20th Century Immigration

Immigration in the 20th Century

- By the 1900s, immigration was running at an all-time high
- The influx of those who looked and dressed differently from the Anglo-Saxons was beginning to cause concerns among some
- Settlement patterns were suggesting a sense of isolation among certain ethnicities

Why Head to America?

- Unskilled laborers could find many types of jobs in a growing urban community
- Abject poverty in certain countries
- Chain migration of families
- Improved methods of travel, faster ships
- Pogroms against the Jewish continued to escalate

“New” Immigrants

- Appeared less likely to assimilate into American life, preferring to congregate together apart from others in America
- Came from southern and eastern Europe with new religions, manners, style of dress
- Unskilled men who often came, not to settle, but to work a few months to make money
- Concentrated in industrial centers

Too Many Immigrants

- A closing of the "Golden Door" has begun:
 - Immigration Act of 1882
 - Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882
 - Alien Contract Labor Laws of 1885, 1887
- Third Major Immigration Wave, 1890-1914
- Inception of INS Service in 1906
- Dillingham Commission, 1907-1910

Dillingham Commission

- Act of Congress, 20 February 1907, created a commission, headed by William P. Dillingham, to examine the “immigrant question.”
- The commission consisted of three senators appointed by the President of the Senate; three members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House; and three persons appointed by the President of the United States.






Immigrant Restriction League

- Founded in 1894 in Boston by Charles Warren, Robert DeCourcy Ward, and Prescott F. Hall
- All three were Boston Brahmin Harvard alumni of the class of 1889
- Warren & DeCourcy Ward were Mayflower descendants while Hall's ancestors arrived from England in the 1600s
- Believed that immigrants from southern and eastern Europe were ethnically inferior to Anglo-Saxons

Prescott F. Hall

- 27 Sep 1868 – 28 May 1921
- Also served as general secretary of the National Association of Immigration Restriction Leagues
- The IRL disbanded after his death


Immigration Restriction League:

- Attracted prominent scholars and philanthropists predominantly from New England
- Used books, pamphlets, meetings, newspaper and journal articles to campaign
- Promoted alienist and xenophobic ideas
- Also promoted eugenics

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Immigration Restriction League

Chinese Exclusion Acts

- Act of 5 July 1884: excluded all Chinese regardless of which country they emigrated from
- Act of 1 Oct 1888: Denied re-entry to Chinese laborers who had not returned by that date
- Act of 5 May 1892: Extended all previous Chinese exclusion laws by 10 years
- Act of 29 April 1902: Again extended previous Chinese exclusion laws for another 10 years

Angel Island (San Francisco)



- Opened in 1910
- Approximately 175,000 Chinese came through here
- Average detention was 2-3 weeks
- Some were held for a few months
- A few were forced to remain here for nearly 2 years




Chinese Exclusion Acts

- The exclusion acts prompted Chinese to create “paper sons.”
- Strict and detailed interrogations resulted in the “paper sons” having to study complete family trees, information about hometowns, and more.







20th Century Immigration

Beginning of Quota System

- Act of May 19, 1921
- Set the annual quota for each nationality group at 3% of the number of foreign-born persons of that national origin as enumerated in the 1910 census
- Asiatic barred zone immigrants still denied
- Exempted certain classes of alien

Act of May 19, 1921

- Was intended to:
 - Limit immigration of people from Northern and Western Europe
 - Stop the “growing hordes” from Southern and Eastern Europe
- Was a temporary measure, set to expire on 30 June 1924

Act of May 19, 1921

- Did not apply to:
 - Government officials & their households
 - Aliens in transit through U.S.
 - Lawfully admitted aliens going through foreign contiguous territory en route to another part of U.S.
 - Alien visitors for business or pleasure
 - Aliens whose immigration regulated by immigration treaty
 - Aliens who resided continuously for at least 1 year in a Western Hemisphere country
 - Aliens under 18, who are children of citizens

Act of May 19, 1921

- Three provisos:
 - Total allowed per month limited to 20% of annual quota
 - Quota exemption to those:
 - Temporarily visiting abroad
 - Certain professional classes
 - Domestic servants
 - Granted preference “so far as possible” to wives, parents, brothers, sisters, children under 18, and fiancées of citizens


