




Virginia Geological Regions



John Smith's Map







Jamestown Island



Early Jamestowne

- Goal:
 - Identify profitable raw materials such as gold and silver in Virginia to repay the investors back in England.
 - Counter the Spanish Catholic presence with a Protestant presence
- Set up as a profit-oriented trading station
 - Site selected for defensive reasons
 - Lacked plans to grow own food
 - Did not develop wells
 - Gentlemen leaders, artisans, craftsmen, and a few laborers
 - Original settlers unaccustomed to manual labor
 - Experimented with producing a variety of goods







John Rolfe's Tobacco

- Planted West Indian seeds to grow a milder tobacco - *Nicotiana tabacum*
- 1613 first trial export to England
- 20,000 pounds by 1617
- 40,000 pounds by 1618









Tobacco and Need for Workers

- Tobacco
 - Labor intensive crop
 - Inspect for insects
 - Pinch back top of plant to prevent flowering
 - Sorting/drying leaves an art
 - Depletes soil of nutrients quickly
- Workers
 - Indentured servants provided labor for 4 – 7 years and then free
 - Some contracts specified land; most did not
 - First Africans landed in 1619 on a Dutch ship

Headright System

WM. HAY, gent., 250 acs. Yorke Co., 1 Sept. 1658, p. 186, (275). Wly. on land of John Hayward & the southern bounds running by a slash of water which parts the Co. of Yorke & the Co. of Denby. Trans. of 5 pers: Thomas Stephens, Wm. Roberts, Edward Braybrooke, Charles Perry, Richard Willson. Renewed 29 Oct. 1662.

- Initiated by 1619 Charter
- Grant of land, usually 50 acres
 - For transport of self or another person to Virginia
- Purpose of system
 - Provide a steady supply of workers to the colony

General Assembly

- Established 30 July 1619 by Governor George Yeardley at Jamestowne
 - Two burgesses per settlement
 - Established procedures based on parliamentary law
 - Named Church of England as established church
 - Issued regulations and laws on land, tobacco, trade with indigenous populations, settled disputes
- Met at Jamestowne until 1700 when meetings moved to Williamsburg
- 1643 – split by Gov Berkeley into a House of Burgesses (elected) and Governor's Council (appointed)



Virginia Company

Turning Point - 1622

- March 22, 1622 – Powhatan Confederacy attacks colonists
- Intended to stop the expansion of settlers into native territory
- One quarter of Virginia colony killed (347)
 - Names recorded
- Watershed moment and hastened the failure of the Virginia Company in 1624

Colonial Virginia Government

- General Assembly (1619) split in 1634
 - House of Burgesses (elected)
 - Governor's Council (appointed)
- Shires → Counties (1634)
 - County courts
 - Kept land, tax, and probate records
- Anglican parishes
 - Responsible for registering births, marriage and deaths
 - Levied taxes
 - Responsible for poor, roads, and other civil functions

Know Your Ancestor's Location or Role

- Owned land on or lived on Jamestown Island or lived on the Island prior to 1700
- Resident in Virginia at the time of the [1624/25 Muster](#) or earlier
- Virginia Company of London
 - Stockholder
 - Member of investing Guild
- Government Officer
 - Governor, Secretary of State, Treasurer, Attorney General, Clerk of the General Court, Member of the Council or House of Burgesses
- Anglican Minister in Virginia prior to 1700
- Official Indian Interpreter in Virginia prior to 1700.

Finding Aids

Why Use a Finding Aid?

- Gives you clues about whether your ancestor's surname appears in published material
- Points you in the direction of other potential documents



Method of Citation

3 August. Captain Thomas Chadocke of the Somers Islands deposes that six years ago John Snell left there for Virginia where he is supposed to have died. A letter written by Richard Leake of the Somers Islands at the direction of Frances Jones, Snell's mother, has confirmed the death. *(LMC)*.

9 August. Commission to Sir William Berkeley to be Governor of Virginia. The Church of England religion will be observed and every church will provide for its own minister. All persons above the age of 16 are to bear arms. Wills are to be probated. Everyone will build a house in proportion to his land and a Government House is to be built in a more convenient place than James Town. Fifty acres of land are to be granted to every person transported to Virginia since midsummer 1625. *(CSPC)*.



