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
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# History, Part One 1800-1850

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### Disestablishment

- State constitution of 1818 disestablished the Congregational Church and eliminated property ownership for voting
- While the church is still powerful, commerce is driving newer towns and cities



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### Thomaston

- 1780 - Ecclesiastical Societies in Waterbury of Northbury and Westbury incorporated as Watertown
- 1805 - Residents east of the Naugatuck River form Plymouth
- 1875 - western portion of Plymouth set off as Thomaston



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
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**Gradual Abolition of Slavery**

- 1790 – 2764 enslaved persons (1.16%)
- 1800 – 951 enslaved persons (0.38%)
- 1810 – 310 enslaved persons (0.12%)
- 1820 – 97 enslaved persons (0.04%)
- 1830 – 25 enslaved persons (0.008%)
- 1840 – 17 enslaved persons (0.005%)

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**Nancy Toney of Windsor**

- Born 1774
- Freed in 1848 by “An Act to Prevent Slavery”
- Died Windsor, Conn., 19 Dec. 1857

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### The rise of mill towns

- Early 19<sup>th</sup> century textile mills
- Consolidation of towns
- Second Industrial Revolution in the mid 19<sup>th</sup> century results in greater levels of immigration



Year of Great Falls, Putnam, Conn.

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### Putnam

- 1708 – Killingly established from “northern Plainfield”
- 1785 – “Thompson Parish” set off as its own town
- 1855 – Putnam created from Killingly, Thompson, and Pomfret (1713)



Putnam was made out of the first settlements of Killingly, Thompson, and Pomfret.

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
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

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### New Towns 1838-1856

**PUTNAM,**

Was incorporated a town in 1855. The township is triangular in shape, being formed from the north part of Killingly, south part of Thompson, and the N. E. section of Pomfret. The village, (formerly called Quinnebang,) on the line of the Railroad and Quinnebang River, is 41 miles E. from Hartford, 81 from New Haven, and 10 miles from Brooklyn, the County town. Cargill's grist-mill, the first in the village, was erected about the year 1776. This was repaired by Mr. Wilkinson, in 1816, who first commenced the manufacturing business in the place.

The village now contains 4 cotton mills, 660 looms, manufacturing 5,000,000 yards of cotton goods annually, valued at \$350,000; one woolen mill, one steam machine shop, 10 stores, and 4 shoe manufacturing establishments. Population of the village is estimated at upwards of 1,600, the township at upwards of 2,300.

**BRIDGEWATER,**

Was incorporated a town in 1856. It was formed from the south-eastern section of New Milford, formerly called the 'Neck,' and more recently Bridgewater Society.

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**Changes in Record Keeping 1850s**

- Births, along with marriages and deaths, being kept at the time of the event in sequential order
- Additional details about occupations of father, ages, and birthplaces of parents
- Additional information added in later years

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
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
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**Is there anything more?**

- Single page certificates for vital events (mostly marriages) began in some towns in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century
- Most relevant genealogical information from these certificates is stated in the index books available at Town Halls
- Main item often omitted is place of marriage.

If any FamilySearch Microfilm has births less than 100 years old, it cannot be made digitally available

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
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## Witness Testimony



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**Shift in Congregations**

- With the disestablishment of the Congregational Church, many more places of worship are erected, especially Catholic congregations after significant Irish immigration, and later immigration from Quebec, Italy, Poland, etc.
- Many religious records are at the Connecticut State Library and Catholic Archives
- Faiths besides Congregational and Catholic have less indexes

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
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
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

- While father John Nelson claims in 1910 he was naturalized, no naturalization record has been found (and name is quite common)

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**Land Records**

- Grantor can mention how he acquired the land
- Can sign his name with his wife
- Narrows down the chronology
- Land description can be compared to other deeds
- Provides clues:
  - Where someone lived and when
  - Origins and family migrations
  - Prove family relationships



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**Tip**

You ancestor did not need to reside in a community to own land there.

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**Tip**

Remember not all deeds were recorded at the date of the sale.

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
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## Lineage Societies

- Immediate generations *usually* more reliable



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

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
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
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## Family Genealogies

- Starting in the mid 19<sup>th</sup> century, largely with a focus on the “male line”
- The 1864 Hyde Genealogy a notable exception to this trend
- May be the only source for recent events

VI Parna Hyde (1867), born at Franklin, Conn., 15 Dec., 1874, daughter of Joseph Hyde (1831), by his second wife, Jaelita Abel (2472), was a great granddaughter of Thomas Hyde (7) of the third generation. She on 15 Dec., 1811, Charles Armstrong, b. 2 Aug., 1788, at Franklin, son of Lee Armstrong and Ednah Smith of Franklin. He was a farmer, and they settled at Franklin, where she d. 25 Jan., 1841. He then m. the widow Estlin (Elihu) Tracy, and was living at Franklin in 1857, without issue by her.

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

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

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

### Moses Lyon 3<sup>rd</sup> (1793-1865)

- First Moses in Ancestral Line Moses<sup>6</sup> Lyon (*William<sup>5</sup>, Caleb<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3-2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>*)
- Called “3d” from first marriage through the 1830s, then called “2d” until the early 1860s, then no suffix




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

### The parents of Mrs. Tryphena Kendall Paine

- No birth or first marriage record, and no parents on 1849 death record
- First husband Eli Kendall dies 1808, marries secondly 1809, Amos Paine
- Parents given in 1932 genealogy

- In 1880 genealogy on her second husband's family, she is identified as a sister of General William Eaton (1764-1811),
- William was born at Woodstock, son of Nathaniel and Sarah
- Amos Paine published William's biography

**THE COMPILER'S PREFACE.**

GEN. EATON expired, June 1st, 1811. 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
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
