Consultation 1: Name of individual to be discussed	William Blair (1765?-1851)
Pertinent information about individual	I think that William was baptized on 2 Jul 1765 in Scone, Perthshire. The baptismal record names only his father, Thomas. William married Margaret Steel on 5 Aug 1795 in Scone. He was a “weaver” in some of the records of his children’s baptisms and a “feuer” (or spelled something like that) in later records. William died on 8 Feb 1851 at age 85, according to the Scone Parish register, thus born about 1766. The cause of death was palsy, according to a letter from one of his daughters-in-law written to her son in Philadelphia. Margaret died 16 Sep 1839 at age 68 of asthma, according to the same church register. William and Margaret had the following children (all recorded in the Scone parish register): 1. Margaret, bapt. 27 Jun 1796; 2. Jean, bapt. 25 Mar 1798; 3. Thomas, bapt. 19 Jan 1800; d. 10 Oct 1878 in Edinburgh; married Barbara Henderson 3 Jan 1828* 4. Janet, b. 18 Apr 1802; 5. Anne, b. 10 Jun 1805; 6. John, b. 30 Aug 1807; 7. William, bapt. 17 Feb 1810; 8. Jean, b. 29 Dec 1812.
Specific question(s) or goal(s) for consultation	1. How can I be sure that Thomas of Scone is actually “my” William’s father and not the father of some other William and that my William was born elsewhere. (See also Additional Comments). More research I guess, but where? 2. How do I find out the name of the mother? Same answer I guess. 3. In the baptismal records, Thomas (father of above William) is mentioned as being a “portioner.” What is that? 4. In some of the records of his children’s baptisms, William is named as a feuer—or spelled something like that. What does that mean? 5. There are two marriage records for Thomas Blair and Barbara Henderson. One in Scone dated 3 Jan 1828 and the other in Caputh, Perthshire, which was Barbara’s home parish, dated 30 Sep 1828. Both records say: “Thomas Blair and Barbara Henderson both in this parish having been proclaimed were married this day.” Married twice in case the first one didn’t take? Another Thomas Blair and Barbara Henderson? What’s going on here?

Any Additional Comments	Because we have letters from the immigrant William Blair’s (1830-1876) parents, Thomas and Barbara (Henderson) Blair, I know the information about them is correct. I know that Thomas’ parents are William and Margaret (Steel) Blair as they are listed on Thomas’ death cert in 1878. The difficulty is finding William’s parents. Given William’s age at death as stated in the Parish register,

	<p>he was born about 1766. I think 'Thomas' is his father's name because there's only one William born in Scone between 1756 and 1776 and because he (William) named his first son Thomas.</p> <p>By reading through the microfilm of the Scone Parish register many years ago, I was able to build the various Blair families in Scone giving birth about the same time as William and Margaret. Some of these might well be relatives.</p> <p>There are 2 other children born to Thomas in Scone. I'll look at those records in Edinburgh.</p> <p>There is a Thomas Blair receiving disbursements from Scone Parish in the 1750s. Could this be Thomas the father of William?</p> <p>It's possible (likely?) that the Thomas Blair who died on 15 May 1838 in New Scone (as it was called then) of old age is William's father.</p>

Pertinent Information 2	<p>Helen (Hogg) Henderson was the mother of Barbara Henderson (mentioned above) as recorded on Barbara's death certificate in 1872. Helen married William Henderson on 8 Nov 1799 in Edinburgh. In the parish register, their marriage was recorded: "William Henderson, gardener, St. Andrew Parish and Helen Hogg, same parish, daughter of _____ Hogg, late gentleman's servant, Edinburgh." Helen died on 21 Jan 1842 on the Delvine estate, Caputh, Perthshire, where her husband was the head gardener. Her tombstone records her age as 73, which means she was born about 1769, if the tombstone is correct.</p> <p>The children of William and Helen Henderson were:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Katherine/Catherine, baptized 15 Jun 1801 in Strachan, Kincardineshire; lived with her parents until their deaths, never married 2. William, baptized 27 Aug 1803 Strachan, Kincardineshire ; m. Mary Ann ---?--- ; gardener; trained his nephew, William Blair in gardening; worked for Hon. Lord King in Ireland at some point—according to a letter from Barbara to her daughter-in-law, Mary Blair of Philadelphia. 3. Barbara, baptized 8 Apr 1805 Strachan, Kincardineshire, d. 18 Aug 1872 Dunblane, Perthshire, m. Thomas Blair 1828 (see Question 5 in Consult #1) 4. Helen, born 17 May 1807, Caputh, Perthshire.
Specific Questions 2	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. How does one find out more about "_____ Hogg, late gentleman's servant?" In other words, I'd like to find Helen's parents. 2. Or maybe I just assumed this was the right marriage for Helen Hogg and William Henderson?

Additional Comments 2	I have a list of Helen Hoggs born 1767-1771 and I thought to check each entry at Scotland's People Centre. If the family followed the naming tradition (and some of my guidebooks to Scottish genealogy said that most people did follow the naming tradition), then Helen's mother would be a Katherine. There is a

	Katherine Bishop married to an Alexander Hogg who gave birth to a Helen in 1767. It doesn't give the father's occupation. There are at least two other children born to Alexander Hogg and Katherine Bishop. I'll look at those birth records at Scotland's People Centre to see if any of them mention the father's occupation.