*1. WILLIAM¹ COLE, eldest son of Humphrie Cole, "Clarke" of Tillingham, Essex, England, and his wife Hester,¹ came to Virginia in the *Neptune* in 1618 and at the time of the muster, 1624/5, was living at Elizabeth City, aged 26, with his wife Francis [Frances], aged 27, who came in the *Susan*, 1616, and Roger Farbrase, aged 26, who came in the *Elizabeth*, 1621. Their neighbor was Alexander Mountney who had patented 100 acres in the Corporation of Elizabeth City, 20 Sept. 1624, lying "east upon William Cole."² His own grant of 50 acres at Kecoughtan [Elizabeth City] is of record, 1625.³

William¹ Cole represented Nutmeg Quarter in the House of Burgesses, 1629.⁴ This settlement, bordering the James River in that part of Elizabeth City which became Warwick River County, 1634, was a few miles southeast of "Bolthrope," purchased by William² Cole, 1671, and the seat of the Cole family

Cole had died by 15 Sept. 1664, for on Accomack County, formerly granted "to escheat," was assigned to Richard at Col. Miles Cary, Escheator General,

1608-33, p. 233, in V XIX, pp. 189-90. The one was rector of Okeley Magna, 4 Nov. 1623-17 and now in Virginia (if he be living) my three nephews ... [which] doth belonge to his brother Thomas, Robert and John" and "my sons-in-law John George of Wirtle, Essex, Yeoman."

1 EXPLANATORY NOTES

ANCIENT PLANTER. A colonist in Virginia by 1616, entitled to 100 acres of land provided he paid his own passage and had dwelt in the Colony for three years when application for land was made. In accordance with a predetermined policy of the Virginia Company, no individual assignments of land were made during the first seven years of the Colony's existence. The policy of granting patents for acreage to settlers was inaugurated during the latter part of the regime of Sir Thomas Dale, Governor, 1611-1616.

CALENDAR. The Julian calendar, according to which 25 March was reckoned as the first day of the New Year, was in use together with the Gregorian calendar until 1752 when it was abandoned and the 11 days difference between the two calendars was dropped out of the year. The occurrence of an event between 1 January, the first day of the New Year according to the Gregorian calendar and 25 March, the New Year's day of the Julian calendar, is indicated by a diagonal: thus 16 February 1624/5, which shows that the event took place on 16 February 1624 by the Julian but 1625 by the Gregorian calendar.

COLLEGE LAND. Under provisions of the Great Charter for Virginia, 1618, 10,000 acres of land were set aside in Henrico and the adjoining area Coxendale "for the endowing of a university and college with convenient possessions." Plans then were put under way to establish this "university" for the education of the Indians. The massacre of 1622, which took a heavy toll of life in Henrico, put to an end all plans for a college in that area.

COMPANY LAND. By act of the Council for Virginia, 18 November 1618, each of the four Corporations, Charles City, Henrico, James City, and Kecoughtan (Elizabeth City) was assigned 3,000 acres of land. Those colonists transported to Virginia at the Company's expense were seated on the Company lands and the Company was entitled to one-half of the profits of their labors during seven-year terms. The other half of the profits was to be used to defray costs of government. (*R, Va. Co. III*, p. 101)

CORPORATIONS. In a first attempt to establish governmental divisions in Virginia, seemingly, prior to 17 June 1617 (Alexander Brown, *First Republic*, p. 254) four

ROSCOW⁴ COLE (William³, William², William¹) was usher at the Grammar School at the College of William and Mary, 1744, 1747, was licensed for Virginia, 19 Jan. 1748/9, and received the King's Bounty, 21 Feb. 1748/9, arrived back in Virginia, May 1749, and served as minister of Warwick Parish, Warwick County, 1749-55.³⁴ He died about 1755. He married Rachel Robinson, daughter of Maj. Anthony and Diana (Tabb) Robinson, who was born 4 Oct. 1722, married (2), 29 Sept. 1759 in York County, Charles Turnbull of





Warresqueak (26), George Cole was killed (VCR 3:571).

JOHN COLE

John Cole set sail for Virginia in September 1619 on the *Margaret* of Bristol. He accompanied Captain John Woodlief and went to the colony at the expense of the Society of Berkeley Hundred's investors. Cole was headed for Berkeley Hundred (55), where he was supposed to serve for seven years in exchange for 40 acres. His rate of pay was to be set annually and his wife (who remained behind in England) was supposed to receive support from Berkeley Hundred's investors. John Cole seems to have died within a short time of his arrival in Virginia (VCR 3:187, 197, 199, 213-215; CBE 13-14).

SOLOMON COLE

On August 20, 1630, Solomon Cole witnessed Edward Waters' will, which was made in Elizabeth City (18) (SH 13).

