

Introduction

When we think of a Catholic parish, the image that comes to mind is that of a church building. In reality, however, a Catholic parish is a *community*, defined by its geographical area or, in some cases, by the common language and cultural practices of its people. Canon 518 states "As a general rule a parish is to be territorial, that is, one which includes all the Christian faithful of a certain territory. When it is expedient, however, personal parishes are to be established determined by reason of the rite, language, or nationality of the Christian faithful of some territory, or even for some other reason." There are, then, two broad categories of Catholic parishes: the territorial parish and the personal parish.





On his way from Canton to Wooster he took sick, and arriving at the latter place he stopped at Coulter's tavern, where he died suddenly in 1832. Drs. Day and Bissell waited

Edward Dominic Fenwick, O.P. (August 19, 1768 – September 26, 1832) was an American prelate of the Catholic Church, a Dominican friar and the first Bishop of Cincinnati.

Early life [edit]

Edward Fenwick was born August 19, 1768, on the family plantation on the Patuxent River, in the Colony of Maryland to Colonel Ignatius Fenwick and Sarah Taney. Colonel Fenwick was a military figure of the American Revolution and one of the early Catholic families of Maryland. At that time, Jesuit missionaries ministered to Maryland Catholics. His first cousin Benedict J. Fenwick, a Jesuit, became the second bishop of Boston; another cousin, Enoch Fenwick was also ordained a Jesuit priest and was eventually named president of Georgetown College. Many families sent their sons abroad to study, and at sixteen years of age, Edward was sent to the Dominican Holy Cross College in Bornem, near Antwerp, Belgium, where his uncle was a teacher.^[1] The school was under the jurisdiction of the English Province of Dominicans.^[2]

In 1788 Fenwick joined the Dominican Order and entered the seminary at Bornem as a theological student, and chose the name, "Dominic". Edward Dominic Fenwick was ordained a priest on February 23, 1793^[3] and became a professor at the Dominican College. When Belgium was invaded during the French Revolution, Fenwick was imprisoned, but later released upon proof of his American citizenship. The school re-located to Carshalton, England. Later, Fenwick taught at a Dominican school outside London.^[1]

With the assistance of Luke Concanen, assistant to the Master of the Dominican Order, Fenwick received permission to return to the United States and to establish a Dominican college. He arrived in America in the autumn of 1804, accompanied by Friar Robert Angier. He was received by Bishop John Carroll, who

Missionary work [edit]

In 1805, Fenwick traversed the entire [Mississippi Valley](#) looking for a central location to continue his missionary work. Three other Dominican priests were Samuel Thomas Wilson, a Master of Sacred Theology, Robert Antoninus Angier, a Lectorate in Sacred Theology and Preacher General, and William Raymond Tuite.^[2]

In 1806, Fenwick purchased a 500-acre plantation near Springfield, Kentucky. Construction of a [priory](#) and a church began almost immediately and was first inhabited in December 1806 but not completed until 1807. [St. Rose Priory](#) was named for the Dominican [St. Rose of Lima](#), the first native of the Americas to be canonized. In February 1807 the new American Province of St. Joseph was approved. At Fenwick's request, Samuel Wilson was appointed prior.^[4]

The church was dedicated December 25, 1809. St. Rose Priory was the first Catholic educational institution west of the Alleghenies. The first bishop of the new (in 1808) [Diocese of Bardstown](#), [Benedict Joseph Flaget](#), used the priory until the Bardstown [St. Joseph Proto-Cathedral](#) was built. Saint Thomas of Aquinas College was added later, completed in 1812. [Jefferson Davis](#) was among its earliest students.^[1] Like Davis, Fenwick owned many enslaved [African Americans](#).^[5]

The difficulties of life as an itinerant preacher were many, not the least being exposure to extremes of weather. While riding from place to place, he read his breviary on horseback. Fenwick was known to ride forty miles out of his way to visit an isolated family. He often fasted while travelling, in anticipation of celebrating Mass once he reached his destination. Often Fenwick had to swim his horse across swollen streams to reach a mission. Frequently he was obliged while travelling, to spend the night in the Kentucky backwoods, populated by bear and wolves. The missionaries who ministered to the scattered communities on the frontier generally worked alone, and the strain of loneliness and overwork could serve to undermine their health.^[2]

In 1808, Fenwick reached Ohio, where he ministered to predominantly German and Irish families, many of whom knew little English.^[6] In 1817 he was joined by his newly ordained nephew, Fr. Nicholas Dominic Young, OP. The [first church in Ohio](#) was built in Somerset and dedicated to St. Joseph on December 6, 1818. A second log church, dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary, was soon erected in Lancaster. A third was begun in [Cincinnati](#), at the suggestion of Bishop Flaget, who visited the city in the spring of 1818.^[7]

