Immigration to the U.S.

Periods of immigration to 1924



- Several waves of immigration
- Different motivations and primary nations of origin for each wave
- Each wave bigger than the previous, generally
- Estimated more than 35 million immigrants between the colonial period and 1924

Periods of immigration to 1924

1607-1640

- *Primarily from:* British Isles
- *How many:* 100,000
- *Main reasons:* religious persecution, establish new settlements
- “Great Migration”

Periods of immigration to 1924

1640-1783

- *Primarily from:* British Isles, Holland, Germany, Africa
- *How many:* 750,000
- *Main reasons:* religious persecution, opportunity to own land, Industrial Revolution, slave labor
- Colonial period

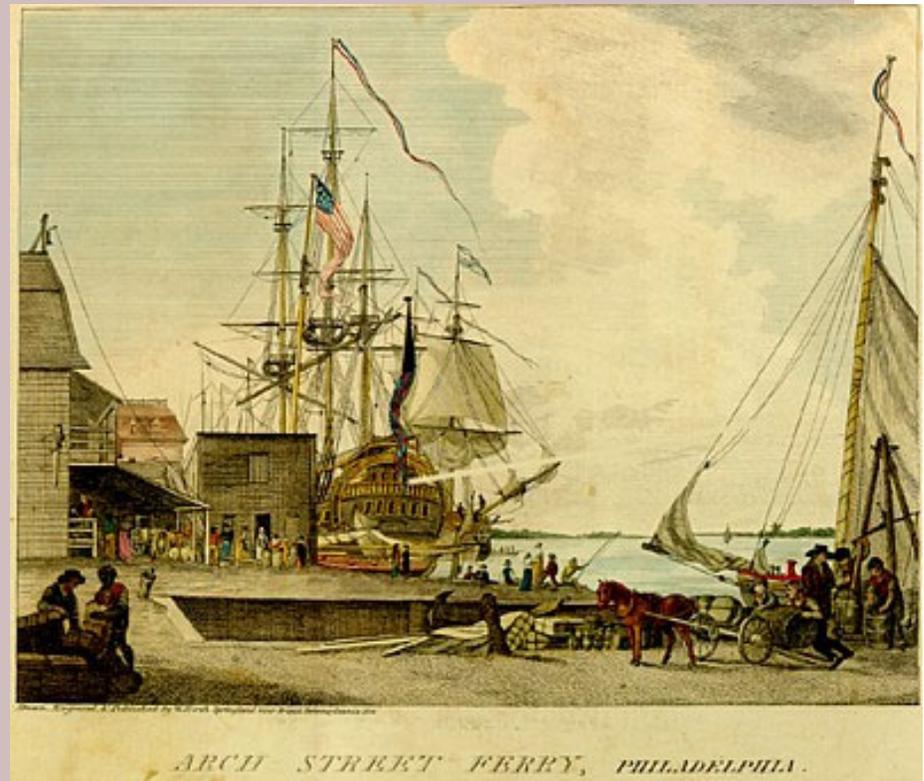

1783-1815

- *Primarily from:* British Isles, Holland, Germany, Scandinavia, Africa
- *How many:* 250,000
- *Main reasons:* Industrial Revolution, opportunity to own land, escape from war, slave labor
- Early national period

Periods of immigration to 1924

1815-1860

- *Primarily from:* British Isles, Holland, Germany, Scandinavia, Switzerland
- *How many:* 5 million
- *Main reasons:* opportunity to own land, escape from war, escape from famine
- Antebellum period

Periods of immigration to 1924

1860-1890

- *Primarily from:* British Isles, Holland, Germany, Scandinavia, Switzerland
- *How many:* 10 million
- *Main reasons:* opportunity to own land, promise of a better life

Periods of immigration to 1924

1890-1924

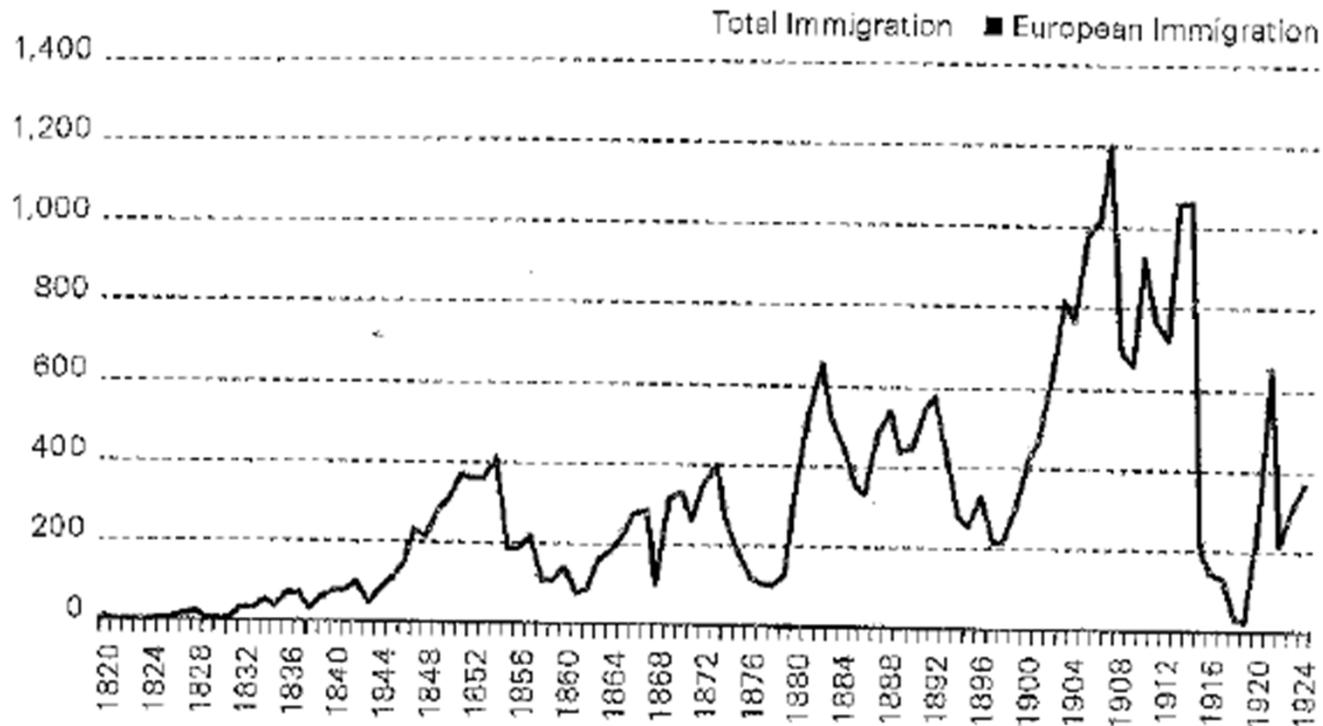
- *Primarily from:* Austria-Hungary, Italy, Russia, Greece, Turkey
- *How many:* 15 million
- *Main reasons:* promise of jobs, higher wages
- *Peak years*

- Humanitarian relief (refugees and displaced persons)
- Bracero program (seasonal agricultural workers)
- Family reunification
- Recruitment of skilled workers