National Quota Act of 1924

- Reduced total immigration to 150,000
- Adjusted the formula for calculating the quotas:
 - From 3% of 1910 nationality
 - To 2% of 1890 nationality
 - Minimum of 100 immigrants
- Quota preference up to 50% of each country to unmarried children under 21, parents and spouses of citizens
- Non-quota Exemptions include U.S. women who previously lost their citizenship by marriage

National Quota Act of 1924

- Heavily weighted to limit the southern and eastern Europeans from gaining entry
- The “national origins” system became fully operational in 1929
- Capped total immigration outside of Western Hemisphere to 150,000
- Averaged out to 5 northwestern Europeans to 1 southeastern European

1924 Act Effect on Immigration



Displaced Persons Act

- June 25, 1948
- Created a non-quota status for certain displaced person as a result of World War II
- Admitted some 400,000 people over four years
- President Truman felt that this act took quota spaces away from others already on the quota waiting list

278.1 ADMINISTRATIVE HISTORY

Functions: Administered selection and resettlement in the United States of certain European displaced persons.

Abolished: August 31, 1952, as provided in Displaced Persons Act.

Successor Agencies: Department of State, as liquidator, by EO 10382, August 9, 1952.

Security-Classified Records: This record group may include material that is security-classified.

Related Records: Record copies of publications of the Displaced Persons Commission in RG 287, Publications of the U.S. Government.

278.2.1 Central records

Textual Records: Central subject file, documenting administrative activities, complaints about the DPC, histories of refugee matters, and DPC conferences (17 ft.), 1948-52. Budget files, 1948-52.

278.2.2 Records of commissioners

Textual Records: Subject files, 1948-52, of Commissioner Harry N. Rosenfield, documenting state and federal regulations and legislative activity, including DPC opposition to the McCarran Internal Security Act of 1950; and of Commissioner Edward M. O'Connor, consisting primarily of correspondence with volunteer and state agencies regarding refugees' personal, financial, medical, and adjustment problems.

278.3.1 Records of the Legal Division

Textual Records: General subject file, 1948-52, including records concerning the rejection of applicants, membership in "inimical organizations," and the loyalty and security provisions of the McCarran Internal Security Act of 1950. Records of the General Counsel, consisting of a reading file, 1949-52; and a subject file dealing with "inimical organizations," Jewish refugees, war orphans, ethnic Germans, citizens of Venezia-Giulia, and a plan to resettle Asian Kalmak refugees in Alaska, 1948-52.

278.3.2 Records of the Information and Editorial Division

Textual Records: Subject file, 1950-52. Letters of inquiry about refugees, 1949-52, with copies of some responses.

278.3.3 Records of the Records and Statistics Division

Textual Records: File of statistical charts, reports, tables, and lists ("Statistical Subject File"), 1948-52. Miscellaneous subject file, 1948-52. Fact books, 1949-52. Reference files of material used in responding to Congress, and material about pertinent Congressional actions, 1948-52. Records relating to refugee youth, consisting of correspondence with volunteer organizations, June-July 1949, and with state agencies, July-September 1949; and a youth survey file, June-July 1949.

278.3.4 Records of the Resettlement Division

Textual Records: Correspondence with state committees and commissions, 1949-52. Correspondence concerning resettled refugees, 1949-52. Records of the Orphan Section, including a subject file, 1950-52; correspondence with state committees and commissions, 1950-52; and letters of request for the adoption of orphans, sent to Church World Services and forwarded by that organization to the DPC, June-July 1951.

278.3.5 Records of the European Division

Textual Records: Subject file, 1948-52. Correspondence, 1948-52. European History Project records, 1948-52, consisting of a general topic file and a research file.





Immigration & Naturalization 1952

- Act of June 27, 1952
- Act from which all present-day immigration and naturalization laws stem
- Vetoed by Pres. Truman, but Congress over-rode his veto
- Had 407 sections in four titles (compared to 44 sections of 1907 Act)
- Current Immigration & Naturalization Act has 507 sections in five titles

Truman's Veto

- “... that Americans with English or Irish names were better people and better citizens than Americans with Italian or Greek or Polish names... It violates the great political doctrine of the Declaration of Independence that ‘all men are created equal.’”



