

assistant attorney general. This rep-
resents their total experience in fed-
eral office. Only three of the ten have
had a national reputation in any
real sense of the term, although none
of them was obscure.

As to their progressiveness there is
no question. This is attested by the
fact that William Jennings Bryan is at
their head, but several others in their
special fields have been almost equal-
ly progressive. One has been promi-
nent in the government's prosecution of
the Wilson anti-trust bill in New Jersey,
one is a labor leader, and has been a
member of the interstate commerce
commission, and two others have been
"chickens" among the progressives in
congress in connection with the
"Trusts."

Taken all in all it is a list of men
who have made their mark in their
fields, who are vigorous and who, in
the parlance of the day, are "big
wires."

William Jennings Bryan, secretary of
state in President Wilson's cabinet, re-
ceives his high post office in this
career. He was born Dec. 16, 1857,
at Salem, Mo. Mr. Bryan was gradu-
ated and received highest honors at
Illinois College, Jacksonville, Ill., 1881 and
Union College of Law, Chicago, Ill., 1883.
He was admitted to the Illinois bar in
1884.

He practiced his profession at Joliet,
Ill., until 1887, when he moved to
Lincoln, Mo. He was a member of
congress from 1891 to 1895 from the
First Nebraska district. Mr. Bryan re-
ceived the Democratic nomination for
United States senator in 1896, but was
defeated in the state primaries by
John M. Thurston. Mr. Bryan was col-
lector of the Omaha Wood-Using Board
from 1894 to 1896. In 1898 he was a dis-
cussant at the national lumber trade con-
vention. He wrote the famous slogan
passed into the party platform in 1896
"No special tax and no competition for
forests." He was defeated after a
wonderful campaign.

At the outbreak of the Spanish-American
war in 1898, Mr. Bryan served the Third
Congress of Nebraska, to address and
debate the question of annexation of
Cuba. He was a member of the
Democratic presidential campaign of
1900, and was defeated by William McKinley.

Mr. Bryan's career in the lower
house of congress continued until 1908, at

chief clerk in the department of the
interior, 1898 to 1900, and three times
delegate to the Democratic national ex-
ecutive committee. In 1904 he co-ed-
ited the State Chronicle and North
Carolina with the News and Observer,
and his name bore its editor. Mr.
Daniels recently was appointed as
head of the Bureau of Land-Office con-
nected in the re-organized organization.

William C. Redburn, who was made
secretary of commerce in President
Wilson's cabinet, was a mem-
ber of the Fifty-seventh congress, from
the Fifth New York district. Mr. Red-
burn was born at Albany, N. Y., June
18, 1838. He received a legal educa-
tion at Pittsfield, Mass. He was
treasurer of the F. H. W. Lumber com-
pany, Brookton, since 1867. He had
been president of the Wagon Trust

ing Machine company in 1861 and be-
came president of the F. H. W. Lumber
company in 1867.
Judge Daniels compared with the
Sirocco, Boreas, and other winds, with
which he has had much to do. He has
been twice president of the American
Lumber Association, and has been in
charge of the lumber trade in the
District of Columbia. He was
secretary of the Federal New York
district in 1890 and served in the Sixty-
second congress until his recent re-
nomination.

David Franklin, who served as the
new secretary of the American Lumber
Association, was born in
St. Louis, Mo., 1848 and received
his law degree from the University
of Missouri, Columbia, Mo.,
N. C., Feb. 12, 1868. He received

degrees from the University of
Harvard, and was the first

division of the eastern district of Ten-
nessee. He was admitted to the bar
of Tennessee in 1885 and practiced at
Chattanooga.

He removed to New York city in
1897. For a number of years and in
1903 he was partner with William
McAdoo in the practice of law. In
ensuing years he has been connected
with railway enterprises.

James Clark McFeyers, attorney
general in President Wilson's cabinet,
has been a prominent New York law-

yer. He was born in Elkhart, Todd
county, Ky., Feb. 2, 1862. He was a
disciple of Oscar W. Underwood in
the law school of the University of Vir-
ginia.

Mr. McFeyers practiced law at
Nashville, Tenn., for many years and
was professor in the law school of
Vanderbilt university from 1900 to
1902. He became assistant attorney
general of the United States in 1903
and held office to 1907. Subsequently
he took up the practice of law in New
York and has been retained by the
United States in many important law
suits, principal among which were the
suits against the tobacco trust and the
consolidation of the railroads. He was
during the Bryan free silver
campaign. Mr. McFeyers was known
as a cold Democrat.

The new secretary of the Interior,
Franklin Knight Lane, is a lawyer. He
was born on Prince Edward Island,
July 15, 1864. He received his bachel-

education in the University of Califor-
nia and began the practice of law in
San Francisco in 1889. He was corpora-
tion counsel for that city from 1891
to 1902. Mr. Lane was assistant for
the state of California in 1902. He
in 1904 Mr. Lane received his bachel-
or's degree in law from the University
of Nashville, Tenn. He has been a mem-
ber of the Supreme Court of the United States

since 1909. He has been a mem-
ber of the Supreme Court of the United States

man from Texas since 1896. Mr.
Burleson was born at San Marcos,
Tex., June 7, 1863. He was educated
at the Agricultural and Mechanical
college of Texas, Baylor university of
Waco and the University of Texas. In

1881 he was admitted to the bar. He
was assistant city attorney of Aus-
tin from 1885 to 1894.