WILLIAM COLE

William Cole went to Virginia in September 1619 on the *Margaret* of Bristol with Captain John Woodlief. He went at the expense of the Society of Berkeley Hundred's investors and was headed for Berkeley Hundred (55), where he was supposed to serve for seven years in exchange for 30 acres. William seems to have died within a short time of his arrival (VCR 3:198, 213; CBE 14).

WILLIAM COLE (COALE)

William Cole (Coale) came to Virginia in 1618 on the *Neptune* and on February 16, 1624, was living in Elizabeth City (18). On September 20, 1624, his land in Elizabeth City was in the hands of Captain Thomas Davis, who appears to have been a tenant. In early 1625, when a muster was taken of Elizabeth City's inhabitants, William was described as the head of a household that included 27-year-old Francis Cole and 26-year-old Roger Farbrase. They shared a dwelling and were relatively well supplied with stored food and defensive weaponry. In May 1625, when a list of patented land was sent back to England, William Cole was credited with 50 acres in Elizabeth City, land that had been planted (seated).

On October 16, 1629, William served as a burgess for the settlers in Nutmeg Quarter (24) (CBE 44, 63; PB 1 Pt. 1:37; VCR 4:558; HEN 1:127; DOR 1:52, 713).

[NO FIRST NAME] COLEMAN

Sergeant Coleman was ordered to arrest Elias LaGuard, one of merchant Richard Stephens' debtors, and bring him to court in Jamestown (1). Since Coleman failed to do so, on March 7, 1629, he was obliged to post a bond guaranteeing that he would comply (MCGC 193).

HENRY COLEMAN

Henry Coleman may have come to Virginia in 1622. On February 26, 1627, he testified that he had been aboard the *Furtherance* when Margaret Biard (Byard) died around August 3, 1622, while enroute to the colony. He said that Nathaniel Basse took custody of her belongings, which were inventoried accurately by William Newman. On January 3, 1633, Henry Coleman received Christopher Windmill's 60-acre leasehold in Elizabeth City (17), subletting it from Francis Hough, who had wed Windmill's widow. On May 30, 1634, Henry Coleman was identified as an Elizabeth City planter whose 60 acres abutted south on the Indian House Thicket. Later in the year, he was excommunicated from his local parish for wearing his hat in church and speaking scornfully, thereby raising the possibility that he was a religious dissenter. On June 6, 1635, he patented 150 acres in Elizabeth City on the basis of three headrights (MCGC 141, 481; PB 1 Pt. 1:147-148, 241).

[NO FIRST NAME] COLFER

Sometime prior to March 22, 1622, Mr. Colfer, an overseer of Lady Elizabeth Dale's Virginia property, loaned corn to Captain George Thorpe of Berkeley Hundred (55), a man who was killed in the Indian attack. On March 7, 1625, the General Court decided that Lady Dale's current overseer, Charles Harmer, would be compensated from Thorpe's estate. Lady Dale owned land on Jamestown Island (1), on the Eastern Shore (72), at Coxendale (64), and in Charles City near Shirley Hundred (41) (MCGC 48).

(New Kent County, 1679-)

ST. PETER'S Parish was formed from Blissland Parish by the following order:

At a Gen'l Court held at James City, April 29th 1679, present Deputy Govn and Councill.

The Parish of Blissland petitioning, yt by unanimous consent of ye whole parish, a Division by sufficient men by them chosen is made of

ye sd p'ish, praying that ye Division be confirmed and foure of the Vestry appearing, and affirming that ye Division was made by consent of ye parish. This Court therefore confirmed the sd Division.¹²

The order specified no metes and bounds for the parish. Dr. Churchill Gibson Chamberlayne described the parish bounds as follows:

At the time of its establishment St. Peter's Parish was bounded on the northeast by the ridge between the Pamunkey and the Mattaponi rivers, on the southeast by John's (or Jack's) Creek (north of the Pamunkey) and by a line beginning at Capt. Bassett's Landing Creek (south of the Pamunkey), and on the southwest by the ridge between the Pamunkey and Chickahominy rivers. There was no boundary established on the northwest side, the Parish extending in that direction, theoretically speaking, indefinitely, while practically speaking it extended only so far as to the farthest point of settlement. Later, when in 1704 St. Peter's Parish was itself divided, the upper (or northwest) portion being established as St. Paul's Parish, the dividing line between the two parishes (Matadequin Creek), which in 1720 became also the dividing line between New Kent and the newly created County of Hanover, became St. Peter's northwest boundary line. . . .