Ports of Arrival

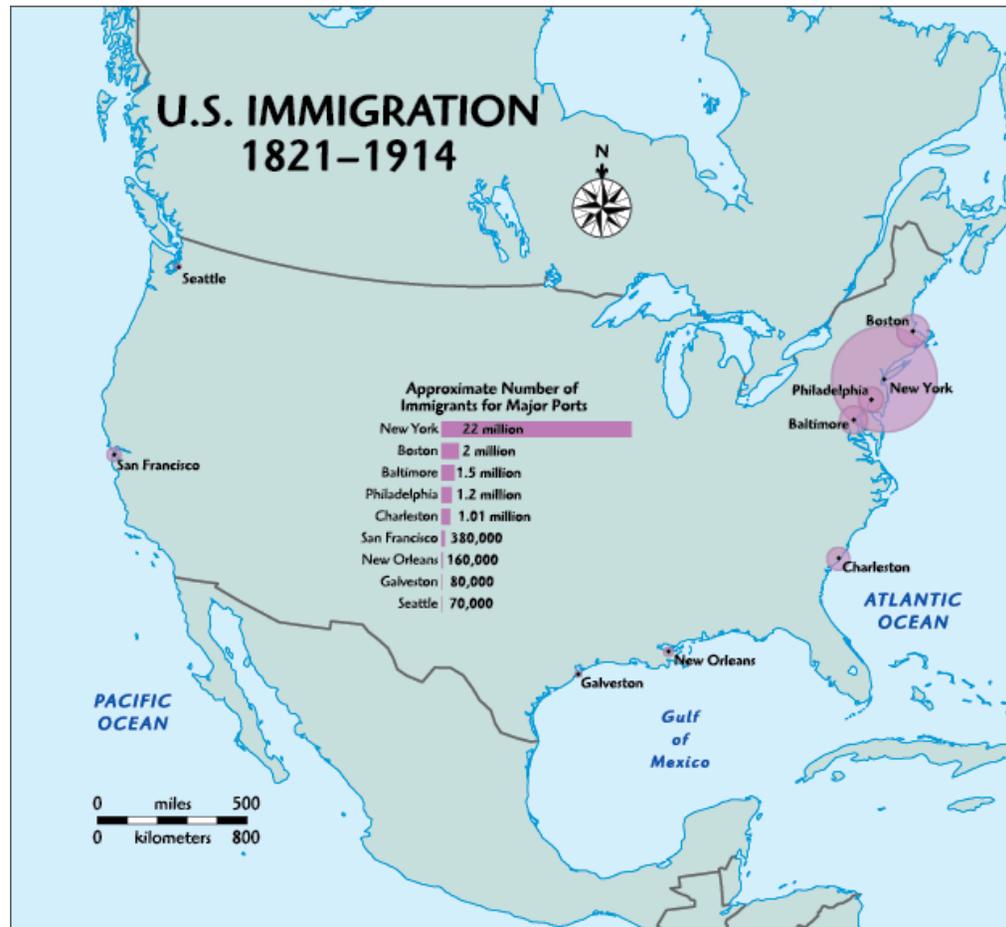
Ports of Arrival

- The vast majority of immigrants to the U.S. came through the port of New York
 - 75% entered through NYC
 - Next-most popular were East Coast ports
- Other ports were located elsewhere on the East Coast, on the West Coast, in the Gulf of Mexico, and Great Lakes
 - About 96 ports total, many small with relatively few arrivals
- Many immigrants bought ship passage to Canada (cheaper) and crossed overland to the U.S.

Ports of Arrival

- NYC and East Coast: European immigrants with destinations anywhere in the U.S.
- Southern East Coast: European immigrants with destinations in the Southern U.S.
- Gulf Coast: European immigrants with destinations in the Midwest
- Great Lakes: European immigrants with destinations in the Midwest
- West Coast: Asians, Australians, South Americans—typically with destinations in the Western U.S.

Hawaii

- Passenger lists dating back to ca. 1843

- *Hawaii, Honolulu Passenger Lists, 1900-1953* [FamilySearch.org]
- Chinese, Japanese, Filipino, Portuguese

What is a passenger list?

Passenger Lists

- Also called a passenger manifest, ship's manifest, arrival list
- Contains names of those traveling aboard a ship
- Information typically collected by the shipping agency at the port of departure (not the port of arrival)
- Separate lists for crewmembers

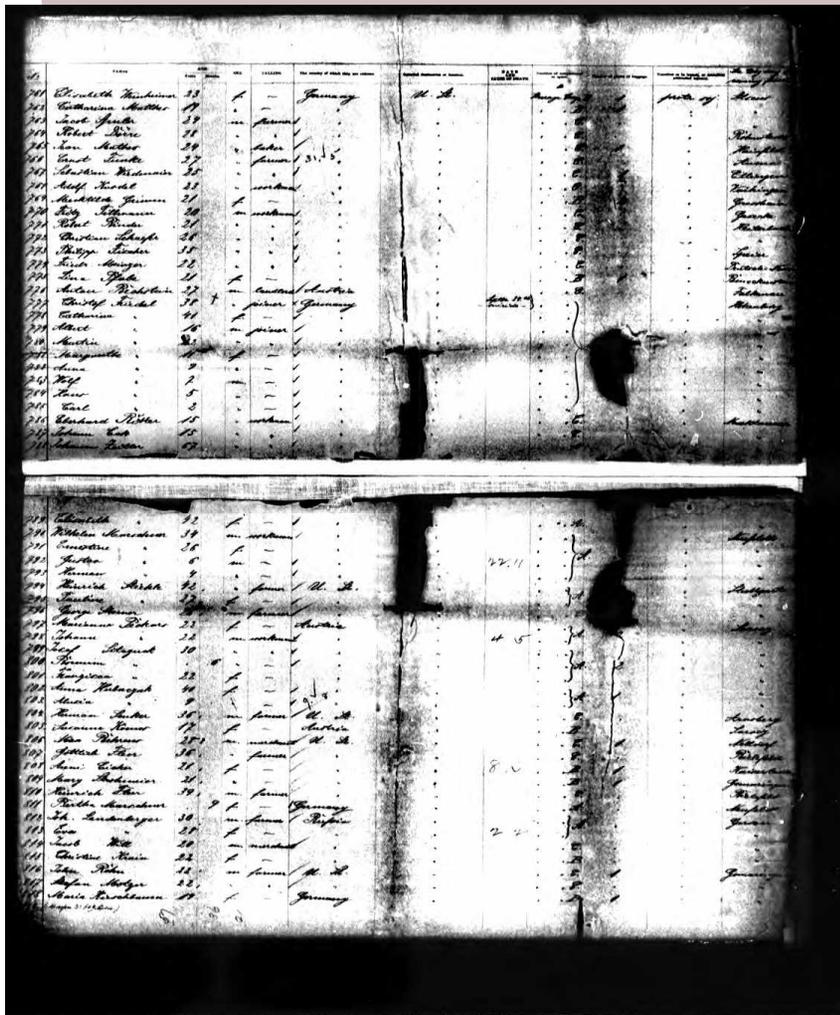
Passenger Lists

- Earlier lists contain little detail
- Later lists contain more detail
- Laws passed throughout the 19th century dictated what information was to be collected

