





First the Promise

To enlistees in the Continental Army:

That Congress make provision for **granting lands**, in the following proportions: to the officers and soldiers who shall so engage in the service, and continue therein to the close of the war, or until discharged by Congress, and to the representatives of such officers and soldiers as shall be slain by the enemy



Acts Authorizing Bounty Land Warrants

- Bounty Land Acts 1788, 1803, 1806, 1850, 1855.
 - These acts awarded land for service
 - 1788 allowed soldiers to sell/assign their award to someone else
 - Information about land received under these acts often combined in Revolutionary War pension files, if applicable


Application Survey Patent Possession

- Federal Agencies
 - Secretary of War reviewed applications and issued warrants
 - Treasury Department supervised selection of land and issued patents
- State Agencies
 - Unique to state


- Serviceman submitted affidavits from commanding officers or fellow soldiers
- Submitted discharge papers
- If soldier died during service, heirs could file with documentation that they were legal heirs of the deceased

Warrant Authorizing a Survey



- Warrants issued date of issuance, name and rank of veteran, state from which he enlisted
- Usually the state picked the land; Virginia allowed the soldier to choose


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Assignment

- If soldier with a warrant could not take up residence, he sold the warrant for cash
- Rules varied by state and over time
- Federal warrants could be assigned beginning in 1788


Print published 14 Oct 1814 by G. Thompson showing Washington, DC under attack

- Destroyed bounty application files have been replaced by cards
 - Name of veteran, rank, unit, warrant number, numbers of acres granted, date issued, assignee
- National Archives (NARA)
 - Applications: M804 Revolutionary War Pension and Bounty Land Warrant Application Files 1800-1900
 - Warrants: M829 Revolutionary War Bounty Land Warrants Used in the U.S. Military District of Ohio and Related Papers



War of 1812 Bounty Land

- Located in present day states of Arkansas, Illinois and Missouri (Michigan was planned but not fulfilled)
- First and Second Acts: 24 December 1811 and 11 January 1812 for 160 acres for soldiers and non-commissioned officers
- Act of 10 December 1814
 - Provisions for soldiers enlisting after 1814
 - 320 acres of land

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Later Bounty Land Acts

- 27 July **1842** Could use 1812 warrant for land outside of the three areas set aside
- 11 February **1847** for one year's service in Mexican War, 160 acres
- 28 September 1850 War of 1812 and Indian Wars
 - Nine months of service 160 acres
 - Four months of service 80 acres
 - One month of service 40 acres
- 22 March **1852** Removes restriction on assignment for all warrants
- 3 March 1855 Extended land benefits to groups previously not covered, including Native Americans.



Land Entry Case Files

What is a land entry case file?

- These are records that document the transfer of public lands from the U.S. government to private ownership
- The National Archives holds over 10 million land entry case files that cover 30 public land states!

Which States Were Not Included as Public Land?

- Original 13 colonies
 - Connecticut, Delaware, Georgia, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Virginia
- Hawaii, Kentucky, Maine, Tennessee, Texas,
 Vermont, and West Virginia

What Types of Land Entry Case Files Exist?

- Military Bounty Land Warrants
- Pre-1908 General Land Entry Files
- Post-1908 General Land Entry Files

Military Bounty Land Warrants

• Filed by the year of the congressional act that authorized the warrant, number of acres granted, and warrant number

Records Before July 1908

- Organized by state, land office, type of entry (ex. Credit, cash, homestead, timber, and mineral), and final certificate number
- Large portions of these files are NOT organized by name
- Seven States Index (Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Florida, Louisiana, Nevada, and Utah)
- Includes Canceled or Relinquished Land Entries

Records After July 1908

- Regardless or state or type, organized in one large series by a serial patent number
- The National Archives holds name indices that include the patent number through the mid 1950's.
- The Bureau of Land Management district office would need to be contacted for records after mid-1950's

Cash Entry Files

- Most land entries after the Cash Act of 1820 was passed and before the Homestead Act of 1862 were direct cash purchases
- The purchaser did not have to be a citizen, provide proof of residency, or improvements on the land.
- In the 1830's and 1840's, preemption laws required proof that the entryman met specific requirements







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












Locating Tract Books on FamilySearch

Bureau of Land Management Tract Books

- Contain the records of each parcel of land transferred from federal to private ownership in 28 of the 30 federal land states
 - > The tract books for Alaska and Missouri are lost.
- Volumes are organized by state, in some states by land offices, and then by township number and range.
 - ➤ Within each volume, entries are arranged by Section, Township, Range.
- Use the Coverage Table on the FamilySearch wiki to identify which volume to find the corresponding tract book.

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United States Bureau of Land Management Tract Books, 1800-c. 1955


Description

3,907 tract books containing official records of the land status and transactions involving surveyed public lands arranged by state and then by township and range. These books indicate who obtained the land, and include a physical description of the tract and where the land is located. The type of transaction is also recorded such as cash entry, credit entry, homesteads, patents (deeds) granted by the Federal Government, and other conveyances of title such as Indian allotments, internal improvement grants (to states), military bounty land warrants, private land claims, railroad grants, school grants, and swamp grants. Additional items of information included in the tract books are as follows: number of acres, date of sale, purchase price, land office, entry number, final Certificate of Purchase number, and notes on relinquishments and conversions. Original documents are located at the Bureau of Land management in Springfield, Virginia.





Introduction

The land records that are generally of most interest to genealogists are the land entry case files. These are records that document the transfer of public lands from the U.S. Government to private ownership.

