 within and for the County and State aforesaid, John M. Huber,   
 aged 57 years, a resident of Brighton in the County of Marion  
 in the State of Indiana who, being duly sworn according to law, declares that he is the  
 identical John M. Huber who enlisted in the service of the United States at  
Boyle County of Knox State of Indiana on the 11  
 day of August 1862, as a Privat. in Company J. of the 101.  
 Regiment of Indiana Vols., commanded by Capt. Geo. W. Steel  
 and was honorably discharged at Lumoria State of Kentucky on the 24  
 day of June 1865. That his personal description is as follows: Age \_\_\_\_\_ years, height,

...ion, \_\_\_\_\_; hair, \_\_\_\_\_; eyes, \_\_\_\_\_. That while a mem-  
 aforesaid, in the service and in the line of his duty, at or near a place called  
 State of Illinois on or about the Early in Army of  
 1863. Suffered a severe attack of  
diarrhoea brought on from severe hardships &  
exposure while in active service, and was  
 treated in camp by the Regimental doctors.  
also early in Decr 1864. Suffered a severe  
attack of Rheumatism, brought on from exposure  
 and hardships during several months active  
 service in which he was with his command in  
 the battles of Shrewsbury, Maxim's Ridge and  
 all the marches & engagements to the time above  
 given. Paid Diarrhoea and Rheumatism both  
 continued and became chronic, and have  
 continued to disable him ever since. Suffer frequent  
 severe attacks of diarrhoea, suppur irregular & general  
 derangement of the stomach and bowels. The Rheumatism  
 has affected his whole system. Has severely affected his  
Heart. Also limbs breast shoulders hips & back. And  
 on account of Paid Diarrhoea & Chronic Rheumatism and  
 resulting debility, he is unable to do manual labor.  
 That he has not been employed in the military or naval service otherwise than as stated above, Except as follows:  
Admitted in Co B 11. Ind. Inf. Vols Apr 10. 61 & discharged Aug 4. 61  
 Since leaving the service he has resided in Marion & Hamilton Counties Indiana  
 and his occupation has been that of a trying to farm. That prior to his entry into the service  
 above named, he was a man of good, sound, physical health, being when enrolled a farmer.

was treated by Dr. Vickary of Hamilton Co. Ind. He was

dead and he can not get their testimony



## Civil War and Consequences

Like most men his age in the 1860s, John fought during the Civil War. According to Col. J. B. Dodge, who compiled its Civil War history, “Hamilton County [Indiana] was conspicuous during the war of the Rebellion for the fidelity of her citizens to the cause of the Union, for the number of her citizens that enlisted in the service of their country, in proportion to the number of inhabitants in the county, and for the courage and endurance displayed by them.”<sup>793</sup>

John M. Huber first enlisted in Company B, 11th Indiana Volunteers on 10 April 1861 and was discharged 4 August 1861. He then enlisted as a sergeant in Co. I, 101 Indiana Volunteers from Marion County, Indiana 11 August 1862. The term was for three years, and he mustered out in Louisville, Jefferson County, Kentucky 24 June 1865.<sup>794</sup>

During his service with the 101st, he served at Murfreesboro, Rutherford County, Tennessee (February and March 1863); went “on a scout to Milton, Tennessee” (13 March 1863); marched to Chattanooga (1863 and 1864); fought in the Battle of Chickamauga (September 1863); fought in the Battle of Missionary Ridge (November 1863); wintered in Rossville, Walker County, Georgia (early 1864); and marched to Atlanta.<sup>795</sup> According to Col. Dodge, “The One Hundred and First saw a great deal of hard service, and was in every respect an excellent regiment.”<sup>796</sup>

# Story Sample

Unfortunately, while in Murfreesboro, John came down with a chronic stomach and bowel ailment that left him unfit for duty in the spring of 1863. About one year later, while in Rossville, he “was afflicted with rheumatism and was crippled so that he was often unable to get about without the use of a cane or the assistance of a comrade.”<sup>797</sup> This left him unable “to perform any duty to amount to anything [for] the remainder of the winter of 1864.”<sup>798</sup>

Throughout the war, he was treated by Dr. A. W. Dewey and Dr. Bassil B. Bennett, and one month after his company was mustered out, John M. Huber was examined by Dr. Samuel Records (of Lawrence, Marion County, Indiana, in 1890) because his health issues continued. In the next four or five years, he sought the care of two other doctors in Hamilton County, Indiana, before receiving treatment from Dr. T. J. McMurtry in August 1869. From September 1871 to August 1874, Dr. E. W. Bagan was the Huber family physician and stated that health issues kept John from manual labor one-third of the time. For the next two years, he was treated by Dr. H. E. Davenport for the same issues and declared unfit for manual labor half the time.<sup>799</sup>

In July 1883, John M. Huber applied, as an invalid, for a pension for his Civil War service. At the time, he was a 54-year-old farmer (trying to farm) in Irvington. Levi Huber of Cicero and Levi P. Fodrea of Westfield (both in Hamilton County, Indiana) witnessed his application. Three months later, the Examining Board confirmed the poor state of his health and determined that he was due one-half rate. He originally received \$4 a month for this health condition. Almost ten years later, after another exam, the doctors determined that he was entitled to a 4/18 rating for his heart disease, 2/18 for liver, and 4/18 for rheumatism. He began receiving \$8 a month for his pension. A year later, he asked for an increase due to his heart disease, but because he was too fragile to travel to Indianapolis to meet with the Board of Examining Surgeons, they denied his request.<sup>800</sup>

The visit of President Jewett, of the Erie, to Cincinnati yesterday, discovered the fact that the trustee is of the pool could not deliver to him a majority of the stock of the C., H. & D. railroad, as per their contract—that is, in exchange for Erie's guar- antee certificates. 