- What we typically think of are the “Customs Passenger Lists” which begin in 1820

Passenger List Myths

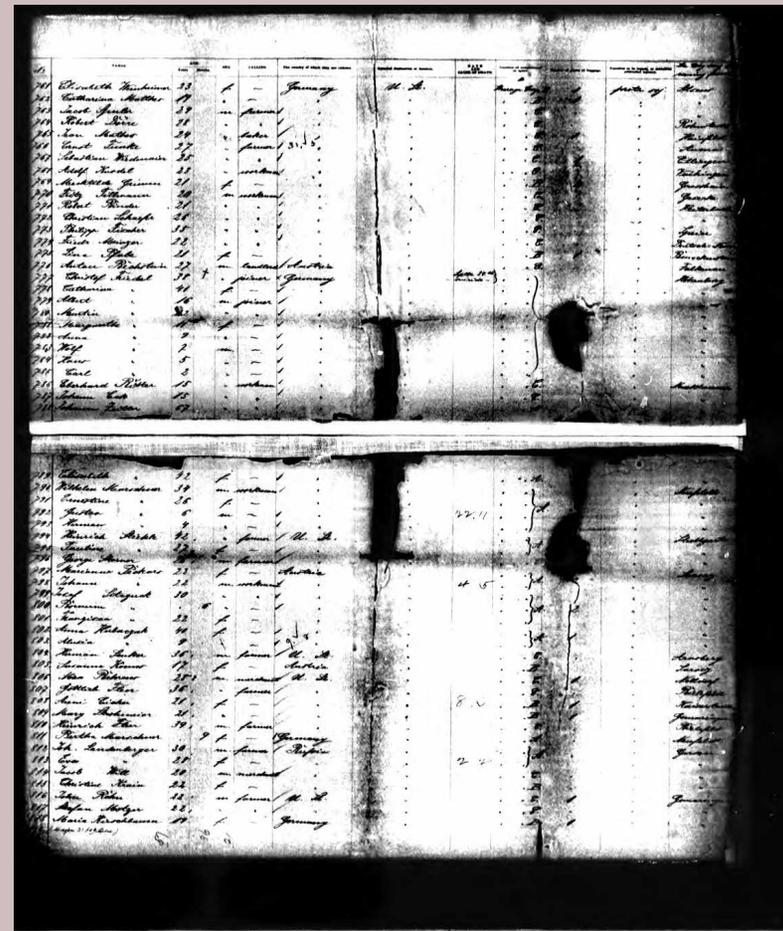
- Passenger lists survive for all ships
 - Particularly false for early arrivals: very few pre-1820 lists, even some gaps after 1820
- Passenger lists are perfect and complete
- Passengers participated in creation of the lists
- Passenger lists were created upon arrival or debarkation
- There is a “book of names” at Ellis Island

Passenger Lists as Sources

- Published vs. unpublished
 - Whether or not the transcription or index appears in a book
- Transcribed vs. original
 - Database transcription or index vs. image
 - As with all genealogical sources, the best option is to view the original image
 - Problems with transcriptions: misreading or misinterpreting the original, human error when creating the transcription resulting in a misspelling, all details not being included in the transcription

- Post-1819 passenger lists held by NARA
- Searchable databases on Ancestry.com, FamilySearch.org, StatueOfLiberty.org, and other websites
- Books and other publications

Published Passenger Lists

- Books and journals
- Typically, multi-volume sets focused on one ethnicity or nationality; one port; or a particular span of years
 - *Germans to America 1850-1897.*
 - *Armenian Immigrants: Boston 1891-1901, New York 1880-1897.*
 - *Passenger Lists for Galveston, 1850-1855.*
 - *The Famine Immigrants: Lists of Irish Immigrants Arriving at the Port of New York, 1846-1851.*
 - LOC bibliography for more titles

The passenger lists include name of vessel, ports of embarkation and arrival, date of arrival, and the names of 7,300 passengers--their ages, sex, and often the place of last residence, and final destination.

Published Passenger Lists

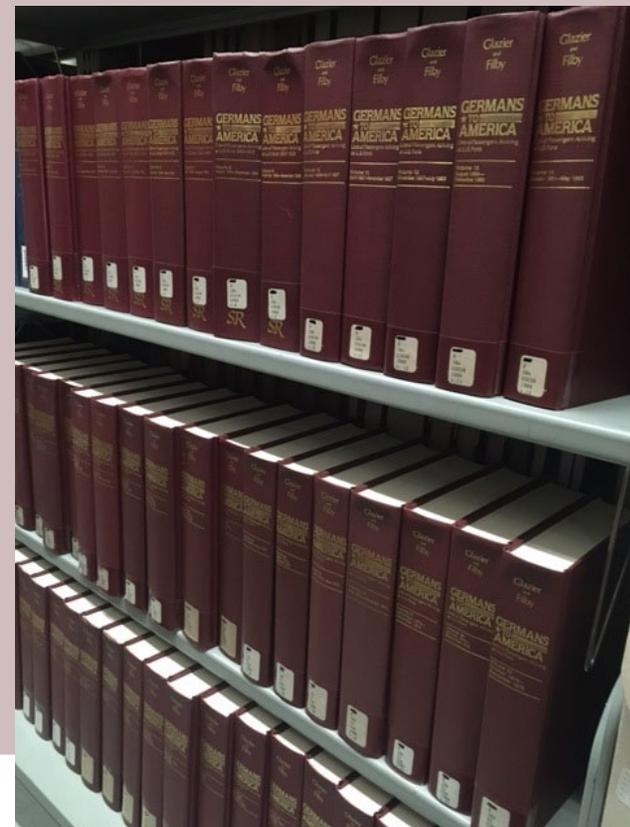
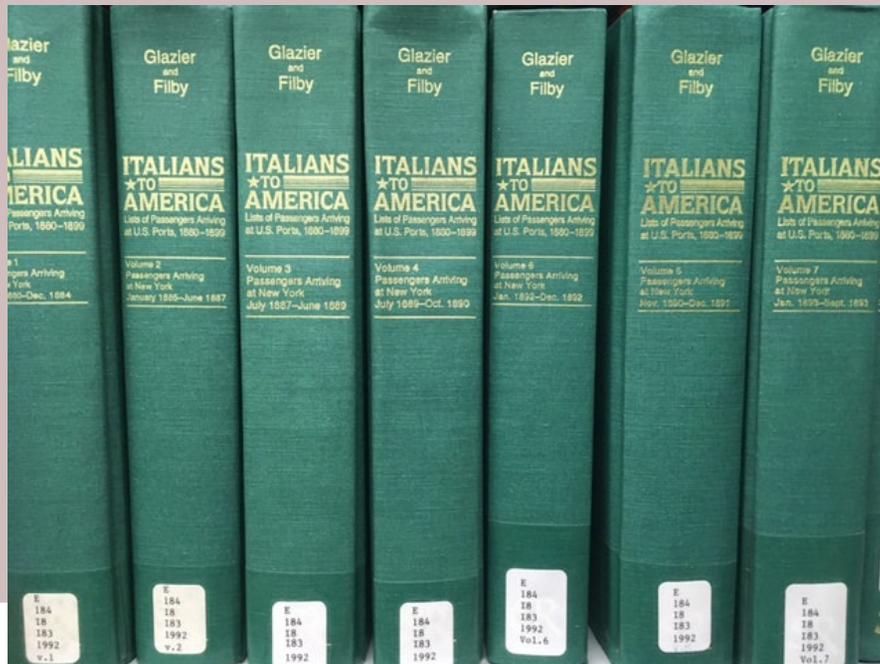
- *Germans to America* 1850-1855 (first phase)
 - Includes complete passenger lists with 80% “German surnames” and therefore includes some passengers that are *not* German *as well as* immigrants from France, Belgium, the Netherlands, etc. with German-sounding names
 - Numbers of names included in the book do not match the total number of German immigrant arrivals based on official numbers reported for those years