Pertinent Information 3	<p>William Henderson was a gardener. He married Barbara Beattie on 7 May 1775 in Kinfauns, Perthshire. They had the following known children, all baptized in Kinfauns:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. John, baptized 17 Jun 1776 2. Charles, baptized 17 Jan 1779 3. William, baptized 17 Jan 1779; died 22 Aug 1851 on Delvine Estate, Caputh, Perthshire and is buried in the cemetery in Caputh; married Helen Hogg on 8 Nov 1799 in Edinburgh. When his wife died in 1842, he erected a tombstone for her, which sits along an outside wall of the mausoleum of the MacKenzie family, owners of the estate. When William died in 1851, his name was added to the stone along with the following: "W. Henderson, 47 years Gardener at Delvine and much respected by his employer, died 22nd August 1851 aged 74 years" thus giving a birth year of about 1777. Listed as father on daughter Barbara (Henderson) Blair's death certificate. <p>There was a William Henderson, gardener "in Edinburgh," who died there in 1801, and in his will left five pounds sterling to a William Henderson and an Alexander Henderson, amongst other bequests of five pounds sterling to various people as well as twenty pounds sterling to a John McGregor. Whether the William of the will is the father of William who married Helen Hogg—well, who knows.</p>
Specific Questions 3	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. I think this is the right William Henderson to be the father of William who married Helen Hogg. William (who married Helen Hogg) or someone else told the 1851 census taker that he was born in Kinfauns. Between 1760 and 1781 there are no other William Hendersons being born and recorded in the parish register in Kinfauns. 2. How does one find out the various estates where William Sr. would have worked?

Additional Comments 3	<p>According to <thedicamillo.com> website, there were three estates in Kinfauns: Glencarse House, Glendoick House and Kinfauns Castle. William might have been working at one of these estates when his three known sons were born. I'm going to visit the A.K. Bell Library in Perth before the NEHGS tour and will try to find out more about these estates. Also, perhaps one of William's (d. 1851) siblings lived past 1855 so I'll check for death records also.</p>

Civil registration indicated they married Aug 1862, although searches for any marriage between them have not been found.</p> <p>Edward died in Feb 1870 and is buried at the Glasgow Necropolis. Roseann died 1873 and is buried at St. Peter's Dalbeth.</p> <p>Edward was born near Pollokshaws, Renfrewshire, but no baptism record was found. During the 1841, 1851, and 1861 censuses, there are McNally families living near Pollokshaws.</p> <p>I would like to find more about Ann McNally ... was she from Edward's neighborhood in Pollokshaws? Or was she from Ireland and he met her when stationed there? Pertinent information about individual	Oral tradition says Daniel was kidnapped from a Scottish port town in 1680 at age 8, along with an older brother. My research of the ports of that era points to EDI/Leith as the most likely port. It was assumed by the Gregory descendants that he was sold into indentured servitude in Massachusetts. No record of that is found in the "Probate Paper Files" of Suffolk and Middlesex Counties. I found an emigration entry for 1690 in Donald Whyte's publication, leading me to believe that Daniel was pressed into service on a ship trading with the American colonies until he attained his majority (if the oral tradition is true). Daniel married Elizabeth Robinson in Watertown Farms (later Weston), MA in 1693. Children were: Daniel b. 1695, William b. 1699, John 1701, and twins Isaac and Abraham in 1704. It was this generation that changed the surname to Gregory. [Abraham's daughter, Ruth, married into the Dufur family, leading to my maternal GGF, John Dufur.] Daniel's death is recorded in the Weston town records as 20 Mar 1736, although his burial place is unknown. (I will be visiting Weston just prior to departure to Scotland.) As for his birthplace, the only baptism record in the OPRs for a Daniel McGregor of that era is from Stirling, Stirlingshire 1675, born to Alexander McGregor and Jonat Finlason, witnesses: Daniel McGregor, James Ferguson and John Buchanan.
Specific question(s) or goal(s) for consultation	I have "debunked" lineages suggested by multiple online trees, and would like to see if I can verify a lineage I consider to be most likely, or entertain other possibilities, if strong evidence emerges. Although the Clan Gregor was proscribed "by fire and sword" in 1603, leading to executions and forced aliases, the proscription was lifted from 1663 to 1693, covering the entire time of Daniel's presence in Scotland. Some McGregors had refused to take aliases. Of those who complied, it is not known how many reverted to their original surname when the proscription was lifted. When the proscription was re-applied in 1693, it was much less stringent, providing hope that Daniel's family remaining in Scotland can be identified. I will gladly follow advice for records to search beyond those listed below. Court records will likely be more productive than sassines and registers of testaments, since the McGregors were stripped of their lands before and during the proscription. It is possible that the generation preceding Daniel's acquired property after the lifting of the proscription. Part of the oral tradition is that a party of Scots came to Massachusetts looking for Daniel and his brother, leading to perhaps dubious speculation about an inheritance.