There are over ten million such individual land transactions in the custody of the National Archives. These case files cover land entries in all 30 public land states.

The case files were filed as either military bounty land warrants, pre-1908 general land entry files, or as post-1908 land entry files. The information required to access and order copies of the records will differ depending on which of these 3 categories the transaction falls into.

Accessing Land Entry Records

Land entry files (land patent files) are records of the U.S. General Land Office (GLO) that document the initial transfer of public lands from the U.S. Government to individuals, businesses, and institutions.

The National Archives Building in Washington, DC (Archives 1), houses land entry files from the 30 Federal public land states (all states in the United States except the original 13 states, Vermont, Kentucky, Tennessee, Maine, West Virginia, Texas, and Hawaii). These records are part of Record Group 49, Records of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

The information required to access and order copies of land entry files will differ depending on the type of land entry file.

Types of Land Entry Files

Land entry files at Archives 1 are divided into three rough categories: (1) surrendered military bounty land warrants, (2) pre-1908 general land entry files, and (3) 1908 and later land entry files.

Researchers can search the BLM's GLO Records website to find the information needed to request each type of land entry file. Note that the GLO Records website only indexes patented or completed land entries. The site does not index cancelled land entries or expired leases.

The broadest range of land entry files at Archives 1 record the day-to-day business of the GLO field branches to approximately 1908.

These records include credit files (up to about 1820), cash files (from 1820 on), homestead files (from 1862 on), and related records for both patented and cancelled land entries.

The following information is needed to request pre-1908 land entry records on site at Archives 1:

- State
- Land office
- Type of patent under law*
- Patent number**



*In the GLO Records database, the type of patent is generally listed in the "Authority" field.

**In the GLO Records database, the patent number is generally listed in the "Document Nr." field.

Select homestead records have been digitized and made available online through Ancestry.com (database title: "U.S., Homestead Records, 1863–1908"), Fold3.com (database title: "Homestead Records (NE)"), and FamilySearch.org (database title: "U.S., Homestead Final Certificates, 1863–1909").

Federal Land Records: Bounty Land, Land Entry Files, and Homesteading 1908 and Later Land Entry Files

Beginning in July 1908, the GLO revised its system of issuing patents, assigning each consecutive patent issued a unique number instead of assigning numbers by state and land office.

To request a serial land patent file on site at Archives 1, researchers only need the **serial patent number**. Serial patents at Archives 1 range from approximately 167 to 1,242,597.

In the GLO Records database, the serial patent number is generally listed in the "Accession Nr." field. The "Issue Date" will be July 1908 or later.

Serial land patent files can also be ordered remotely by using NATF Form 84 \(\mathbb{\beta}\) or placing an order online.

Note: While the serial land patent files at Archives 1 can include documents dating as late as the early 1970s, files dating from the early 1960s on are often housed at the appropriate NARA regional facility.

Homesteading

The Homestead Act

- Signed in 1862, this law allowed any American (or immigrant pursuing the citizenship process) to purchase up to 160 acres of federal land.
- The law was not fully repealed until 1986, when it expired in Alaska. All previous states had repealed the law by 1976.
- Buyer was required to live on the land for five years and perform necessary upkeep and additions.
 - ➤ Civil War Union veterans could use time served in military towards the residency requirement.
 - ➤ Settlers could also acquire the title of land if they lived on the land for 6 months and paid the government \$1.25 per acre.

Eligibility

- Adults 21 years and older
 - ➤ Single women
 - > Former enslaved people
 - >(1868 14th Amendment was passed)
 - > Immigrants
 - ►1st papers required (declaration of intention)

The Process

- Go to the local land office.
- Pay a small filing fee (\$10)
- Live on the land and grow crops for 5 years.
- After the 5 years, file for the patent (land title). Pay the last fee (about \$8).
- If approved, patent was awarded.



Homestead Acts

- Southern Homestead Act of 1866
 - ➤ Included and encouraged African Americans to obtain a homestead
- Timber Culture Act of 1873
 - Claimant required to plant trees
 - ➤ No residency requirement
- Kinkaid Amendment (1904)
 - > 640 acres to new homesteaders in western Nebraska
- Enlarged Homestead Act (1909)
 - ➤ Doubled acreage from 160 to 320 acres in marginal areas
- National Stock-Raising Homestead Act (1916)
 - ➤ Granted 640 acres for ranching purposes

Dawes Act

- Passed in 1887 under President Grover Cleveland
- Allowed the federal government to divide tribal lands. Native Americans who accepted the division were allowed to become U.S. citizens.
- 160 acres of farmland or 320 acres of grazing land was granted to the head of each Native American family.
- To receive allotment, enroll with the Office of Indian Affairs. Their name went on the "Dawes rolls".





U.S., Homestead Records, 1863-1908








The Exodus of 1879



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in 1878, homesteaded and became a champion for education in the community.

Kirtley believed that owning land was key to building self-sufficiency.

He secured rights to a preemption claim located three miles southwest of Nicodemus, and after six months, he filed on this claim of 160 acres. He built three sod houses and later a frame building. Kirtley secured his patent in 1888 and remained on his land for sixty years.

Kirtley saw education as a right of all full and equal citizens and a path to self-sufficiency. He brought with him to Nicodemus two Bibles, an elementary speller, and an unabridged dictionary. He insisted that Nicodemus's children had the right to learn, and he







- Many land entry case files contain copies of the naturalization papers that were filed by the applicant.
- Applications also list details about an ancestor's birthplace.
 - ➤ Pre-1906 naturalization records often list the name of the country with no specifics on county or townland.