Published Passenger Lists

- Some are now available as searchable databases on Ancestry.com or FamilySearch.org, e.g.:
 - *United States Germans to America Index, 1850-1897* [FamilySearch.org]
 - *U.S. and Canada, Passenger and Immigration Lists Index, 1500s-1900s* [Ancestry.com]

Published Passenger Lists

- Typically contain transcribed passenger lists in chronological order with an alphabetical index of names

Searching Passenger Lists

- General rule: to find your ancestor on a passenger list, you need to know their full name, when they immigrated, and how old they were at the time
- Bonus info: where they entered, and where they came from

U.S. Laws Regarding Passenger Lists

Port of Philadelphia

- Required to provide Captains' Lists of immigrant passengers beginning in 1727
- Arrivals from Continental Europe, largely German, Dutch, Swiss and French
- Pre-Revolution lists do *not* include those from the British Isles
- Often names of women and children were omitted

Customs Bureau

- 1789: Customs Bureau tasked with overseeing U.S. ports
- Eventually leads to the “Customs Passenger Lists”

Steerage Act of 1819

- Required ship captains to report names, ages, sex, and occupations of passengers to U.S. Customs
- Limited the number of passengers per ship tonnage
- Established minimum requirements for provisions
- Effective 1 January 1820
- Created “Customs Passenger Lists”

Carriage of Passengers Act of 1855

- Repealed the Act of 1819
- Regulated conditions aboard the ship (space, ventilation, cleanliness, provisions) and imposed fines for noncompliance
- Continued the passenger list obligation from 1819, but also required that the part of the vessel in which the passenger traveled be reported

Passenger Act of 1882

- Repealed the Act of 1855
- Required that captains report to Customs “the name, age, sex, calling, and native country of each emigrant passenger, or passengers other than cabin passengers, and their intended destination or location, and the number of pieces of baggage belonging to each passenger, and also the location of the compartment or space occupied by each of such passengers during the voyage.”

Immigration Act of 1891

- Created the Office of the Superintendent of Immigration and transferred control to the federal government
- Formalized inspection of passengers
- Barred polygamists, persons convicted of “crimes of moral turpitude,” and those with contagious diseases
- Required information be collected about overland immigrants from Canada and Mexico (border-crossing records)

Immigration Act of 1893

- Revised inspection of passengers
- Expanded the passenger information collected by shipmasters

Table 2. Information in the Immigration Passenger Lists
Required by the Act of 1893

1. Full name, age, gender, whether married or single
2. Calling or occupation
3. Whether able to read or write
4. Nationality
5. Last residence
6. U.S. port of landing
7. Final destination, if any, beyond port of landing
8. Whether having a ticket to such final destination
9. Whether the immigrant paid for his own passage
10. Whether in possession of more than 30 dollars and the amount if 30 dollars or less
11. Whether going to join a relative. If so, what relative and his name and address
12. Whether ever in the United States before, and if so, when and where
13. Whether ever in a prison or almshouse or supported by a charity
14. Whether a polygamist
15. Whether under an express or implied contract to perform labor in the United States
16. Condition of mental and physical health and whether deformed or crippled, and if so, how

Immigration Act of 1903

- Also known as the Anarchist Exclusion Act
- Excluded four “inadmissible classes” from entering the country: anarchists, epileptics, beggars, and importers of prostitutes
- Expanded the information collected under the Act of 1893

Immigration Act of 1924

- Also known as the Johnson-Reed Act or National Origins Act
- Required all noncitizens arriving in the U.S. to present a visa when applying for admission
- Imposed quotas per year
- Visa records: another source in addition to the passenger list

Other Immigration Acts

- 1875: Banned immigration of felons
- 1882: Chinese Exclusion Act
- 1885: Banned contract laborers
- 1917: Banned people from many parts of Asia and immigrants over 16 who are illiterate
- 1921: Imposed temporary quotas

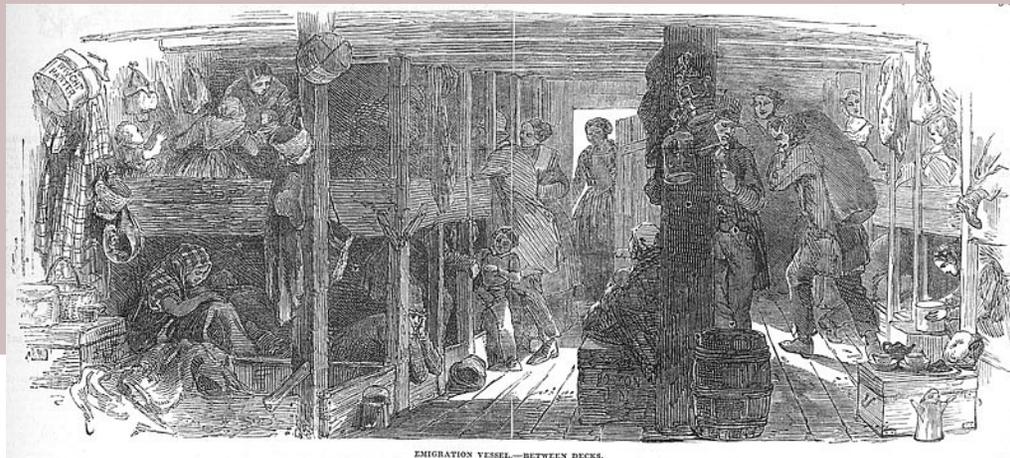
The Ship Experience

Ship Technology

- Early immigrants arrived on cargo ships
 - First passenger ships used in the 1830s
- Wind-powered ships dominated to the mid-1860s
- Sail to steam: slow transition
 - First transatlantic steamship arrived in NYC in 1838
 - Hybrid ships first, with both sails and steampower
- Transition from wood-clad ships to iron-clad
- By the end of the 1800s, travel time reduced from 2-3 months to one week

Steerage Class

- Cabin passengers (first and second class) and steerage (third class)
- Steerage also sometimes called *'tween* because it was the in-between deck
- Typical 19th century steerage experience: “[the steerage deck] was just four or five feet high, perhaps six if the immigrants were fortunate. The only fresh air came from hatches...”

