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Symbols

- There are several symbols used within handwritten items
- Especially prevalent in
 - marginal notes
 - register style pre-printed tables
 - Family registers
- Important to remember when working in church records and sometimes civil registers

 † = gestorben (died)
 (*) = außereheliche Geburt (illegitimately born)
 ~ = getauft (christened)
 ◦ = verlobt (engaged)

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Abbreviations

- Months:
 - September – *7ber, 7bris*
 - October – *8ber, 8bris*
 - November – *9ber, 9bris*
 - December – *10ber, 10bris, Xber*

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Church Records

- Most used for identifying births, marriages, and deaths
- Most predominant religious groups:
 - Catholic (Katholisch)
 - Evangelical Lutheran (Evangelische-Lutherische)
- Necessary to know the town
- Some larger towns may have multiple parishes

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Church Records

- Recorded in many different formats
- Most common:
 - Register style – handwritten or pre-printed tables
 - Brief paragraph style – short entries written as a sentence (includes most important information)
 - Full paragraph style – reminiscent of Napoleonic code-style entries and may include lots of extra information

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***Tauf*(Baptism) Records**

- Usually include:
 - Date of baptism (if online date it is date of baptism)
 - Name of child
 - Name of at least father (after 1700, both parents listed)
 - Names of witnesses or godparents
- Number and gender of witnesses may vary by locality and time period

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


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Konfirmation (Confirmation)


- Usually offer the least amount of information on an individual.
- Should not be dismissed
- Different clerks or ministers, different years result in different information recorded
- Usually happened at age:
 - 12 for Catholics
 - 14 for Protestants

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

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


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
Trau/Heirats (Marriage) Records

- Often supply the most information
- At the very least include
 - Groom's name and father's name
 - Bride's name and father's name
 - Date of marriage
- May include birth information on the bride and groom

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Familienbücher (Family Register)

- May be a separate register
- Generally found in southern Germany:
 - Baden
 - Württemberg
- Somewhat resemble a family group sheet
- May include cross reference numbers to other sheets

Forms usually printed
in Fraktur or German
Gothic Font

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


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Civil Registration

- Country-wide civil registration was begun in 1876
- Found at the local civil registration office (standesamt)
- Some records may be available at FamilySearch.org

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


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Marriage Records

- Marriage records include the minimum:
 - Date of the marriage
 - Names of bride and groom
 - Names of parents of bride and groom
- Additional information may be included:
 - Occupation of groom
 - Town of origin
 - Witnesses of marriage
 - Ages of bride and groom


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
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Keep in mind

- Could be in German or Latin
- Offer a variety of information
- Can vary from year to year or minister to minister
- May have an index
- Family registers should be used as clues to find the actual life event records
- Require a lot of patience to read