In 1891 Mr. Burleson was appointed
by the governor of Texas to be at-
torney of the Twenty-sixth judicial
district. He held this office for three
successive terms until 1899, when he
was elected to the house of representa-
tives without opposition in his own
party. He has been re-elected each
succeeding year.

Lindsay M. Garrison, new secretary
of war, was born at Camden, N. J., on
Nov. 28, 1864, the son of the Rev. Jos-
eph P. Garrison. He was graduated
from the Exeter Preparatory school
and spent a year at Harvard studying
law. On leaving Harvard Mr. Garris-
on entered the service of the law firm
of Hedding, Jones & Carson of Phila-
delphia. He finished his law studies

at the University of Pennsylvania and
was admitted to the bar in Philadel-
phia in 1886 and to the New Jersey
bar in 1888 as an attorney and in 1892
as a counselor.

In 1898 Mr. Garrison formed the law
firm of Garrison, McAnnis & Car-
roll in Jersey City but left that firm in
June, 1904, when the office of vice
chairman was offered to him by
Charles H. Magie. When his seven
year term expired in 1911 he was re-
appointed by Governor Fisher to serve
until 1918. Mr. Garrison is the brother
of Judge Charles G. Garrison of the
supreme court of New Jersey.

for hauling of lumber, etc. In Hills-
boro woolen mill and underwear factory
are running steadily, and employing
the usual volume of hands. This con-
dition causes retail trade to be of good
volume, and collections are reported
fair. No change in general conditions
is noted.

In Nashua a settlement has been af-
fected between owners of large shoe
shops and its employees so that work
will be resumed there as soon as possi-
ble. Large addition is in course of
construction at one of the paper mills
and the new Y. M. C. A. building is
nearly completed. Cotton mills,
lumber manufacturers, machine shops
and the numerous other industries of
the city are all well employed. The
unreasonable winter weather has af-
fected retail trade in most lines and
has also caused a great deal of sickness
which causes collections to be rather
slow. In Plymouth sporting goods
factory employing the usual number of
hands and business is reported of good
volume. Lumber and peg mills are
busy as are local glove manufacturers.
There has been very little new build-
ing going on this winter so that there
is less demand for labor employed in
the trades connected with same. There
is a good attendance at Normal school
and retail trade holds fairly good in
spite of unfavorable conditions. A
light fall of snow with thaw and freeze
following has given this region better
bedding conditions than in other parts
of the state. Collections are still rather
slow. In Ashland paper mill is run-
ning as usual, business at woolen mill
is reported of good volume and knit-
ting plants run steadily. Lumber mill
which was burned is to be rebuilt at
once. Labor on the whole seems to be
in good demand. Collections are re-
ported rather slow. In Woodstock and
North Woodstock there is good demand
for labor in lumbering operations;
weather conditions have been rather
unfavorable for this work, however, as
the snow in the woods is in most places
under a foot in depth. There has been
bedding here for some weeks. Retail
trade is very quiet as is usual at this
season of the year and collections are
fairly slow.

The Wood-Using Industries of New Hampshire.

A report prepared by the U. S. Forest
Service and being issued by the Forestry
Commission brings out the fact that
there are 420 manufacturing plants in
New Hampshire which make wood into
finished products. These factories, ex-
clusive of the sawmills, of which there
are 474, represent \$1,000,000 of capital
and employ over 9,000 wage earners.

The purpose of making the study was
to furnish lumberland owners and manu-
facturers with information as to the
kinds of timber and the average
prices paid and the uses made of
different kinds of wood in process of
manufacturing. The report contains
and discusses every kind of wood used,
and contains a directory of all manu-
facturers in the state according to the
products they make. It enables wood-
land owners to sell their timber to better
advantage, and manufacturers to find
out the best products of certain mills
with which they may be desirous of
doing business. The report is a most
valuable one.

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



ALBERT WOOLSEN, LAST UNION ARMY VET, DIES AT 109
Albert Woolsen, last Union Army veteran of the Civil War, died today and the Grand Army of the Republic died with him. He was 109.
The old drummer boy who was "scared to death" the first time he fired a cannon outlived some 2,675,000 of the Boys in Blue.
Woolsen died in St. Luke's Hospital where he had been confined several times recently because of lung congestion. Doctors said the congestion was brought on chiefly because of his advanced age.
Hospitalized in May, Woolsen spent Memorial Day at his Duluth home, then returned to St. Luke's the following day. He had been confined since.
Woolsen was senior vice commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, which at its peak in 1890 had 408,489 members. It was decided at the last encampment of the Union veter-



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

- If a newspaper did not exist in that community search for a neighboring town / city newspaper
- Contact local historical societies for newspaper morgue books, or loose papers when microfilm or digital options are not available.