Maritime Terminology

- Sailing ship: ship powered by sails/wind only
- Steamship: ship powered by steam
- Packet: a ship that carried cargo and passengers and had a regular schedule, used 16th-19th century
- Ocean liner: ocean-going vessel designed primarily to transport passengers, but also sometimes mail and cargo, used 19th-20th century
- Shipping line: company that transports passenger or cargo (Cunard, White Star, etc.)

Maritime Terminology

- There are many different classes/types of ships based on size, configuration of masts, etc.
 - You may come across these terms reading shipping registers or shipping news

Outgoing Passenger Lists

- Lists of passengers leaving on a particular ship
- Different than the lists turned over to U.S. Customs/U.S. Immigration Office
- U.S. did not require departing passenger lists
- Departure lists available for the U.K. (1890-1960), Hamburg (1850-1934), and Bremen (1904-1914, 1920-1939)
- Emigrant indexes available for many parts of Germany (but not passenger lists)

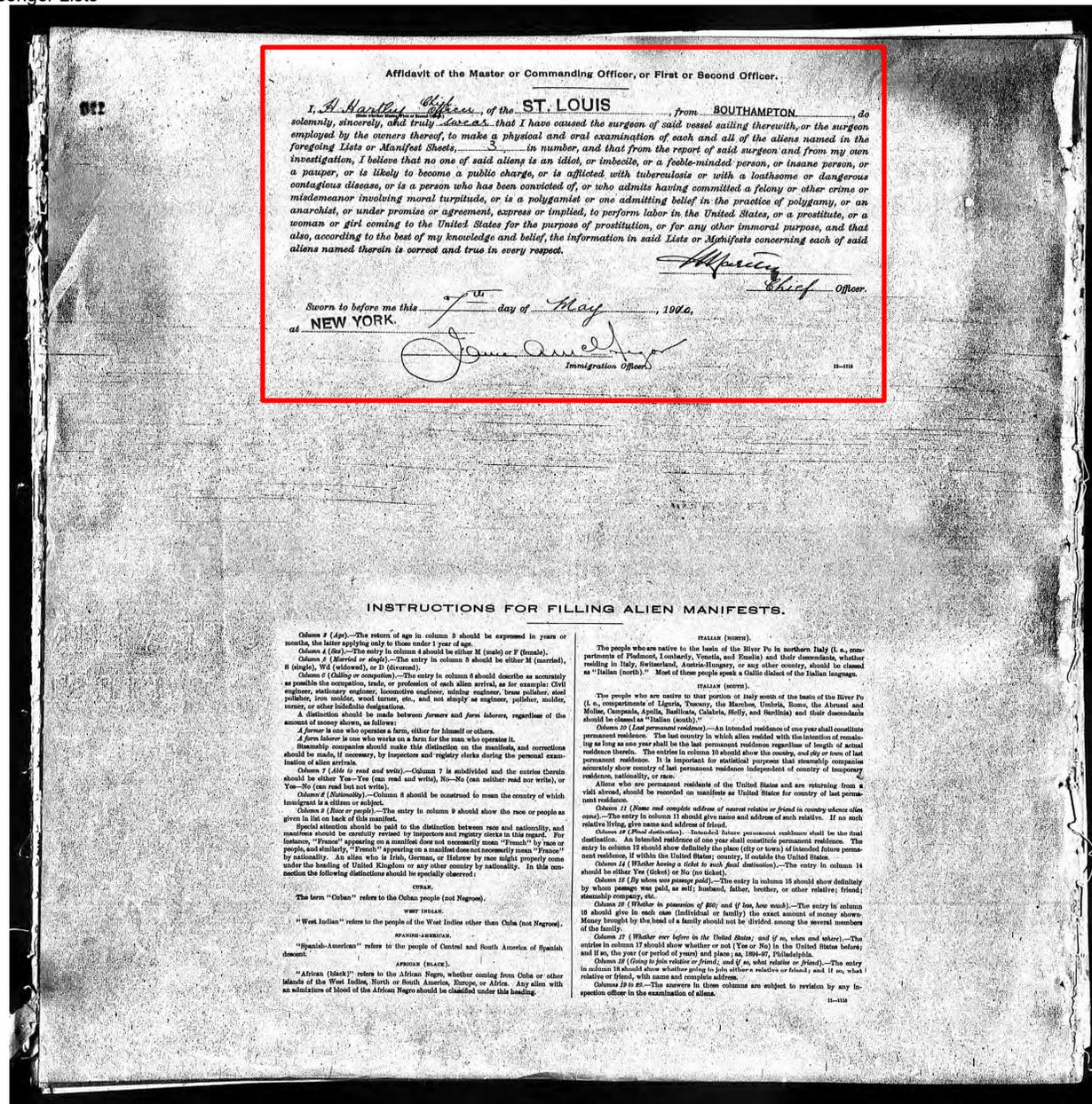

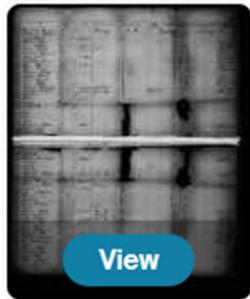
Shipmaster affidavit, *China*, 1870

- Port arrivals might name the cabin passengers, give the total number of passengers on board, list the number of births and deaths at sea, or give the total length of the journey