Truman's Comments

Alien Act of 1798

- Gave the Attorney General many powers in determining what immigrants could come into the country.
- “Seldom has a bill exhibited the distrust evidenced here for citizens and aliens alike...”

Act of 1952

- Gave the President power to deport any alien deemed “dangerous to the peace and safety of the United States.”
- “Aliens were ... frightened and citizens much disturbed by that threat to liberty.”

Walter-McCarran Act - 1952

- Established a preference system that determined which ethnic groups were desirable immigrants
- Placed great importance on labor qualifications
- Defined 3 types of immigrants:
 - Immigrants with special skills or relatives who were U.S. Citizens
 - Average immigrants (number not to exceed 270,000)
 - Refugees

Imm. & Nat. Act of 1965

- October 3, 1965
- Eliminated the national-origins quotas that began in 1924
- Also known as the Hart-Celler Act
- Established a new immigration policy based on reuniting immigrant families and attracting skilled labor to the U.S.

Hart-Celler Act - 1965

- Policies put into effect in 1965 would dramatically change the demographic makeup of the American population
- Three decades following passage saw more than 18 million legal immigrants enter the U.S.
- That was more than three times the number admitted the previous 30 years

End of the 20th Century

- Hart-Celler Act of 1965 changed the face of the American population
- In the 1950s more than half of all immigrants were European and 6% were Asians
- In the 1990s only 16% were European and 31% were Asian
- Between 1965-2000 highest number of immigrants (at 4.3 million) came from Mexico

Immigration Reform & Control Act

- Became law 6 November 1986
- Was intended to address illegal immigration
- Made it illegal to hire illegal immigrants
- Legalized certain seasonal undocumented migrants who had entered the U.S. before 1 January 1982
- Did not appear to curb illegal immigration

Homeland Security Act of 2002

- Created the Department of Homeland Security
 - Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) fell under new DHS
 - INS became U.S. Citizenship & Immigration Service (USCIS)
- Still allows two legal methods of immigration:
 - Temporary (non-immigrant) admission
 - Permanent (immigrant) admission (gets a green card)

Immigration Forms

War Brides Act

- December 28, 1945
- Established brides and children of veterans as non-quota status immigrants
- For the purpose of the Act established that WWII began December 7, 1941, and ceased “upon the termination of hostilities as declared by the President or by a joint resolution of Congress”
- Race could not bar an alien spouse from entry




A Guide to Interpreting Passenger List Annotations

Passenger Lists or manifests. Every genealogist and his sister wants to find one. But after years of searching, many find a document that raises as many questions as it answers. This is especially true of passenger lists dating after 1892, which are frequently found to have a variety of markings, codes, and annotations squeezed into the margins and small blank spaces above and behind information written in the list form's columns.

These web pages are intended to provide a comprehensive reference guide to interpreting the markings, or annotations, found on immigration passenger lists. It is written for researchers with a U.S. passenger list in hand. To learn more about finding passenger lists, see JewishGen's [Immigration InfoFiles](#) and the [Passenger Lists section of the JewishGen FAQ](#). The information is generally organized by where the annotation is found on the record--in the left margin, for example, or in the occupation column. Within each location category are examples of the various types of annotations found in that space, and an explanation of each. Every attempt has been made to provide several examples of each annotation type so that researchers may come to recognize the form and pattern that characterizes each type. Each page also has a link to a [glossary](#) of commonly-found acronyms and abbreviations.

What did Refugees Need to Obtain a US Visa in the 1930s?

As the Nazi regime's attacks intensified in the late 1930s, hundreds of thousands of Jews in Germany tried to immigrate to the United States. To enter the United States, each person needed an immigration visa stamped into his or her passport.

It was difficult to get the necessary papers to leave Germany, and US immigration visas were difficult to obtain. The process could take years.





Prepared forms for such address changes and reports may be obtained at any post office. A penalty of fine and imprisonment is provided by law for failure to make the required reports. Address letters and reports to the Alien Registration Division, Department of Justice, Washington, D. C.






