#### Pertinent information available about individual:

I believe that Anna Hanson is my 4th Great Grandmother. Not much is known about her. I found a will that said she was the daughter of Solomon Hanson and was able to trace that line back quite easily. Then I realized that THIS Anna Hanson was by the time of the will, married to Samuel Arlin and possibly had many children by that time and Solomon Hanson's will stated that Anna Hanson was unmarried. Wrong Anna Hanson. Darn! Now I know little about Anna's life before she married Samuel Arlin. From 1790-1850 I can trace her whereabouts through the Northfield, New Hampshire Federal census. She lived to be quite old and the 1850 census puts her in a Northfield Poor Farm at the age of about 90.

#### Specific question(s) or goals for consultation:

I would like to find Anna Hanson's birth and death records if they exist and the names of her parents, a marriage record for Anna Hanson and Samuel Arlin and a list of their children. There is quite a bit of speculation on Ancestry and FamilySearch about who her and Samuel Arlin's children were and there are at least 12 possible suggestions, but with hardly any source material. I have many DNA matches (Ancestry) with the possible Arlin children and have traced their families as well. I'd like to talk about them. I guess that's a lot to ask for in one consultation!! I'll take what help I can get to answer any of these questions.

Anna Hanson's birth records. In general, I have traced these Anna Hansons to different families but wanted a record close by.

Some of the WikiTree entries are not mine but are ones that I have checked.

Other sources checked included Quaker marriage records for Anna Hanson and Samuel Arlin. (Solomon Hanson's children are all recorded in the Quaker marriage records).

Northfield, Dover, Canterbury and surrounding towns, including Barrington, New Hampshire histories and town records (on FamilySearch) Hanson genealogies at the Dover NH Public Library, Find-a-Grave records.

Family genealogies mention several of the Arlin children as the children of Samuel Arlin and Anna Hanson. As far as I can tell, none of the Arlin children have actual birth records on file or anything except a mention in other genealogies or histories and later in the census records. I have also done searches in newspaper records, though maybe not specifically for Anna Hanson.

In "The Bysshe family Genealogy from The Sanders-Bysshe Families and Connection . . ." by Jack Sanders gives her great-grandmother as "? Bostock" a likely member of the immense Bostock family of Cheshire. This was the situation for many years. Now a great-grandmother has appeared on the Internet with a marriage document apparently available on Geneanet with entries as well on Family Search.

Is Alice real?

And yes Ursula, the American, is an aunt of Percy.

Is that marriage record real? Was Alice, daughter of George, the Bostock ancestor?

**Pertinent information available about individual:**

Felicia, also known as Rachele, is a special Italian-American. We know a lot about her husband Francesco Masi's family. He and her eldest son, Vincent, were the first professors of art and music at Georgetown.

They had a family orchestra that played at parties first in Boston and then in Washington; they founded a successful jewelry business when they moved to Washington DC that became "Galts," once Washington's top jewelry store. Her son Serafino carved the USA Treaty Seal for the State Department.

She was a foreigner in Frascati, Papal States, when she met and married her husband. (There's a rumor that she was only 13 when she married.) Here father Nocola Aconfora (There are many variant spellings of the name) was listed as a Neapolitan in her marriage record. I've had genealogist search for birth records for her in Naples and Rome and have come up with nothing.

There a lot of circumstantial evidence that makes Nicola Aconfora a canon lawyer in Rome working on the interests of the kingdom of Naples.

**Specific question(s) or goals for consultation:**

Yes, there's a lot of circumstantial evidence.

They lived in Frascati where Rome's upper crust came every summer to escape the Fever. Nicola was prosperous. Just before they came to America their family--with 11 children--stayed in Nicola's house in Naples for almost a year. He must have had a big house. Also, there's a Nicola Aconfora who was a patron of his family's church in Naples, Santa Maria d'Aiuto; uncles have impressive monuments in the church. It was probably our Nicola.

I'm looking for other avenues of research. Possibly identifying what Nicola was doing in Rome. Was he a canon lawyer like other members of his family?

**Briefly cite sources already reviewed:**

Birth and Death records in Rome and Naples have been plumbed with no luck.

There is, however, an really interesting DNA connection to an Italian-American from Brooklyn whose only Neapolitan relations are Dukes and princes and who is the descendant of a few popes--including the infamous Alexander Borgia

They're an interesting family. Is there any way to get a grad student interested in Italian-American history to take them up? Nicola, ? canon lawyer, ? probably had a legal issue at the Vatican that he was working on. I think Naples was under interdict at the time. Can Vatican documents be accessed?

#### Pertinent information available about individual:

He was born between 1740 and 1749 according to different sources. A military pension application he submitted in 1832 states that he was born 6 July 1749 in Boston. Family correspondence from his great-grandson Rodney F. Johonnot indicates that he was born in "a large yellow house standing on what was then Ann Street not far from Faneuil Hall." This letter, dated 25 December 1919, also speculates that Prince may have been illegitimate, as he "was taken as a child of nine months by a Mrs. Messer of Methuen and brought up by her, though never adopted."

There was a black servant in the household where he seems to have been born; some people assume that Prince was the offspring of this woman and one of the white Johonnet men. Rodney Fuller thought it more likely that his mother was a Johonnet. In a letter dated 12 July 1920, he recounts two different people commenting that Prince's father was a British admiral. John Rowe's diary recounts many dinners involving Rowe, a Johonnet, and officers visiting the wharfs. Rodney's letter also tell a story of Prince's mother giving his daughter Abigail a hair comb "that was brought over from France by an admiral."

Prince Johonnot is included in the National Park Service's book [Patriots of Color](#). It is likely that he was bi-racial, as early census records enumerate him as black, and later ones as white.

He married Mehitable Emerson in Methuen, perhaps in 1773. She was born 6 March 1749 in Methuen and died 7 December 1837 in Goffstown, NH.

While he was living in Methuen, he was a minute man in Captain John Davis' Company; they marched to Cambridge. He was then attached to the Massachusetts Regiment commanded by "Colonel Joseph or James Frye" of Andover MA. They marched to Bunker Hill on the night of 16 June 1775 and were in the battle the following day. He returned to Cambridge and later to Methuen after serving for eight months.

After the war, he, Mehitable and their family moved to Goffstown, NH, where Prince became a surveyor of roads. In 1830, they were enumerated in New Boston, NH.

Prince died 25 May 1836 in Goffstown.