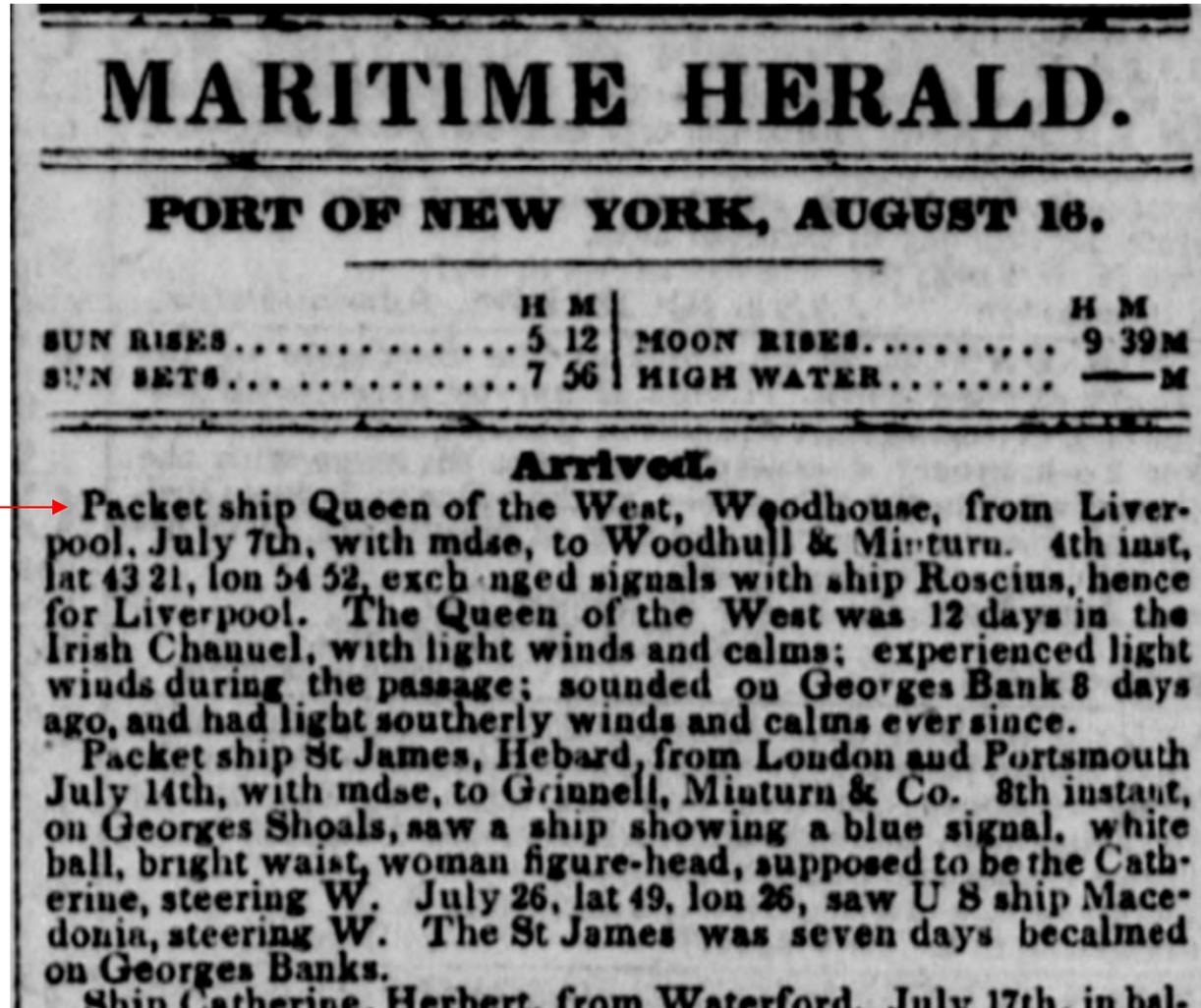

Maritime Disasters

- Passenger lists, though created at the port of departure, were turned in at the port of arrival so NARA will not have a record of a ship that was destined for a U.S. port but never arrived
- May find newspaper accounts with names of passengers (or descriptions of unclaimed persons)

Registers of Ships

- Lloyd's Register, Germanisches Lloyds Register, American Lloyd's, etc
- Created to classify ships and determine their condition for insurance purchases
 - Tonnage, materials, type of ship
- Earliest registers (Lloyd's) date to 1764

Lloyd's Register

- First published in 1764 in England
- Published yearly since 1778 with a few exceptions
- Beginning in 1776, all ships received a grade, with A1 being the highest
 - Purpose: provide information about risks to insurance underwriters
- After 1870s, supposed to include all sea-going merchant ships of 100 tons or greater, whether or not they were surveyed by Lloyd's

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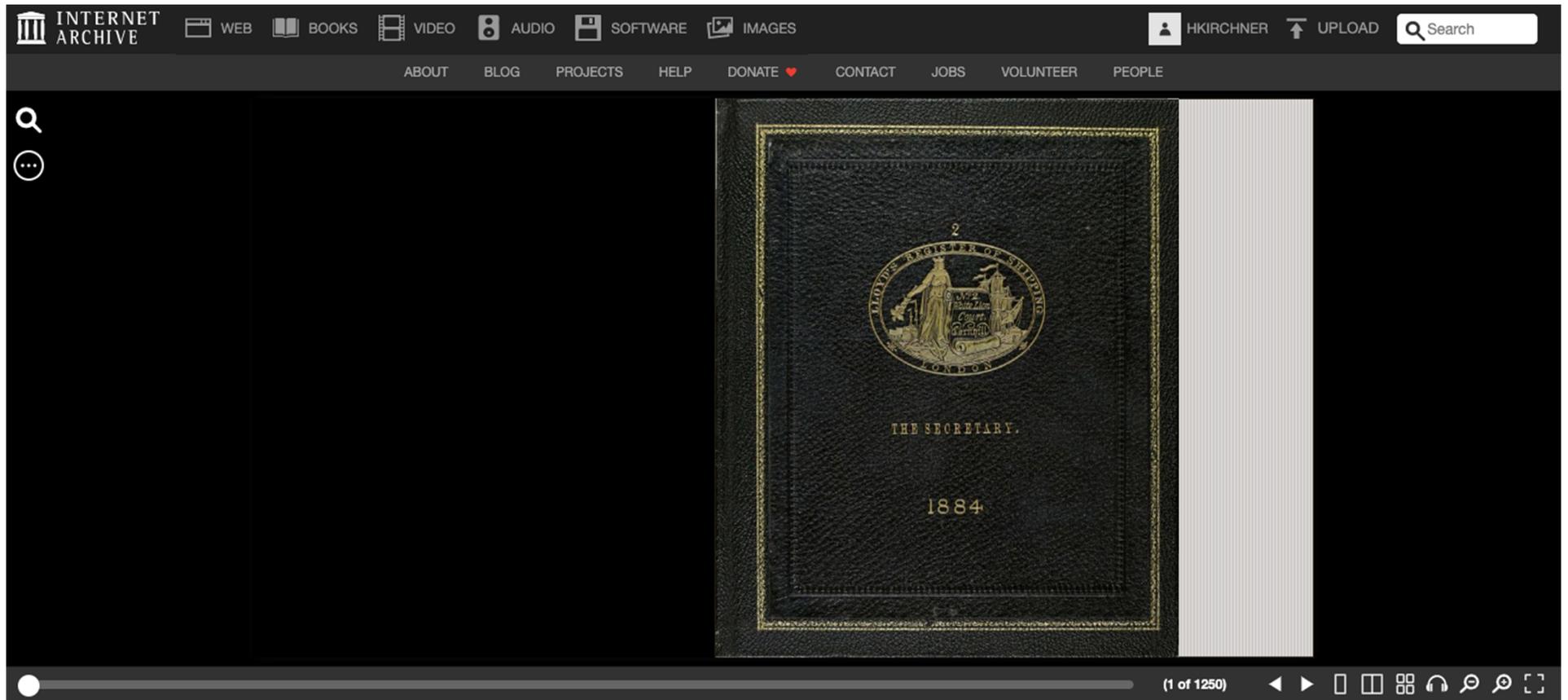

Defects or inefficiency in masts or rigging of a Sailing Ship sufficient to imperil the vessel's safety are indicated by a black ring over the figure 1.

Vessels RESTORED to, or CONTINUED on, the Character A, will have the number of years for which they are Restored or Continued, with the name of the Port of Survey, inserted separately under the number originally assigned, in the twelfth column; thus—Rest.Lon.50-5yrs, or Cont.Liv.50-3yrs. Where the term in the case of Continuation has expired, the letter "C" only will be placed before the figure denoting the number of Years for which Continuation had been allowed; thus—C3.

