

# Early Immigration

# Earliest Immigration

- Scotland's inclusion in Great Britain allowed it to establish settlements in the New World
  - Small, short-lived colonies established
    - Nova Scotia (1629)
    - East Jersey (1683)
    - South Carolina (1684)
    - New Caledonia at Darien near Panama (1698)
    - Darien (New Inverness) Georgia (1736)
  - Much slower momentum of immigration to America by Scots


# Earliest Immigration

- Scots had been migrating to European areas since Middle Ages
- 16th & 17th centuries, they helped colonize:
  - The Hebrides
  - Orkney
  - Shetland
- Approximately 50,000 Scots were in Ulster by 1650



The Scots Irish are those who had arrived in Ulster from Scotland and ultimately moved on to America, many arriving in Pennsylvania.

The ships they took from Belfast were often those that had come from the American Colonies with flax seed and, now empty, made money carrying passengers back to America.




## Map of short-lived settlements

# Nova Scotia - History

- Originally the Colony of Acadia (French)
- 1621 – France cedes parts of it to England
- 1621 – King James I of England (James VI of Scotland) grants a charter to create the colony of Nova Scotia (New Scotland)
- Settled by Sir William Alexander of Menstrie in 1629
- Settlement lasts only until 1632

# East Jersey

- The Jerseys were separate from 1664-1702
- Quakers from Scotland settled in East Jersey
- Had suffered ill treatment in Scotland
- During the 1680's, about 700 Scots arrived, mostly from Aberdeen and Montrose



# South Carolina

- 1684 – Arrival of 148 Scots from Gourock
- They were Covenanters (Covenant Presbyterians)
- Town was named Stuarts Town
- 1686 – Attacked by Spanish and Indian allies

# Darien Scheme

- Trading colony at Darién on the isthmus of Panama
- 1696 – 2,500 Scottish settlers set out
- Lack of:
  - Provisions
  - Colonizing experience
- Disease and Spanish attacks

# Darien, Georgia

- 1736 – Founded in January, named for the failed colony in Panama
- Scots came mainly from Inverness and referred to the town as “New Inverness”
- 1739 – Some Scots abandoned Darien for South Carolina
- Scots from here involved in the American Revolution

# Push Factors

- Religious persecutions:
  - Quakers
  - Presbyterians
- Deportations (called “transportations”):
  - Criminals
  - Debtors
  - Losers of civil or ecclesiastical battles




The Scottish prisoners found on this website are prisoners of war from two battles of the Wars of the Three Kingdoms, the first, in Scotland in 1650 and, the second, in England in 1651.

On 03 Sep 1650, the BATTLE OF DUNBAR, took place at *Dunbar, Scotland* and resulted in many Scottish prisoners of war being marched to Durham Cathedral where they were kept before being moved on to other places. Out of the thousands in Durham only about 150 were sent to the *Massachusetts Bay Colony* via the ship, *Unity*. A passenger list for the ship *Unity* has yet to be found.

On this site a list has been compiled with over 180 suggested names of men found in New England who appear to fit the criteria of a *Scottish prisoner of war*. [View the documentation](#) and explore the links below to see if your ancestor may be on the list.

- November 13: Battle of Sheriffmuir

- July 23: Prince Charles lands on Eriskay Island
- September: Jacobites experience victories in England

1746


- Jacobites retreat into Scotland but continue to fight
- Battle of Culloden ends Jacobitism

# Voluntary Immigration

# Voluntary Immigration

- 17th century – came mainly from the Lowlands
- 18th century – increase of emigration from the Highlands
- Most traveled as indentured servants



# Highlands & Lowlands

- Lowlands:
  - Inhabited the east and south of Scotland
  - Partly Teutonic origins
  - Spoke a form of English derived from Teutonic tongue
- Highlands:
  - Center and west of Scotland
  - Spoke Gaelic
  - Barren lands
  - Required its men to raid for supplies

# Immigration

- Began to increase in the 1730s
- Increase in rents
- 1763–1775 – Estimates of 25,000 Scots immigrating
  - Small amount went to Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island
  - Majority settled in the colonies
- Religious discrimination of the Roman Catholics

# Early Scottish Settlers in Canada

- Earliest settlement 1620s Cape Breton and Bay of Fundy
  - Settlements failed and surrendered to France in 1632
- Highland Scots
  - Peak period 1770 to 1815
  - Arrival of the *Hector* in 1773 to Pictou, NS
- Scottish Catholics to PEI 1772
  - Families of MacDonald, Campbell, Beaton, and MacIntyre

# Cape Fear, North Carolina

- 1739 – 360 Highland Scots settle in North Carolina
  - Encouraged by Gabriel Johnston, royal governor
  - Were provided a 10-year tax exemption for emigrating
- Most Highlanders arriving in the early 1700s had land grants to the Upper Cape Fear region
- Lowlanders tended to settle in the Lower Cape Fear region
- Highlanders and Lowlanders intermarried in N.C.