- The G.A.R. held an annual National Encampment every year from 1866 to 1949.
- At the final encampment in Indianapolis, Indiana, in 1949, the few surviving attendees voted to retain the existing officers in place until the organization's dissolution.
- As a result, Theodore Penland of Oregon, the G.A.R.'s Commander at the time, was its last. At the time of the last national encampment, 16 members were still living and six were able to attend.

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

- **The Loyal Ladies League** was established in 1881 as an auxiliary to the G.A.R. In 1886 the organization went more national and changed its name to **The Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic**. It was finally incorporated by an act of the 86th Congress on June 17, 1959.

HISTORY

On April 15, 1865, as word of President Lincoln's death spread throughout the country, three Union Army Officers, Thomas Ellwood Zell, a former Lt. Colonel in a Pennsylvania Regiment; Samuel Brown Mitchell, commissioned as the Surgeon of the Eighth Pennsylvania Cavalry; and Peter Dirck Keyser who had served in the 91st Pennsylvania Infantry, met in Philadelphia to discuss the tragic news. Rumors from Washington of a conspiracy to destroy the Federal Government by the assassination of its leaders prompted the three officers to call other officers and former officers together to form an organization that could help thwart future threats to the National Government.

- Incorporated as "**The National Alliance of the Daughters of Veterans of the United States of America**" on December 12, 1885, in Massillon, Ohio. They were endorsed by The Grand Army of the Republic at the 34th Annual Encampment held in Chicago, Illinois, 1900.
- Name changed to **Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War** at the 35th National Convention held in Grand Rapids, Michigan, 1925.
- Name changed to **Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, 1861-1865** at the 54th National Convention held in Des Moines, Iowa 1944.





WILLIAM BRYAN HUTTON.

William Bryan Hutton, born in Greene County, Ala., February 15, 1841, was the fifth child of Dr. A. D. and Mrs. E. H. Hutton, both of whom were natives of South Carolina, but residents of Alabama from their early youth.

Dr. Hutton was a relative of John C. Calhoun, and taught his son Calhoun doctrines of patriotism and government. As soon as his State seceded William Hutton at once left college and entered the tented field.

He was retiring and sedate, exhibiting the most delicate respect for others; he was most exemplary in his habits; he was energetic and apt in his studies, and

always maintained a high position in his classes. In the fall of 1857 he matriculated at the University of Virginia. During his course of nearly four years he had received diplomas in several languages. Through the influence of Dr. Gesner Harrison he had determined to complete his study of ancient languages by a course in Germany. During his fourth session, however, Alabama withdrew from the Union, and he returned home and joined the North Sumter Rifles

vision hospital. He died and was buried under an apple tree near the road. After the war his body was removed to Spottsylvania C. H., and his grave marked by a stone erected by his only sister, Mrs. D. H. Williams.

After his death, among the many letters received, one of his comrades writes: "After the first battle of Fredericksburg, he was elected junior second lieutenant, and his conduct justified the correctness of our choice. He was a skillful drillmaster. He was often consulted by his superiors in rank, when on the field, as to the proper execution of a movement, and he was regarded by all as being in the line of promotion."

JAMES POLK FIELDER.

James Polk Fielder departed this life January 21, 1900, in Greene County, Ark. He was born in Maury County, Tenn., November 28, 1837, and was reared in Hickman County. He enlisted in the Confederate army in April, 1861, in Capt. Tom P. Bateman's Company, the first made up in Hickman County, Eleventh Tennessee Regiment, Col. Raines, and afterwards commanded by Col. (later Gen.) G. W. Gordon, now of Memphis, Tenn. Comrade Fielder was in the battles of Perryville, Murfreesboro, Chickamauga, and all the later battles fought by that prince of warriors, Gen. Cheatham, surrendering with Joe Johnston.

A. H. LAHATTE.

Albert Henry LaHatte, of Cayuga, Miss., was accidentally killed on September 30, 1899, by a fall from the upper tier of Tallahala Bridge, upon which he was working. Comrade LaHatte was born in Georgia, and at the age of twenty enlisted at Columbus in Company E, Tenth Georgia Regiment, under Col. Cummings. He was with Johnston at Bull Run and under



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

MEMBERSHIP ELIGIBILITY

Those eligible for membership are women at least 16 years of age who are lineal or collateral blood descendants of men and women who served honorably in the Army, Navy, or Civil Service of the Confederate States of America, or who gave Material Aid to the Cause. Women who were adopted are eligible only through the bloodline of the biological parent. Also eligible are those women who are lineal or collateral blood descendants of members or former members of UDC.

No Confederate ancestor who took the Oath of Allegiance before April 9, 1865, shall be eligible to be used for application for membership. If proof of further Confederate service is available, thereby nullifying the Oath of Allegiance, the ancestor shall be considered for approval.