Vessels opened as required by the Rules, will be marked in the Register "S.S." with the number of years that may elapse before they are again opened, and the year of survey; thus—"S.S.Cly.50-4yrs." (See Section 61.)

Vessels marked "S.S." with a date, in red, denote that they have been surveyed at that time in accordance with the Rules, Section 60; thus—"S.S.Sid.50-5yrs" (in red ink).

The mark [B.S.] denotes that the vessel is classed subject to Biennial Survey. The mark [Expl. B.S.] denotes that the vessel is built Experimentally, and classed subject to Biennial Survey. (See Section 31.)

The mark *l.s.* with a date, denotes that the vessel has been submitted to Triennial Survey as prescribed by Rules for Iron Ships; thus, *l.s.* 50.

The marks *l.s.* No. 1-50 — *l.s.* Hul. No. 2-50 — *l.s.* Lon. No. 3-50 denote that the vessels have been submitted to periodical surveys, as prescribed in the Rules for Iron Ships.

The initials *H.T.* (*Half-time*) with the date of Survey prefixed, thus—*H.T.* Lon. 50, denote that the Half-time or intermediate Survey required by the Rule, Section 34, has been held.

The figures in the thirteenth column, to vessels in the classes A in red, *E* or *E* class, imply that they were originally classed A, for that number of years. The cipher 0 in this column indicates that (from inferior construction) there were no "number of Years first assigned."

The Italic letters in the thirteenth column refer to similar letters corresponding with the numbers for equipment in Table No. 22 for chains and anchors.

The broad Δ signifies that the vessel is built of Iron.

The note * prefixed to Δ , thus—* Δ , signifies that the vessel has been built with heavier plating than the Rules now require.

Ships built under Special Survey as per Section 35 of the Society's Rules will be shown by a cross, \times . (See Section 28.)

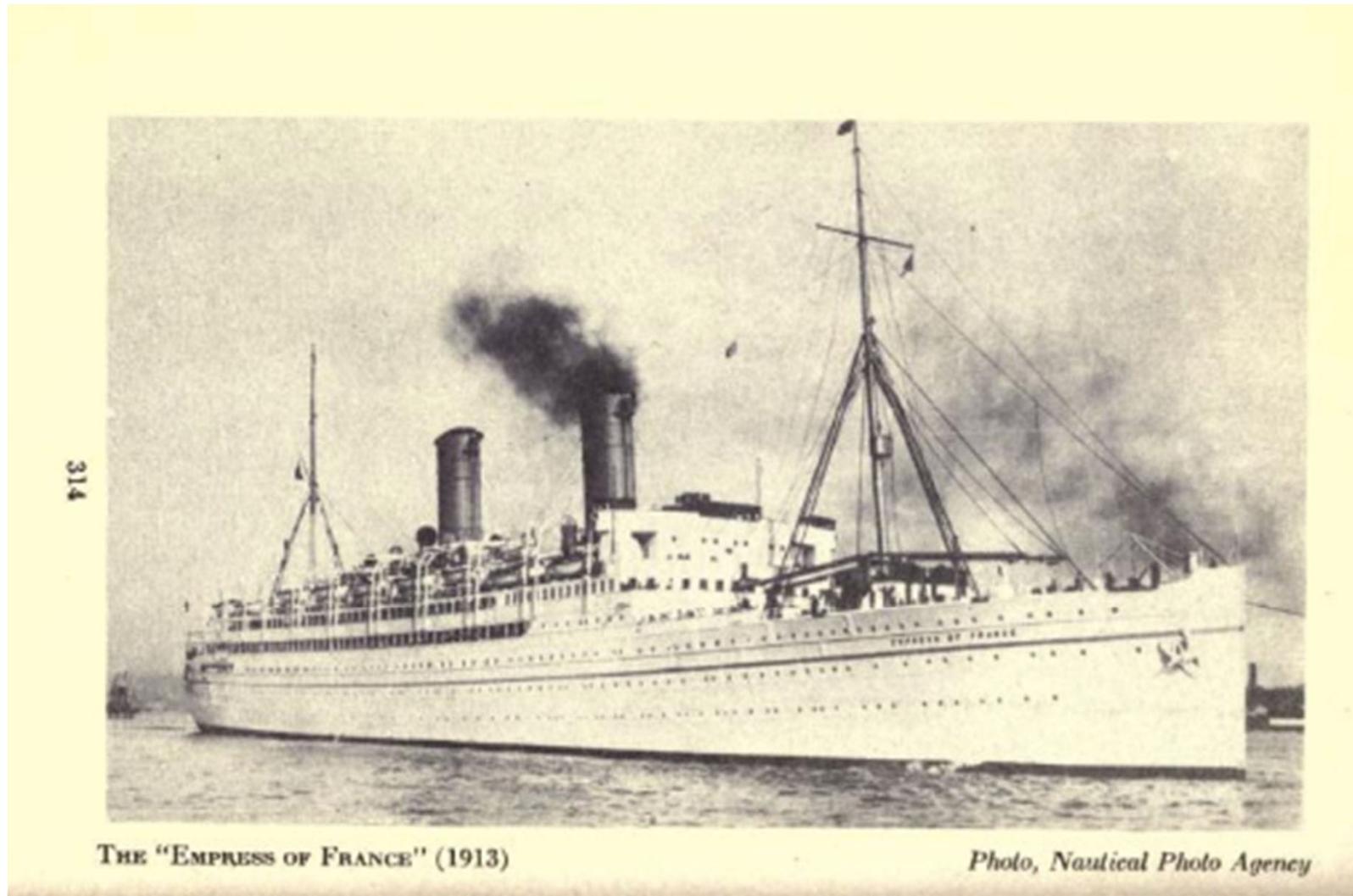

and two funnels. **Ex-Omar, ex-Koningin Luise.** Broken up by shipbreakers after being sold to Italy in 1935.

Egypt (1871) National Line.

Built by Liverpool Shipbuilding Co. Tonnage: 4,670. Dimensions: 440' x 43'. Single-screw, 12 knots. Four masts and two funnels. She frequently made voyage from Queens-town to Sandy Hook in nine days. Later listed as of 5,089 tons gross. Burnt at sea on July 19, 1890 with no loss of life. Note: Her running mate was the **Spain**.

Eider (1884) North German Lloyd.

Built by John Elder & Co., Glasgow. Tonnage: 4,719. Dimensions: 430' x 47'. Single-screw, 17 knots. Four masts and two funnels. Lost by stranding on the Isle of Wight on January 31, 1892 with no loss of life. Sister ship: **Ems**.

Eisenach (1908) North German Lloyd.

Built by Bremer Vulcan Co., Vegesack, Germany. Tonnage: 6,757. Dimensions: 419' x 54'. Single-screw, 12 knots. Two masts and one funnel. Renamed: **Santarem**. Sister ship: **Coburg**.

Elbe (1881) North German Lloyd.

Built by John Elder & Co., Glasgow. Tonnage: 4,897. Dimensions: 418' x 44'. Single screw, 17 knots. Four masts and two funnels. Note: She was the first ship built of a new class of express liners for the North German Lloyd. Sunk by collision with the British steamer **Crathie** in the North Sea on January 30, 1895, with the loss of 335 lives. The ship went down a few minutes after being struck.

