



General Considerations


- You may not find one “smoking-gun” record
- You may need to rely on several records to build a case
- Some records may be less reliable than others
- “A” may lead to “B,” which might lead to “C” and then back to “A” (or more)
- May have working several working theories

Onomastic Evidence

- Some cultures may have defined naming patterns, while others may be less rigid
- Surnames as first names or less common first names can be clues of earlier kinships and origins
- Can be circumstantial evidence, but can be a starting point or provide a working theory

JONATHAN PINNEY

JONATHAN PINNEY, b. _____ in England; d. 1812, Plymouth, Vt. and is buried in Plymouth Notch, is supposed to have emigrated from England about 1760 and settled in Guilford, Vt. He m. Priscilla Grover of that town who was b. Apr. 2, 1727, Ellingby, Ct.; d. 1820, Plymouth, Vt. Jonathan Pinney learned the trade of carpenter and joiner in England, serving the required seven years with a master. He came from Guilford to Plymouth about the year 1800 settling in a valley in the northern part of the town, to which he gave the name of "Pinney Hollow." They had eleven children, all of whom were born in Guilford and came with their parents to Plymouth, Vt. Jonathan Pinney served in the Revolutionary War.

 Soon after John Penney's death, widow Elizabeth went to live in New Braintree, Worcester Co., Mass., home of her sister Hannah (Mrs. Sampson) Wetherill and their late brother Jonathan Delano.¹⁶³ There on 20 April 1757 she married, as his second wife, David Ayres.¹⁶⁴ When on 5 Sept. 1760 David Ayres of Roxbury, Canada (Warwick, 1763) sold "the New Braintree farm where I lately dwelt," Elizabeth relinquished her dower rights.¹⁶⁵ Subsequent records fail to establish whether she lived to accompany Ayres from Warwick to Grafton, where he settled in 1770 (and died, prob. 1792).¹⁶⁶


Sally (Rice) Brewer

- Even when records are abundant, kinship linkages may be problematic
- Records in colonial period and early nineteenth century are often not as detailed as we want
- Try to get additional records when a family name may be too common to rely on a vital record alone

Thompson Congregational Church
Town incorporated 1785, having been previously a part of Killingly which dates back to 1708.

The Congregational Church of Thompson was organized in 1730, in what was then the North Society of Killingly and named "Thompson Parish" in honor of a non-resident English proprietor, Sir Robert Thompson, a distinguished seaman, the first president of the "Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts."

Rev. Marston Cabot, the first pastor, begins the marriage record in 1730.



- No records of their birth
- Stephen Towne [father] is appointed guardian of the children to take custody of the estate they are in to inherit "in right of their deceased mother"
- 1/6 of 1/7 of Land of Barnabas Herrick

Four Generations, Missed in VRs

Barnabas Herrick (1738-1832)
left a particular piece of real estate to the heirs of his deceased son Jonathan

Jonathan Herrick (ca. 1763-1803)

Betsey Herrick (died before 1834)
m. Salem 1811 Stephen Towne
(marriage is only known record of Betsey)

6 known surviving children

Stephen, Jonathan, Susan, Allen, Hannah G., Samuel (minors in 1834)
all due to inherit 1/6 of 1/7 of land provided "in right of their deceased mother" of Barnabas Herrick

Basics of mtDNA

- mtDNA is inherited from a person's mother
- Matrilineal-related people (even several generations back) share the same mtDNA markers
- People who do not share the same markers are not matrilineally related within recorded history (a few centuries)
- For this problem: three people were solicited and existing descendants had already participated

73

Esther Dyer of Braintree, Vermont

- Born Vermont, about 1790
- Married Braintree, Vermont, 1814, George Flanders, and moved to New York
- In later censuses, Esther lived with Tarrant Dyer, a grandson of Ichabod Dyer, Sr. of Braintree, Vermont
- Based on the 1800 censuses, Esther could be a daughter of Ichabod Dyer, Jr., or his eldest son Ichabod Dyer, Jr.


Expected Conclusions

- Matrilineal descendants of Mary Jones should match descendants of Priscilla Mullins
- Matrilineal descendants of Esther Dyer should match one of these two groups
- If Esther's descendants match the Nichols bunch, she was a daughter of Phebe Nichols and Ichabod Dyer, Jr.
- If Esther's descendants match the Mullins/Alden bunch, she was a daughter of Mary Jones & Ichabod Dyer, Sr.




