


Treasurer's Accounts

Treasurer

- Managed town's finances
- Presided over reimbursements
 - Military service
 - Care of poor
 - Services by townspeople (constructing and repairing roads, building school house, etc.)

Treasurer's Accounts

- Located throughout the town records volumes
- Includes at least:
 - Name of person
 - Amount paid
- May include reason for payment




Earliest Colonial Settlements

Ear Marks

- Cattle and sheep were grazed on common lands
- Important that each animal had identifying mark
- Marks recorded by town clerk
 - Transfer of ear marks from person to person may prove parentage or relationships
 - May be altered by generation
- May be found in proprietor's records



(Eden was separated off from Mt. Desert in 1796, and thus the period between the fifth and sixth children probably marked the family's arrival in the Eden area.)

- ix. son b. and d. 6 Dec. 1778
- x. Joseph b. 24 Nov. 1779
- xi. Joanna b. 10 Dec. 1783

Elisha Cousins, father of the above children d. 18 Jan. 1816.

Bathsheba Cousins, consort of Elisha Cousins d. 23 Mar. 1830.

Ichabod Cousins Clerk son of Joanna Cousins b. 11 Mar. 1806 and d. 13 Mar. 1823.

Elisha Cousins marks for cattle and sheep is *a crop off the left ear and a nick the under side of the right ear.*

On page 34 of the Eden vital records might be the family records of their third child John:

John Cousins and Miss Mary Higgins intend marriage 25 Apr. 1804 (undoubtedly one of the shortest periods of mourning on record) and were married 24 June 1804. Their child:

- viii. Levi b. 18 Mar. 1805; d. 7 May 1805

John Cousins of Eden and Mrs. Eliza Manchester of Mount Desert intend marriage 24 May 1821, and were married 7 June 1821 by Rev. Enoch Hunting.



Chronology of Laws

YEAR	Law
1620	James I, grant to “Council established at Plymouth... for the Planting, Ruling, and Governing of New England in America”
1629	Charles I, grants Massachusetts Bay Charter
1629	Charles I, grants New-Plimouth Charter
1631	Grant to Connecticut Colony
1638	Roger Williams’ Settlement in Rhode Island
1671	First Plymouth Warning Out Law
1673	First Connecticut Warning Out Law
1692	First Massachusetts Warning out Law
1718	First Warning Out Act in New Hampshire
1787	First Warning Out Act in Vermont

Warnings Out

- Towns were responsible for support of indigent in their community
- Towns originally supplied lands to inhabitants (proprietor's land grants)
- New arrivers to a town who could purchase land of another in town could reside in town
- The towns expected those who arrived with no manner of support would require assistance from the town to survive

Constables – Warnings out

- To keep track of newcomers
- Warned out strangers:
 - Directed by selectmen
 - Required to serve warrant
 - Required to return proof to selectmen
 - Try to ascertain information about the strangers
- Duties pursuant to laws of the town and/or colony (and then state)
