (including known variants);
- · date of birth;
- · approximate date of entry to the US;

What is in the National Archives Catalog?

The National Archives holds historical U.S. government documents (federal, congressional, and presidential records) that are created or received by the President and his staff, by Congress, by employees of Federal government agencies, and by the Federal courts in the course of their official duties.

The National Archives Catalog contains descriptions for NARA's nationwide holdings in the Washington, DC area; regional facilities; and Presidential Libraries. The Catalog is a work in progress and currently contains descriptions for 95% of our records, described at the series level. This means you can find basic information about the records, including size and location, from the description. Additionally, every week we are adding more file unit and item descriptions, many of which include digital files.

Typically descriptions in the Catalog do not include individuals' names; however, the National Archives still might have records about your ancestors. It may be necessary to








Record Hierarchy

Record Group

- Comprises the records of a major government entity
 Series
 - Records with the same function or created by the same activity
 File Unit
 - An organized unit of documents grouped together either for current use or in the process of archival arrangement.
 Item
 - The smallest archival unit (e.g. a letter, memorandum, report, or photograph).

Searching for Names

- Full name in first name, surname order (preferred) but some additional records returned if use surname, first name order
- Surname only
- Variant spellings (wildcards only allowed at end of word)
- Consider Americanized version of first name, e.g. Joseph for Guiseppe
- Consider whether your ancestor participated in an event, search for that