Many Scots, especially

# Post-American Revolution

- Many Scots elected to move to Canada or back to Scotland
- 1790 Census Population
  - 3,929,214 people
  - 6% or approximately 260,000 were Scottish
  - Scottish would have included the Scots Irish

# 19th Century

- Canada was more popular than the U.S. for immigrants
- U.S. immigration 1820–1851:
  - Seldom reached 1,000 immigrants per year
  - Some years under 100
  - Total of 10,525 in those 31 years



- Evictions of tenants
- 1750–1860
- Two phases:
  - Mid-18th century
  - 1815–1850
- Went against dùthchas – clan members inalienable right to rent land in clan territory
- Farmers becoming crofters



# Hungry Forties

- Potato famine in the Highlands
  - Clearance and emigration
  - 11,000 people provided with “assisted passage”, 1846–1856
  - 5,000 emigrated to Australia
  - Unknown number paid for their own emigration
  - Unknown number assisted by Colonial Land and Emigration commission



We hold many records relating to crime and criminals. Ironically, you are more likely to find information about someone who committed a crime than about a respectable, law-abiding citizen. Information about crime and criminals can be found in the records of criminal courts, criminal investigations and prisons.

Many of these records are out-stored and we require 24 hours' notice before they can be produced. We recommend that you contact the [Historical Search Room](#) to check the location of records before visiting. Many of the records are un-indexed and we do not make speculative searches through un-indexed records for enquirers.

## Transportation

Information on prisoners sentenced to be transported can be found in the registers for the local prisons (see below) serving the courts where they were sentenced. However, because prisoners were shipped from England there is often further information in the Home Office records at [The National Archives](#).

We hold microfilm copies of the transportation registers, 1787-1870 (our reference RH4/160/1-7). The registers are arranged chronologically by the date of departure of each ship. They record the name of the convict and where, when and for how many years he or she was sentenced. The State Library of Queensland has compiled a database from the [British convict transportation registers](#) of 123,000 of the estimated 160,000 convicts transported to Australia during the period 1787 to 1879.

A small series of transportation papers (JC41) can be found in High Court records for the period 1653-1853. The early period mainly consists of certificates of transportation for convicts to America in the 1770s; the latter papers date from 1837-1853, and consist of lists of convicts and extract sentences of transportation.

The criminal trials for individuals sentenced to transportation can be found in the papers of the High Court of Justiciary (above).

## Witchcraft

Witchcraft was a criminal offence between 1563 and 1736. Witchcraft trials are found in the records of the High Court of Justiciary (JC), the Privy Council (PC) and local kirk sessions (CH). In addition to the main series of High Court papers, JC40 contains a number of indictments, summons and verdicts in witchcraft cases, c.1572 -1709.

[The Survey of Scottish Witchcraft](#) is a database of Scottish witchcraft cases maintained by Edinburgh University. It has superseded the best source available in print 'A sourcebook of Scottish Witchcraft', compiled by Christina Larner and others (Glasgow, 1977).

## High Court of Justiciary (reference JC)

The principal source for information on crime and criminals is the records of the High Court of Justiciary, Scotland's supreme criminal court. The court has exclusive jurisdiction over serious crimes, in particular murder, rape, treason, heresy, counterfeiting and crimes of a sexual nature. It sits permanently in Edinburgh, and travels on circuit throughout Scotland. The court also acts as a court of appeal from criminal proceedings in the sheriff (or inferior) courts.



Prisoners who were sentenced to be transported were always tried in the High Court.

We normally receive records from the High Court when they are more than 10 years old. Please note that the following High Court records are closed to the public for 100 years and cannot be accessed without the permission of the court:

- Records of criminal trials (JC26)
- Records of criminal appeals (JC31, JC34 and JC67)
- Minute books (JC5, JC9, JC11, JC12 and JC13)
- Books of Adjournal (JC15 and JC72)
- Judicial opinions (JC70)
- Punishment part hearings (JC74)

The main record of a High Court trial is the bundle of case papers known as the 'process' or 'small papers', (also 'case papers' or 'sitting papers') (JC26). They usually include a copy of the indictment, which sets out the charges against the accused, depositions, confessions and other information on the accused and the crime, together with information about witnesses and jurors. You may also find statements by the accused and other papers produced as evidence, but case papers do not include transcripts of trials.