Making up for the losses of territory and inhabitants suffered in 1691, when that part of St. Peter's Parish northeast of the Pamunkey was annexed to St. John's Parish, and in 1704 when St. Paul's Parish was established to the northwest, the General Assembly ordered that on and after March 1, 1725, all that part of the parish of Wilmington lying on the (north) east side of Chickahominy River and above (i.e. northwest of) Blissland Parish as added to by the same Act be added to St. Peters Parish. From 1725 onward then St. Peter's Parish extended from the Pamunkey on the northeast to the Chickahominy on the southwest and from Blissland Parish on the southeast to St. Paul's Parish (Hanover County) on the northwest.¹³

VIRGINIA LAND RECORDS is composed of articles excerpted from *The Virginia Magazine of History and Biography*, the *William and Mary College Quarterly Historical Magazine*, and *Tyler's Quarterly Historical and Genealogical Magazine*. It is primarily a compilation of articles dealing with early Virginia land records namely deeds, surveys, warrants, conveyances, patents, and grants and contains virtually every article pertaining to the transfer and ownership of real property ever published in these periodicals. Most of the articles identify tenants, owners, and occupiers of specific parcels of land and thus have the merit of placing individuals and whole families in a particular place at a definite time. Others are simply listings of landholders—taxpayers and grantees, for example. Perhaps the most interesting are those published by William Stanard under the heading “Abstracts of Virginia Land Patents.” These particular articles contain a great deal of genealogical information not found in the series of abstracts later published by Nell Marion Nugent in *Cavaliers and Pioneers*, the seminal work on Virginia patents and grants. Taken together, the articles assembled here provide a fresh look at the findings of a previous generation of researchers and increase our esteem for the resources of periodical literature.






The Virginia government began recording land patents around 1623 when the royal governor, as the agent of English crown, assumed control over the distribution of unappropriated land within the new







GENEALOGICAL RECORDS AT THE LIBRARY OF VIRGINIA

The Library of Virginia was created by the General Assembly in 1823 to organize, care for, and manage the state's growing collection of books and official records. Today the Library houses a vast collection of materials on Virginia government, history, and culture. In addition to managing and preserving its printed, manuscript, map, and photograph collections, the Library supplies research and reference assistance to state officials, provides consulting services to state and local government agencies and to Virginia's public libraries, administers numerous federal, state, and local grant programs, publishes books on Virginia history, and offers the public a wide array of educational programs. An experienced staff is available to provide advice and assistance in using the rich and varied resources in the collections. For more on the Library's history and holdings, see *The Common Wealth: Treasures from the Collections of the Library of Virginia*, edited by Sandra Gioia Treadway and Edward D. C. Campbell, Jr. (1997).

Manuscript Sources

As the repository of the commonwealth's historically valuable records, the Archives houses a wealth of materials containing genealogical source material. Among these holdings are records of the colonial and state governments; copies of extant county court records such as wills, deeds, orders, and marriage bonds; church records; personal papers; business records; organization records; cemetery records; Bible records; and genealogical notes and charts. There is no comprehensive index to these holdings, but researchers may consult the online Archives & Manuscripts catalog, as well as a variety of published archival guides. Researchers may also consult a series of research notes compiled by the Archives staff.

Tax Records

While there are some extant colonial tithable records, the collection generally begins in 1782 and is composed of personal property and land tax lists arranged by county/city, which are on microfilm up to 1900 for land and up to 1920 for personal property. These include counties now in West Virginia. They are unindexed and contain the names and/or numbers of taxable persons. An in-house guide to tithable records is available. Personal property tax lists for 1787 were published in Nettie Schreiner Yantis and Florence S. Love, comps. *The 1787 Census*

Widening Your Research

Connecting Ancestors

- You may not find one “smoking-gun” record; you may need to build a case with multiple records
- Essential Strategy: Research the ancestor’s associates and neighbors (Cluster Research or FAN Club Research)
- Some records may be less reliable than others; seek originals if you can
- May need to have, and exhaust, several working theories

And keep in mind . . .

- Terms of kinship may have different meanings in 17th-century:
 - Nephews and nieces may be referred to as “cousins”
 - Sometimes “brother” or “sister” can be indications of brothers and sisters within a faith
 - “Father” and “Mother” could refer to in-laws
- Use of “Jr” and “Sr” typically mean younger versus older and don’t necessarily mean kinship

Summary

- Educate yourself about the history of the time period, especially government and religious jurisdictions – that is where the records are
- Don't reinvent the wheel - look at published sources in combination with originals
- Record loss of 17th-century Virginia records doesn't spell doom – try cluster research to circle around your ancestor