## Hardships in Marion County, Indiana

Still suffering from poor health after the war in 1870, John worked on a farm in White River Township, Hamilton County, Indiana, but he only owned \$100 in personal estate.<sup>803</sup> Soon thereafter, the Huber family moved to Irvington, a suburb of Indianapolis in Marion County, Indiana, just south of Hamilton County. From at least 1880 until the end of his life, John farmed or worked as a laborer in Irvington.<sup>804</sup>

John had additional responsibilities throughout the 1880s. He served as Irvington's town marshal from at least 1882 through 1884 and 1887 through 1890. Although family stories claimed he

was the first town marshal for Irvington, he actually replaced the legendary Samuel H. Smith, the “hero of Chickamauga” who was marshal long before and long after John’s time.<sup>805</sup> As Smith claimed he never had to arrest anyone, when John was re-elected in May 1888, “the main issue at stake in the town election at Irvington, Monday, was in regard to giving the sows the freedom of the street.”<sup>806</sup> According to the family history compiled in 1979, John’s town marshal badge “is a family keepsake [once] in the possession of a granddaughter, Dessie (Hunter) McCleary.”<sup>807</sup>

On August 17, 1894 sorrow entered the new house, when the father, John M. Huber, passed away. He had been in poor health since his discharge from the army but had continued farming. However, on June 30, 1883 he applied for a veteran's pension. He was 54 years at the time. He suffered from a stomach disorder and rheumatism which affected his whole body. The cause of his death was rhumatic heart disease. He was a member of the George H. Chapman Post #209 of the Indiana G.A.R.

the National Road. . . . They were a jolly family and one can imagine many happy hours in a big old house.”<sup>808</sup>

A great many unhappy hours must have also passed there. Dr. Robert W. Long was the Huber family physician beginning 15 November 1878 and through the time of the births of the youngest child in 1881 to late 1890. He stated that along with the complaints from the war, he “found him [John] with valvular disease of the heart . . . for five or six years.” John’s rheumatism would disable him “from one to four weeks each time.”<sup>809</sup> The others in the house could not escape from ill health. During the summer of 1883, the three youngest children came down with diphtheria, to which 7-year-old Marilla succumbed.<sup>810</sup>

By 1893, Dr. J. E. Barnhill was the family physician. He noted that due to John M. Huber’s “serious heart disease,” he was not to overwork himself and was disabled “from performing any manual labor.” By mid-1894, Dr. Barnhill stated that Huber’s health had grown worse, having been “confined to bed for a month or more” with an “attack of rheumatism” to the point where he was so “weak and debilitated,” he could die if he reported to the examining board in Indianapolis. The doctor rightfully predicted that Huber would “not live many months” and had to confirm the death of his patient, who died “from the rheumatism and resulting valvular disease of the heart.”<sup>811</sup>

On August 15, 1892 Cora J. Huber contracted with H. Milligan to purchase a lot on Dillon Avenue (now South Hawthorne Lane). It was listed as Lot 22 in Walkers Sunnyside Addition in the town of Irvington. According to the agreement, he was to give her the money to have a house built on the lot and she was to own both the house and the lot. It was a lovely nine-room house with a parlor, sitting room, dining room and kitchen. All were finished as was the custom at that time. A small room that could be reached from the kitchen completed the downstairs. The stairway to the stairs was off the sitting room. There were three large rooms on the first floor and one small one upstairs. The family must have moved in there as payments were to start when the house was finished and a payment is dated December 1, 1892. The house is still standing and has been made into a duplex. The present address is 1234 South Hawthorne Lane. The parlor windows, which were protected with a border of stained glass around the edges, are gone and the windows closed. A second porch on the south side has been added. The stairs now go up from the new porch entrance.

Following the death of her husband, Mary C. Huber filed for a pension under the widows with minor children act. She received twelve dollars per month starting August 18, 1894 and also two dollars each for her two minor children, Charles D. and Myrtle E. until they were 16 years old. The other daughter at home, Cora, who had bought the house, worked as a seamstress at the shirt factory and helped the family. On December 17, 1897 she deeded half of the value of the house to her mother provided she would pay one half of the balance of the contract. She was planning to be married and was married on February 23, 1898 to Edward Ruschaupt. Just one month later the youngest child Myrtle E. was married to John Hunter on March 27, 1898. Then on August 30, 1899 Charles D. was married to Cora Whetsell. That left the mother, Mary, alone. As she was near Butler College, she took in a young college man as a boarder. Later she had a smaller home built next door. She moved into it and rented the big house. The family always designated the homes as "the big house" and "the little house." She continued to take in roomers to supplement her small pension until her health failed in 1908. She died on March 24, 1909 at the home of her oldest daughter and son-in-law, George and Barbara Bruckman, on East Raymond Street and is buried with her husband in the Anderson Cemetery on East Tenth Street in Warren Township, Marion County, Indiana.





# Story Sample

In 1900, Mary lived with her daughter, Martha Alice (Huber) Kennedy, at 147 Dillon Avenue in Irvington. Mary remained on Dillon Avenue for most of the remainder of her life. Various family members resided with her for a year or two at a time. When she resided at 151 Dillon Avenue, the George W. Bruckman family and Charles D. Huber's family stayed with her in 1902 and 1903, respectively. In 1906 and 1907, Mary lived with Alva H., Howard, Raymond, and William D. Huber. Finally, the year before she died, Mary returned to 145 Dillon Avenue to live with Harry W. Kennedy.<sup>815</sup> She then died at East Raymond Street, the home of her daughter, Barbara (Huber) Bruckman.<sup>816</sup>
