

Editor's Introduction



As a Winslow descendant myself (through Gov. Edward's brother Kenelm), I am always interested in research on their English origins. Jesse Tarbert's article, **Recent Winslow Gleanings: New Details About the Life and Career of Edward^A Winslow**, presents several new details about the subject's life and career, especially regarding his profession as an attorney and his role in the salt-works in Droitwich, Worcestershire, while reevaluating previous statements.

Next is **Who is Sarah Walker? New Findings of the Wife of Plymouth Colony's Nathaniel Warren**, which follows the earlier research on the English origins of the Collier family of Plymouth Colony, published recently in this journal by authors William E. Cole and Nicola Waddington, and shows how Sarah (Warren) Walker likely ties into this family.

We begin **Francis Curtis of Plymouth, Massachusetts, 1671, and Three Generations of His Family**, by William Utermohlen, which is expected to continue for several issues. Francis Curtis's descendants marry into several *Mayflower* families with connections to the Samson and Billington families treated in this installment.

Richard Hall's two articles, **Lucy Bearse, Wife of Ezekiel Bryant of Plympton, Massachusetts: A John Howland Line** and **Rebecca Standish, Wife of Calvin Bryant of Sheffield, Massachusetts: A Myles Standish, John Alden, and James Chilton Line**, follow a family, with numerous *Mayflower* lines and service in the Revolutionary War, out of Plymouth County to western Massachusetts, northwestern Connecticut, and eastern New York State for three generations.

In **Adams, Cary & Quincy: Cousins on the Frontier and in the White House**, William B. Saxbe Jr. summarizes the genealogical connections back to both Plymouth and Massachusetts Bay Colonies of three Cary brothers who were early settlers in the Northwest Territory in present-day Ohio.

In an experimental piece by Gary Boyd Roberts and Julie Helen Otto, **Twenty-Seven New Notable Descendants of the Founding Families of the *Mayflower***, the authors invite collaboration on recent research they have uncovered since the 2020 publication of Roberts's *The Mayflower 500*, summarizing twenty-seven new notable *Mayflower* descendants, including the actress Sissy Spacek and cartoonist and film producer Walter Disney.

Peter Burgess continues his record series **Eastham and Truro [Mass.] Town Records, 1671-1783. Seen Elsewhere** by Scott Andrew Bartley summarizes relevant *Mayflower* material for 2021 from articles within sixteen genealogical journals, followed by **Additions and Corrections to MD (70) 2022: 197**.