***Empress of Australia** (1914) Canadian Pacific Line.

Built by Vulcan Co., Stettin, Germany. Tonnage: 21,833. Dimensions: 588' x 75'. Twin-screw, 19 knots. Two masts and three funnels. **Ex-Tirpitz**. Note: Construction work on this ship was held up during the first part of World War I, but in 1916 the Kaiser ordered her to be completed as a royal yacht in which to receive the Allied naval fleets in the event the Germans were victorious. However, such not being the case, she was ceded to Great Britain in 1919, and in 1922 sold to the Canadian Pacific Line and refitted by John Brown & Company at Clydebank. In 1925 her original quadruple expansion engines were replaced by steam turbines at the Fairfield Shipbuilding Company.

Empress of Britain (1906) Canadian Pacific Line.

Built by Fairfield Shipbuilding and Engineering Co., Ltd., Glasgow. Tonnage: 14,189. Dimensions: 548' x 65'. Twin-

screw, 20 knots. Two masts and two funnels. Note: Has made the Liverpool-Halifax run in 5 days, 18 hours and 18 minutes. After being used for war service by the British Admiralty she was reconditioned in 1919 and converted to oil burning fuel. In 1923 was changed from a first-class liner into cabin-class. Renamed: **Montroyal**. Sister ship: **Empress of Ireland**.

Empress of Britain (1931) Canadian Pacific Line.

Built by John Brown & Co., Ltd., Clydebank, Glasgow. Tonnage: 42,348. Dimensions: 733' x 97'. Quadruple-screw, 24 knots. Two masts and three funnels. Note: Launched on June 11, 1930. Cost about \$15,000,000 to build. From her water line to top of masts measured 208 feet. Made her first World cruise in 1933. Has made the run between Southampton and Canada at the average speed of 25.08 knots. She had accommodations for 423 first-class, 260 tourist-class and 470 third-class passengers. Largest ship built for the Canadian service. Sunk off Ireland by German aircraft in October, 1940, and was the largest Allied liner lost in World War II.

Empress of Canada (1922) Canadian Pacific Line.

Built by Fairfield Shipbuilding and Engineering Co., Ltd., Glasgow. Tonnage: 21,517. Dimensions: 627' x 77'. Twin-screw, 20 knots. Two masts and three funnels. Note: Used for only a short time on the Atlantic, as she was built for the trans-pacific service, between Vancouver and Hong Kong. She was torpedoed and sunk in 1943.

***Empress of Canada** (1928) Canadian Pacific Line.

Built by John Brown & Co., Ltd., Clydebank, Glasgow. Tonnage: 20,022. Dimensions: 581' x 75'. Twin-screw, 18 knots. Two masts and two funnels. **Ex-Duchess of Richmond**.

Empress of France (1913) Canadian Pacific Line.

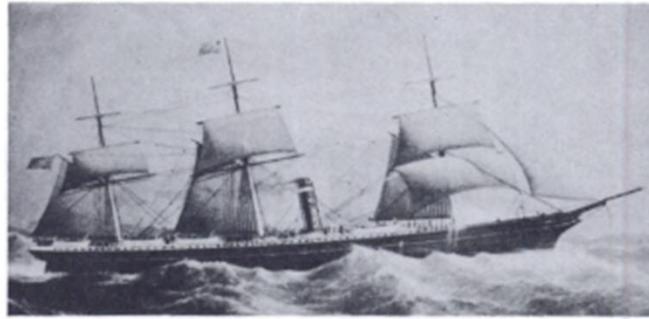
Built by Wm. Beardmore & Co., Ltd., Glasgow. Tonnage: 18,357. Dimensions: 571' x 72'. Quadruple-screw, 19½ knots. Two masts and two funnels. **Ex-Alsatian**. Scrapped in 1935.

Empress of India (1908) Canadian Pacific Line.

Built by Tecklenborg & Co., Geestemunde, Germany. Tonnage: 16,992. Dimensions: 590' x 68'. Twin-screw, 17 knots. Two masts and two funnels. **Ex-Prinz Friedrich Wilhelm**. Renamed: (a) **Montlaurier**, (b) **Montnairn**.

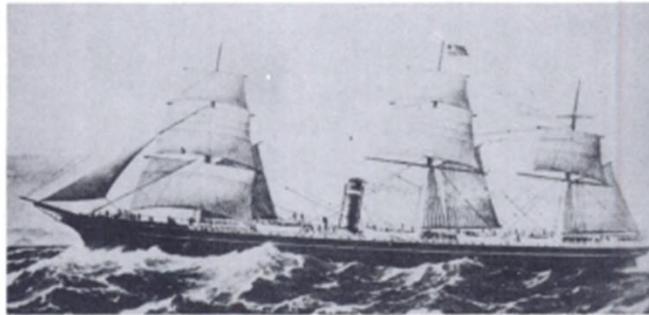

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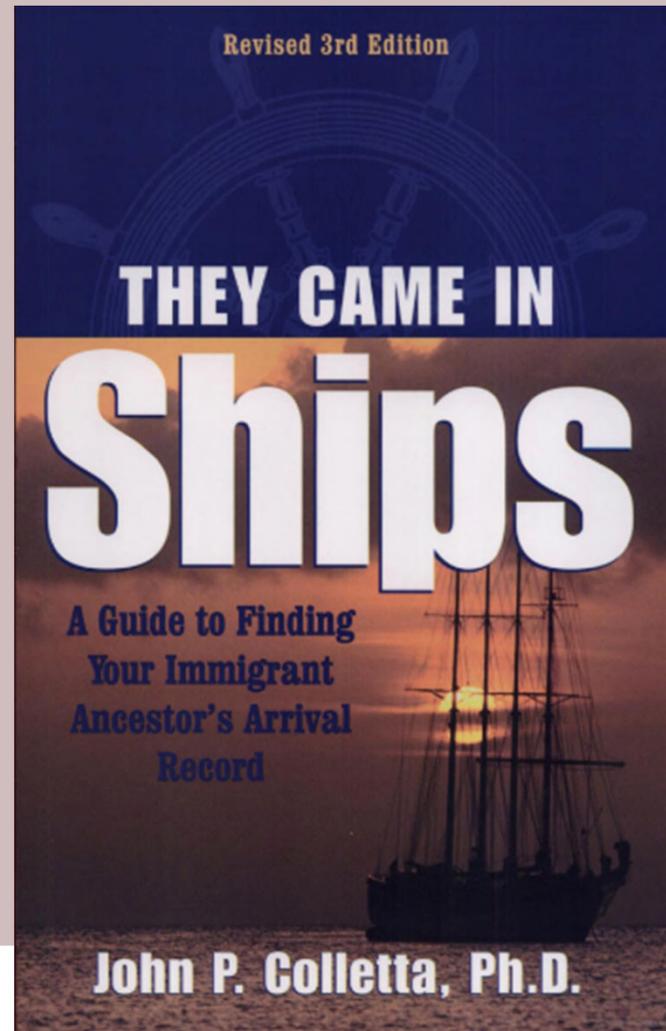