CHAPTER III

BOUNDARIES OF CINCINNATI DIOCESE AND ARCHDIOCESE




AS well known, the first Catholic diocese in the United States was created November 6, 1789, by the bull *Ex hac apostolicæ servitutis specula* of Pius VI, whereby the city of Baltimore was chosen as the episcopal see, and the Right Reverend John Carroll, previously elected by the clergy of Baltimore, appointed bishop of the United States.¹ With the growth of the Catholic Church in the East as well as in the West, it was found necessary in 1808 to erect four new dioceses in the United States and to elevate the diocese of Baltimore to the rank of a metropolitan see. Philadelphia, New York, Boston, and Bardstown were the cities selected for this preferment, and on April 8, 1808, the bull *Ex debito pastoralis officio* was issued by Pius VII, officially calling these dioceses into existence.² By this bull the present territory of the diocese of Cincinnati was constituted part of the diocese of Bardstown, to which was assigned as its territory "the states of Kentucky and Tennessee, and until otherwise provided by this Apostolic See, the territories lying northwest of the river Ohio, and extending to the Great Lakes, which lie between them and the diocese of Canada, and extending along them to the boundaries of Pennsylvania".³

Bardstown, therefore, enjoys the distinction of having been the mother-diocese of Cincinnati, though in time the daughter was to surpass the mother in dignity. The first bishop of Bardstown was Right Reverend Benedict Joseph Flaget, of the Society of St. Sulpice. Having made a visitation of the Northwest territory in 1819, Bishop Flaget became convinced of the necessity of the erection of at least one diocese, and perhaps two, in that territory, and solicited the erection of Cincinnati



History of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati




WHEN the old Cathedral was enlarged, in 1827, it was supposed to be capable of accommodating all who should seek to worship there for a long time to come. Yet, in less than ten years afterwards, it was found necessary to build two additional churches. One of these was the church of St. Mary. The land for it was procured with much difficulty in 1834. Four lots on Pond Street, now Endicott Street, each 20 by 85 feet, were purchased. So anxious was Bishop Fenwick to supply the needs of his people that he personally superintended the erection of the church. By October 14, in the following year, the walls were ready to receive the roof. The first Mass was celebrated in the basement on Christmas Day of the same year, and at Pentecost, May 22, 1836, the edifice having been previously completed, it was dedicated to the service of God under the patronage of the Virgin Mary. Its first pastor was the Rev. William Wiley. His successors for the ensuing ten years were the Rev. P. O'Beirne, Rev. Michael Healy, Rev. Thomas J. O'Flaherty, Rev. John B. Fitzpatrick, and Rev. Patrick Flood. St. Mary's was used as a succursal church during this time. In 1847 it was given into the charge of the Rev. John McElroy, a member of the Society of Jesus. This order has had the pastoral care of the parish ever since.

When Father McElroy left to build the church of the Immaculate Conception and found Boston College, the Rev. Bernardine J. Wiget, S. J., succeeded him at St. Mary's. This priest's name is inseparably associated with the establishment of the first parochial school for boys in Boston. The circumstances attending the event form a most interesting episode in the history of the parish.


In the public schools at that time Catholic children were obliged to sing Protestant hymns, recite passages from the Protestant version of the Bible, and repeat the Lord's Prayer, together with the concluding doxology, according to the Protestant form. Objection was made to these practices in the Spring of 1859, and a warm discussion of the subject ensued. On March 14, Thomas L. Whall, aged ten years, a pupil of the Eliot School, refused to read the Decalogue from the Protestant Bible when requested so to do by McLaurin F. Cooke, the sub-master. Thereupon, Mr. Cooke declared his intention to spend the forenoon in the effort to make the child obey, and began to strike him with a rattan on the hands. The boy held out for thirty minutes, when his hands were swollen badly and bleeding. At this time somebody entered the room and stated that the child's father had given him permission to read the Bible as directed. On being told this he submitted, and Mr. Cooke wiped and put away his rattan. Nearly four hundred boys followed Whall's example; but Mr. Cooke's sense of justice was not equal to the task of punishing them in the same way. These were only suspended from attendance until they should agree to conform to the rules. This was the proper course to have followed in the case of the child, Whall. Considering that his father had taken the responsibility of the boy's act, the punishment, brutal in itself, was a shameful outrage on the little victim, and a most mischievous invasion of parental rights. When the matter was brought to the attention of Bishop Fitzpatrick, he advised submission under protest until an effort should be made to have the school rules amended. He then sent to the school committee the following letter, in which he states the objections to the practices complained of, and urges their abolition:






