# Native Nations of New England

## Introduction

The history of the Native Nations in New England, particularly their relationship with European settlers is often clouded and distorted by myth. Centuries of conflicts and disease drastically reduced the population of the original inhabitants and contributes to the myth that all Native peoples in New England perished long ago. There are, however, many rich and thriving Native Nations in New England today and their history is one that can be explored through many traditional and perhaps unfamiliar genealogical sources.

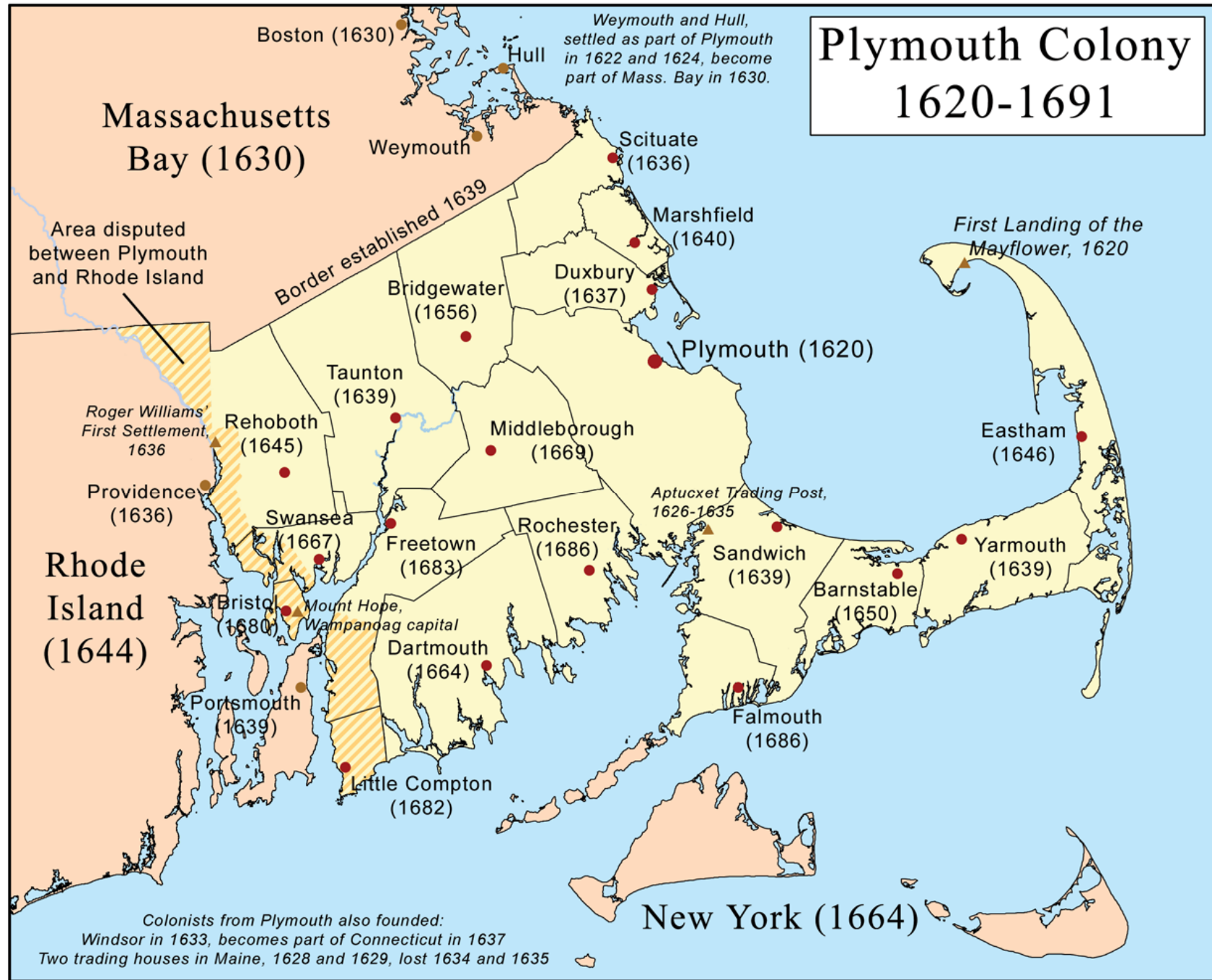
The biggest challenge in Native research is that Native nations did not record their history in the same manner as Europeans. Keep in mind that the paper trail you will follow while conducting your research will often be made by the colonizers (European and American) and may not come directly from the native nation itself. Additionally, working with the nation will help provide you with a better sense of what sources they have regarding their history.

If you believe you are eligible for membership in a state of federally recognized Native Nation contact the Nation directly to determine their enrollment procedures and requirements.

# Plymouth Colony

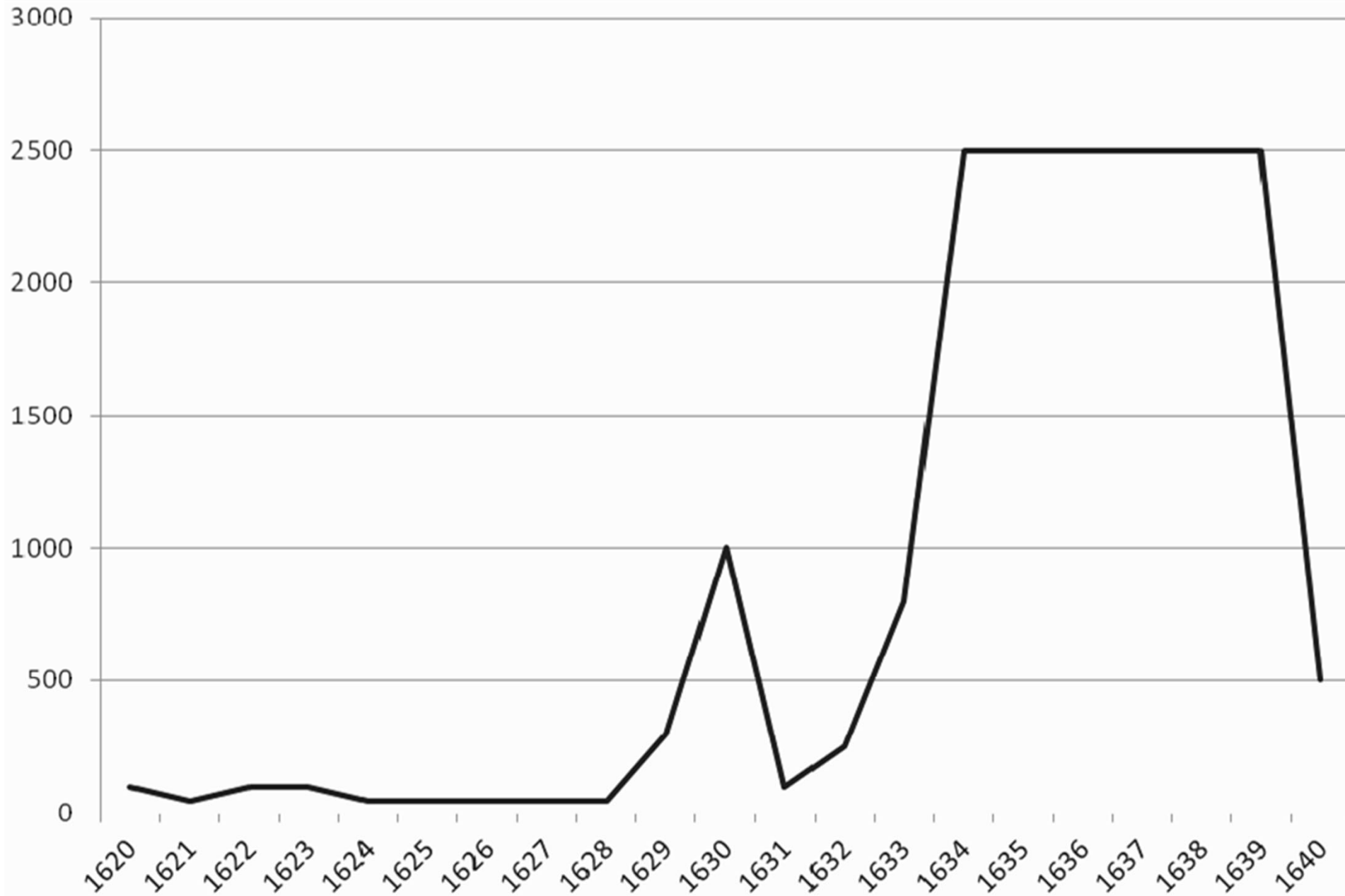
- Established 1620

Dutchess Co., NY; Cape May, NJ; coastal Maine



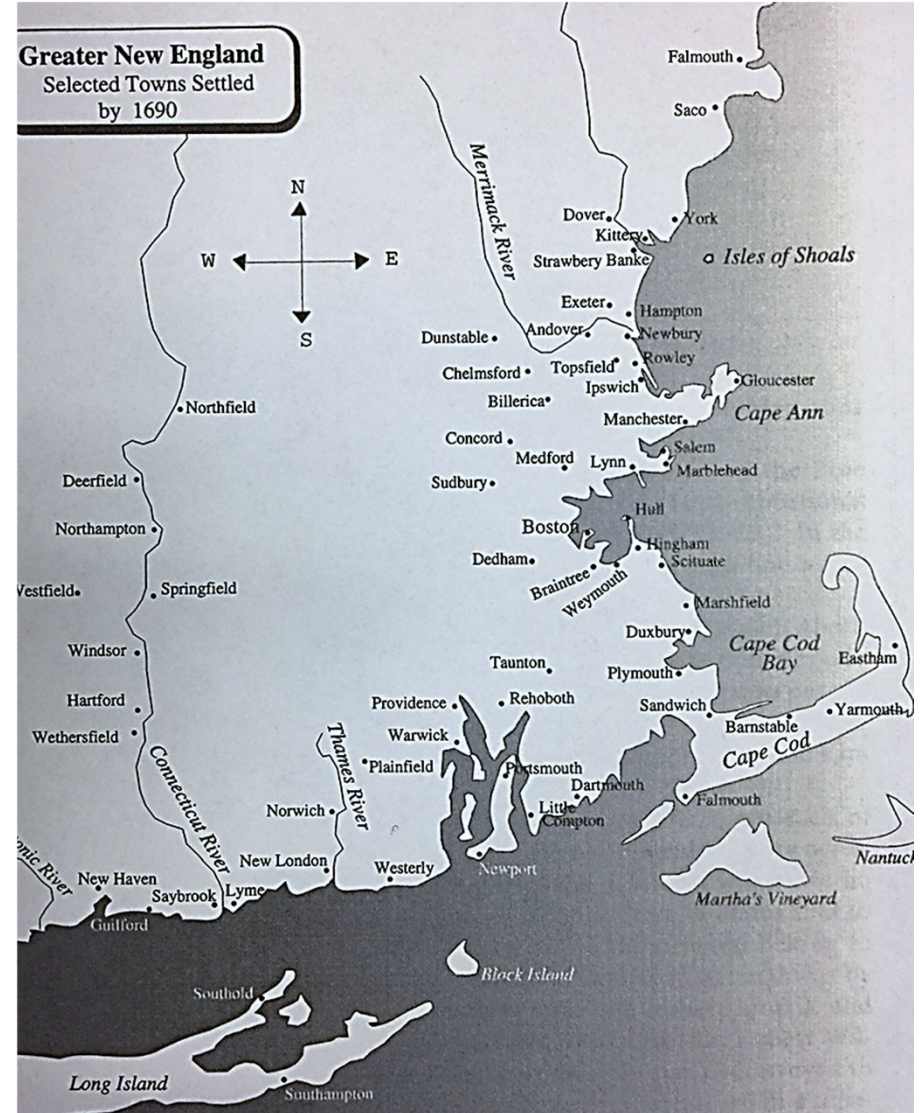
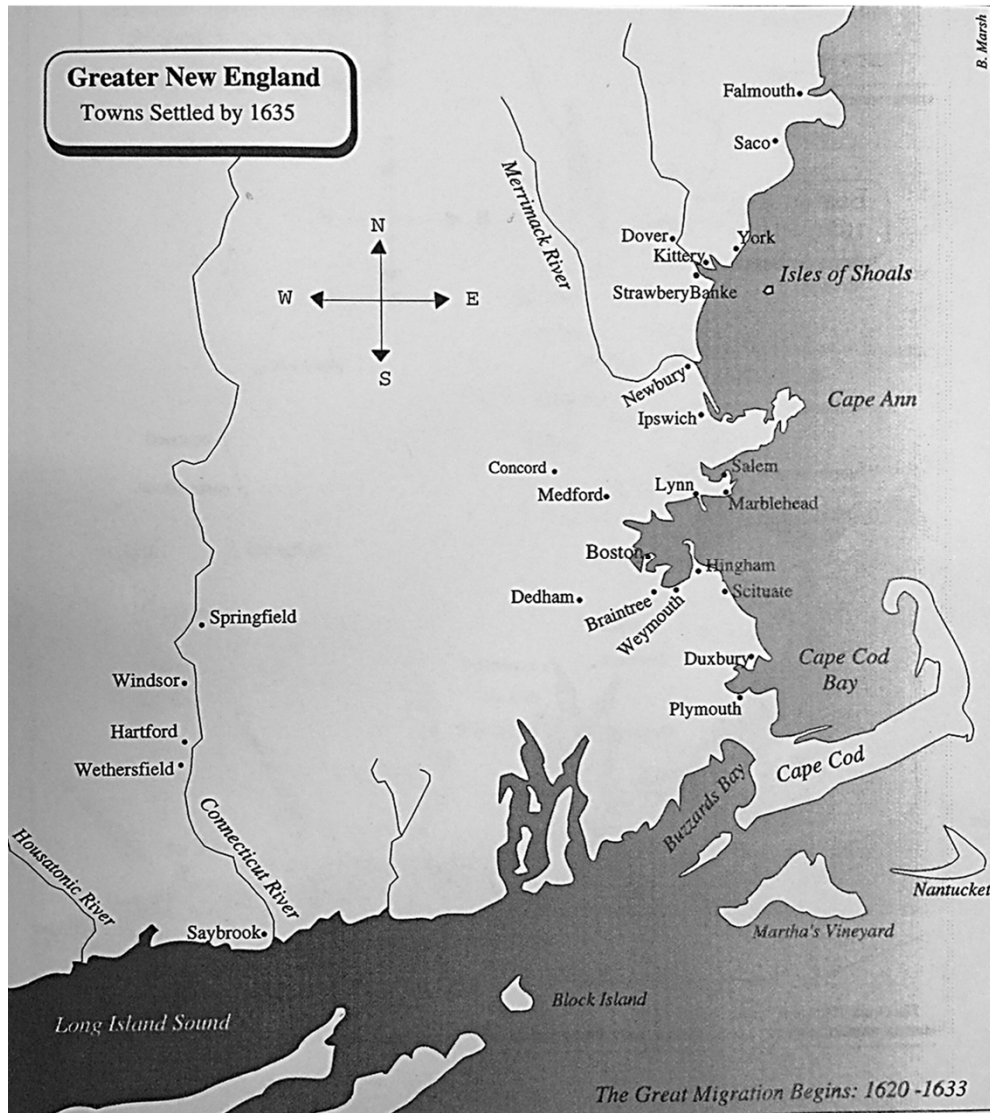

# Massachusetts Bay Colony

- 1620s scattered settlements on Cape Ann
- 1628 Endicott group to Salem
- 1630 Winthrop Fleet to Boston
- Established and led by Puritans
- By far the most populous and influential colony in New England
- Dissidents soon founded NH, Providence, Conn, and New Haven Colonies



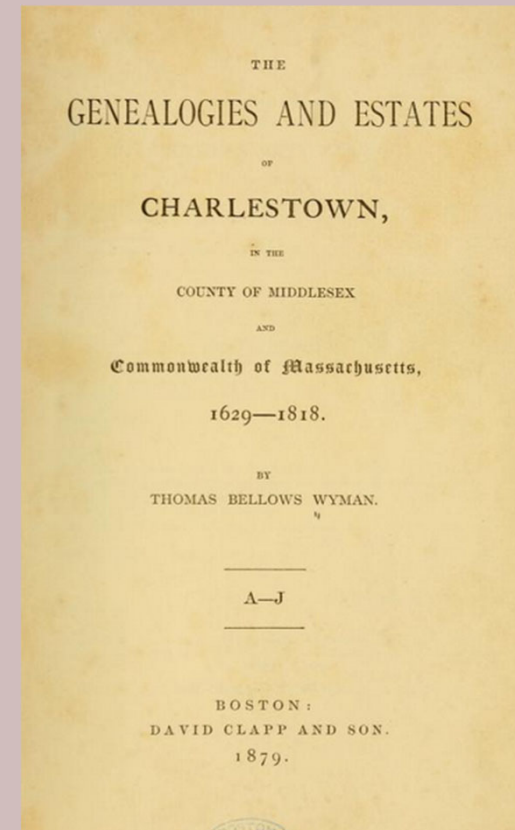
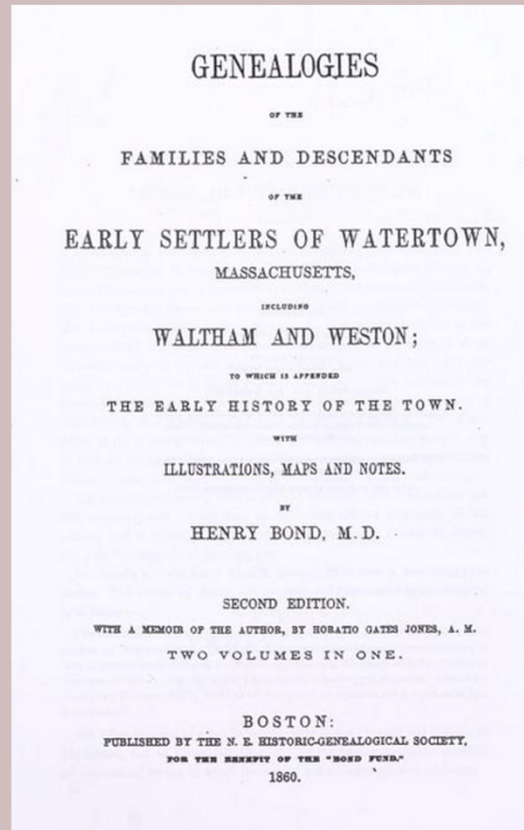
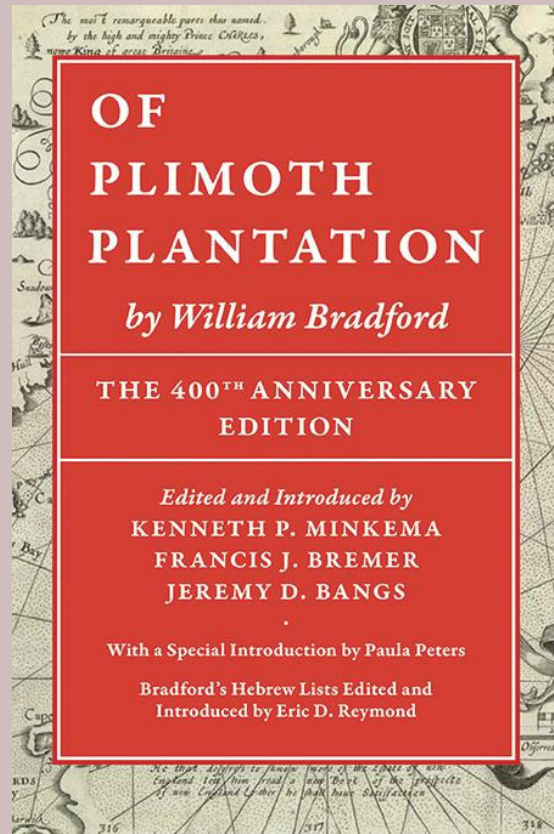
*Immigrants to NE, 1620–1640*



# History of Colonization

- Always the largest and most influential New England colony
- Plymouth Colony and Massachusetts Bay Colony merge in 1691
- Maine part of Mass. until 1820

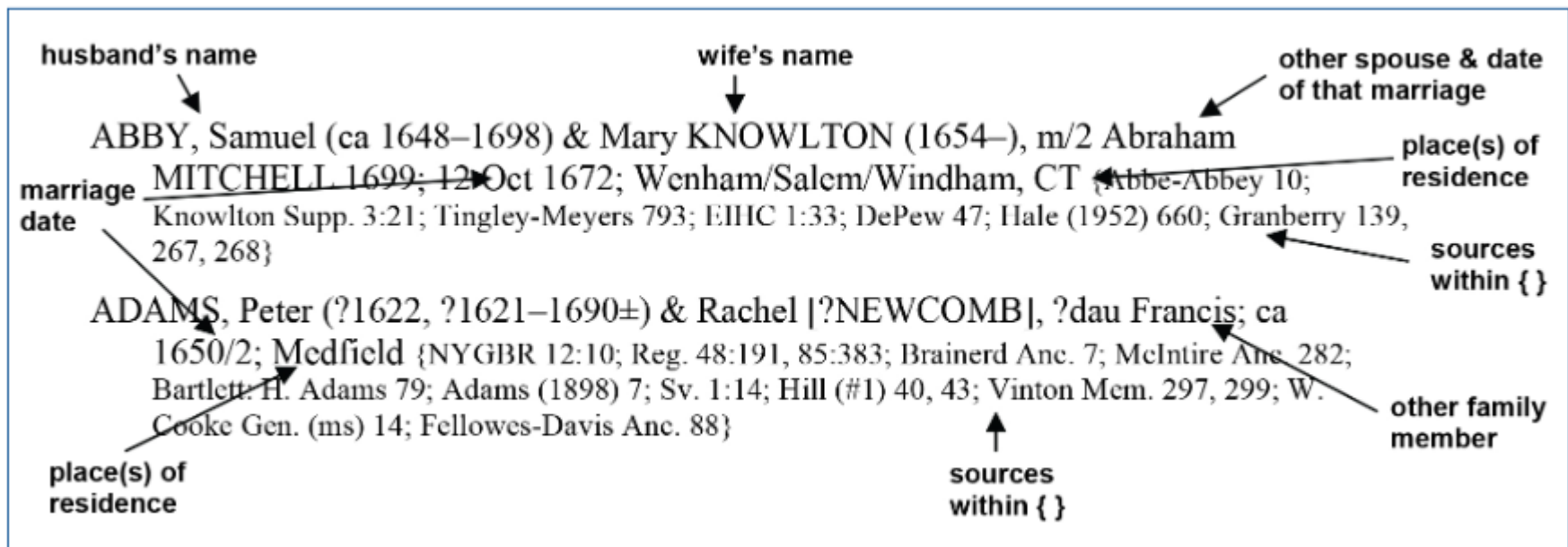
# New England Marriages Prior to 1700

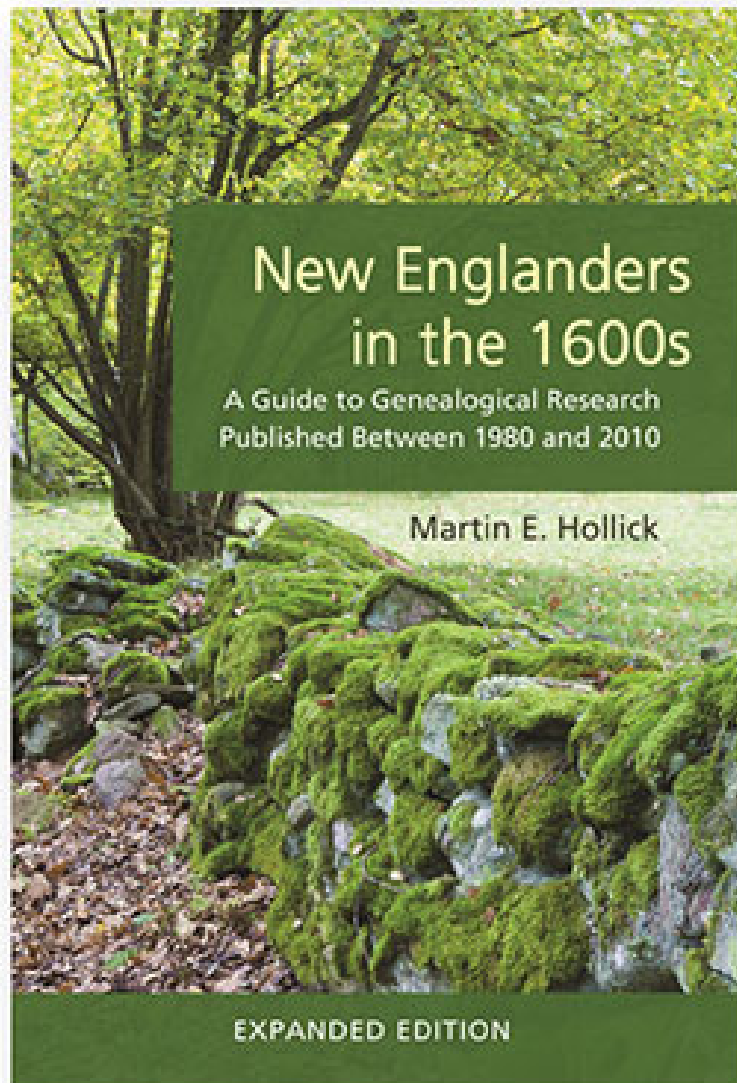
- Enumerates approximately 99% of all pre-1700 marriages of New Englanders

**ALICE ASHBY**

"Alice Ashbey," aged 20, maid servant to William Holman, was enrolled at London on 20 June 1635 as a passenger for New England on the *Defence* [Hotten 89].

**COMMENTS:** Not found in any New England record.

In the London port book, Alice Ashby's name comes between that of WILLIAM HOLMAN's wife and his five children. As a result the indexer of Hotten fell into the error of giving to the five Holman children the surname Ashby.

**JOHN ASTWOOD**

**ORIGIN:** Little Hadham, Hertfordshire

**MIGRATION:** 1635 on the *Hopewell*

**FIRST RESIDENCE:** Roxbury

**REMOVES:** Milford by 1639

**RETURN TRIPS:** To England by 1654

**OCCUPATION:** Husbandman [Hotten 46].

**CHURCH MEMBERSHIP:** Admitted to Roxbury church as member #132, among the 1635 arrivals [RChR 81].

**FREEMAN:** 3 March 1635/6 [MBCR 1:371]

**EDUCATION:** Signed his will [NEHGR 38:421, citing PCC Alchin 505]. The inventory of his widow's estate included two Bibles valued at £1 1s., "one parcel of books" valued at £1 7d. 6d., and a pair of spectacles.

**OFFICES:** Deputy for Milford, 27 October 1643, 3 April 1644 [NHCR 1:112, 129]. Arbiter, 8 October 1649 [NHCR 492].

Captain, 1646-53 [NHCR 1:263, 332, 467; NHTR 1:169].

**ESTATE:** In the 1646 inventory of Milford land John Astwood held six parcels: a seven-and-a-half acre home lot, twenty-one acres and one rood at the west field in creek shot, twenty-one acres and one rood at west field in fence shot, ten acres at Stubby Plain, twenty-three acres at the Great Meadow and "for his half division twenty acres ... on Eseck Plain" [Milford LR 1:78, 82, 87, 92, 95, 100].

In his will, dated 27 June 1654 and proved 31 August 1654, John Astwood of Milford bequeathed to "my loving wife Sarah Astwood" all

the estate in New England; "of my estate here in England in Abutley" to "my brother William Astwood ten pounds"; to "my loving mother five pounds sterling and the use of two rooms of my house"; to "my brother Robert Astwood" five pounds; to "John Rute" 10s.; residue to executor "my son Samuel Astwood" [NEHGR 38:421, citing PCC 505 Alchin].

In her will, dated 9 November 1669 [no date of proving recorded], "Mrs. Sarah Astwood of Milford, widow," bequeathed to "my daughter-in-law Hannah Freeman wife of Stephen Freeman" a pair of sheets "formerly Capt. Astwood's"; to "my grandchild John Baldwin" livestock, pewter, household goods; to "my grandchild Mary Woodruffe" her choice of goods; to "Reverend Pastor Mr. Roger Newton" 20s.; to "my grandchild Sarah Burwell" 5s.; to "my grandchild Mehetabel Fien" 5s.; to "my grandchild Martha Newton" 5s.; to "my daughter Elizabeth Baldwin, widow," all household goods not spoken for; to "my grandchild Mathew Woodruffe my great Bible"; to "my son John Baldwin" 20s.; to "my grandchild Sarah Rigson" a pewter platter; to "my grandchild Temperence Baldwin" a hat; to "my grandchild Mary Baldwin" a petticoat; to "my great-grandchild Sarah Burwell" a pewter platter; to "my beloved daughter Mary Plumb" a book called *The Soul's Conflict*; "my beloved brothers Richard Platt & Thomas Wheeler" overseers [NHPR 1:2:33-34].

The inventory of the estate of "Mrs. Sarah Astwood of Milford" was taken 20 November 1669 and totalled £108 2s. 9d., of which £56 5s. 8d. was real estate: "10 acres of land in the Indian side in the old field" [NHPR 1:2:34].

**BIRTH:** About 1609 (aged 26 in 1635 [Hotten 46]).

**DEATH:** "Abutley," England, between 27 June 1654 (date of will) and 31 August 1654 (probate of will) [NEHGR 38:421]. ("Abutley" has not been satisfactorily identified.)

**MARRIAGE:** (1) 13 February 1633/4 Missenden, Hertfordshire, Dinis Stallworth. She was buried at Little Hadham, Hertfordshire, on 26 December 1634 (not long after the baptism of their only child).

(2) By 1635 Martha \_\_\_\_\_. "Martha Astwood the wife of John Astwood" was admitted to Roxbury church as member #135, among the arrivals of 1635, and shortly after the admission of her husband [RChR 81]. (Possibly she was the Martha Carter, aged 27, on the *Hopewell* with John in 1635 [Hotten 46].)

(3) By 2 August 1640 Sarah (\_\_\_\_\_) Baldwin, widow of Sylvester [TAG 16:29, citing Milford Church Records, p. 1]. She was buried at Milford on

13 November 1669 [TAG 16:29, citing Milford Church Records, p. 1].

**CHILDREN:**

With first wife

- i SAMUEL, bp. Little Hadham, Hertfordshire, 19 December 1634; no further record.

With second wife

- ii HANNAH, b. say 1636; m. (1) by 1653 Stephen Freeman [Parke-Gildersleeve 69, citing Milford church records in which Hannah is called "wife of brother Stephen Freeman and daughter of Capt. Astwood"]; m. (2) after 1675 Robert Porter [Parke-Gildersleeve 69, citing Milford LR 1-2:58, 3:7 (correct date for which is 23 November 1685)]; m. (3) after 1689 [John?] Clark (on 10 March 1690[1] Hannah Clark is called "now widow formerly the wife of Robert Porter" [Milford LR 3:57]).

**ASSOCIATIONS:** Brother James Astwood came a few years later and settled in Roxbury, leaving a 1653 will bequeathing £5 to "brother John Astwood" [SPR Case #132].

On the same day and in the same parish, John Astwood married Dinis Stallworth and William Fowler married Grace Stallworth. Astwood and Fowler were long associated in New England, and it is apparent that Parke and Jacobus, who noted this pairing of familiar names, but denied they were the New England immigrants, did not see the baptism of Astwood's son Samuel or the burial of his first wife Dinis in Little Hadham [Parke-Gildersleeve 71].

**COMMENTS:** On 3 April 1635, "Husbandman Jo: Astwood," aged 26, was enrolled at London on the *Hopewell* as a passenger for New England [Hotten 46]. Enrolled at the same time were "Jo: Ruggells," aged 10, "Martha Carter," aged 27, and "Marie Elliott," aged 13 [Hotten 46].

"Captain Ashwood" performed the marriage between Joseph Pecke and Widow Burrill at Milford 12 September 1650 and was still performing marriages in 1652 [NHVR 1:2, 103].

On 5 July 1653, Susan Clarke, daughter of James, charged Ellis Mew with indecent assault. During the course of the case, Susan's mother stated "that the girl should have gone to Milford to dwell with Capt. Astwood," but her good disposition had caused John Jones to keep her in his service instead [NHTR 1:182-83]. It is probable that John Astwood was still in Connecticut at this date. It seems likely that he went to England,

planning to return after a brief visit, since he calls himself of Milford in his will, implying he had not changed his residence to "Abutley."

**BIBLIOGRAPHIC NOTE:** In 1959 Nathan Grier Parke and Donald Lines Jacobus compiled a brief account of the family of John Astwood [Parke-Gildersleeve 71-72].

## JOHN ATHERSON

"Jo[h]n Atherson" was enrolled on 18 April 1635 at London as a passenger for New England on the *Susan & Ellen* [Hotten 63].

**COMMENTS:** Not seen in any New England record.

## THEODORE ATKINSON

**ORIGIN:** Unknown

**MIGRATION:** 1634

**FIRST RESIDENCE:** Boston

**OCCUPATION:** Feltmaker, hatter, beavermaker [SLR 6:337-38]. On 17 December 1652, Theodore Atkinson recorded a number of legal documents, including deeds and debt instruments, most of which were probably related to his business activities. In one of these records, on 7 October 1652, "Thomas Webber, master of the good ship called the *Mayflower* ... now riding at anchor in the river at Boston" sold to "Theodore Atkinson of Boston feltmaker" one-sixteenth of the ship and its furnishings [SLR 1:258-59].

**CHURCH MEMBERSHIP:** "Theodorus Atkinson servant to our brother John Newgate" was admitted to Boston church on 11 January 1634/5 [BChR 19].

**FREEMAN:** 18 May 1642 [MBCR 2:291].

**EDUCATION:** Signed his deeds.

**OFFICES:** Boston constable, 12 March 1648/9 [BTR 1:94]. Clerk of the market, 12 March 1654/5 [BTR 1:122].

**ESTATE:** On 31 August 1640, "Theodor Atkinsone is granted his Great Lot, for two heads at Muddie River, if it be there to be had after others are served that had their grants before him" [BTR 1:55].

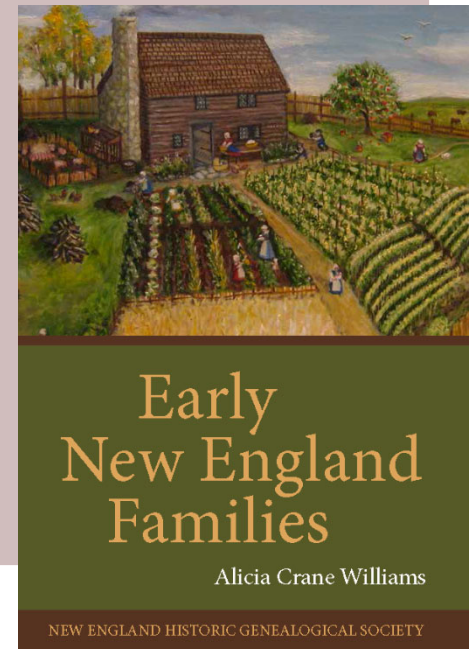

JOHN ALLEN

**MIGRATIONS/RESIDENCES:** John was in Weymouth, Massachusetts, by 1643. His father, step-mother and siblings George, 16, William, 8, and Mathew 6, are recorded as having sailed for New England on 20 March 1634/5 in an unnamed ship from Weymouth, Dorsetshire. There is no record of emigration for John (age about 25) nor of his full brothers Robert (about 21) and Ralph (about 18), sister Rose (about 14), nor half-brothers Henry (about 4) and Samuel (about 2), but the passenger list may be incomplete or the youngest children were left with the older ones to come at another time. Gideon born say 1635, may have been a nursing infant who could not be left behind or was born in New England. John and Ralph went from Weymouth to Rehoboth and later John settled in Swansea.<sup>1</sup>

**PARENTAGE/FAMILY:** Son of GEORGE ALLEN (*GM2*, I:27-35) and his first wife based on the Weymouth land inventory listing "John Allin" who owned land "first granted to George Allin."<sup>2</sup>

**BIRTH/BAPTISM:** Born about 1610 (age given in will of 12 March 1689/90), "in the eighty year of my age".<sup>3</sup>

**DEATH/BURIAL:** Died Swansea, 3 May 1690.<sup>4</sup>

**MARRIED:** Say 1638 (daughter Deborah born say 1639, son John born about 1640 based on age at death).

**BRIDE:** CHRISTIAN \_\_\_\_.

**DEATH/BURIAL:** Living when husband wrote his will on 12 March 1689/90.

**LAND/PROPERTY:** The inventory of land owners in Weymouth taken about 1643 describes the land of John Allin: "Five acres on the plaine first granted to Thomas Applegate bounded on the East by a lot of Joseph Shawes on the East & South with on the West by Ralph Allins lot the sea on the north two acres at the same bounded with the sea Eygth acres on the wester necke the land of Henry Kingman on the East Thomas Holbrooke on the west the common on the north first granted to George Allin. Two acres and a quarter twelve Rod of meddow in the Wester neck first given to George Allen bounded on the East with the marsh of Richard Silvester on the west with the marsh of William Frie the sea on the north the land of Henry Kingman on the South."<sup>5</sup>

In 1643 the inhabitants of "Sea-conk alias Rehoboth" were ranked according to their "person and estate" for division of the land granted by the Plymouth court. John Allen (£156) and Ralph Allen (£270) were ranked numbers 44 and 45 out of 58 proprietors. In June 1644, John Allen drew Lot #42 in the division of "woodland between the plain and the town." Lots on the great plain "beginning upon the west side; and he that is first upon the west side shall be last upon the east," were drawn in June 1645 with John Allin in Lot No. 53. In February 1646/7, John Allin was Lot No. 44 of 46 in the drawing for the new meadow. In the June 1658 drawing for "the meadows that lie on the north side of the town," John Allen had Lot No. 27, and a drawing in May 1668 for "the meadow lands in the North Purchase," not numbered, included John Allin, sen., and John Allin, jun.<sup>6</sup>

**COMMUNITY:** John Allin was chosen constable of Rehoboth in 1648 and was a rater in 1652 to raise £20 for the town to buy "a barrel of powder and two muskets, 4 swords, match and lead, bandoleers or porchers." On 6 April 1653, John Allen of Rehoboth took the oath of fidelity. He served as a Deputy from Rehoboth in

1653. In November 1663 "John Allen, sen." was on a committee to either buy Joseph Peck's house and lot and "to set up an addition to it, to make it fit for the ministry," or to build a new house on the town's lands.<sup>7</sup> In March 1667 John Allen was among the settlers authorized to establish the town of "New Swansea," and in February 1669 he was a first signer of those admitted to the town. In 1669 he was on the committee to lay out land in Swansea known as Papasquash Necke to the towne "that it may be graunted unto them for the promoting of a way of trade in this collonie...." He served as a deputy from Swansea 1669, 1670, 1677 and was a selectman of that town 1679, 1684, 1686. In July 1682 he was appointed to a committee to run the bounds with the town of Rehoboth.<sup>8</sup>

**CHURCH:** He was likely the John Allen who was a member of John Myles' Baptist church in Swansea.<sup>9</sup>

**COURT:** At the Plymouth Court in July 1667, the Treasurer of the Colony sued Steven Paine and John Allin of Rehoboth for £100 and damages of £200; the complaint was withdrawn, but the charge paid. In March 1671/2, the Plymouth Court settled a controversy regarding taxes on meadow land that belonged to Rehoboth but was within the bounds of Swansea, and ordered John Allen of Swanzey to pay 30 shillings. In July 1673 John Allin and Hugh Cole of Swanzey complained against "Phillip, allies Metacomb" to the damage of £200 for refusing to acknowledge a deed Phillip gave to Allin and Cole on 7 March 1672, but this was withdrawn.<sup>10</sup>

In March 1667/8, John Allin of Rehoboth sued William Blackston to the damage of £20 for "pulling up his fence, and destroying his hog." The defendant did not appear. In October 1668 John sued Blackstone again for £30 damages for "pulling up and burning his fence, and destroying his hay, and molesting of him, that hee cannot enjoy his land in peace," but the action was withdrawn. Finally, in July 1669 John sued Blackstone once more "for molesting him in his just rights, by spoyling of his grasse, pulling up of his fence, and destroying of his hay upon his land,... lying on the westerly syde of the western plaine from the said William Blackstone, which was done in the latter end of November, in the yeare 1667." The jury found for the plaintiff £6 damages and the cost of the suit.<sup>11</sup>

**OCCUPATION:** Farmer.

**ESTATE:** The will of John Allen of Swanzey, dated 12 March 1689/90, proved 27 May 1690, "being in y<sup>e</sup> eighty yeare of my Age," gave to eldest son John Allen "all upland & swamp... on Pheebe's neck in Swanzey lying to y<sup>e</sup> Southward of y<sup>e</sup> longline which runneeth on y<sup>e</sup> north side of y<sup>e</sup> Dead Swamp except Six Acres on y<sup>e</sup> [head?] of y<sup>e</sup> Lotts that was Cap' Peter Hunts & the Paines... all that meadow lying about that little Neck whereon his house stands & all my right of meadow which was y<sup>e</sup> proper Alottment of Will<sup>m</sup> Palmer of Rehob<sup>o</sup> being five Acres... on the [Tonng?] of Marsh in Swanzey & also half my Commonage in Swanzey, also... use of y<sup>e</sup> Timber & wood of that Lott & land that lyeth between y<sup>e</sup> Chafee's & house lott of John Medbury... [but if John dies without lawfully begotten issue, then the property would go to] my Grandson John Allen y<sup>e</sup> son of Daniel Allen... but the lawful wife of John Allen shall have & enjoy y<sup>e</sup> full benefit & improvem<sup>t</sup> of one half of s<sup>d</sup> Lands & meadows during her Natural Life."

"I give & bequeath that my land that lyeth between y<sup>e</sup> Chafee's & John Medbury's house lott unto my Grandchild Samuel Allen son of Daniel Allen... to possess and enjoy after my son John his Decease also... that piece of meadow adjoining to fors<sup>d</sup> Land called [illegible] Leonard's meadow." To son Isack Allen "All that part of y<sup>e</sup> Farme that I bought of major Josiah Winslow lying about M<sup>r</sup> Blackstones, which is not yet by me sould... all my Tract of Land called y<sup>e</sup> North side purchase & all that Lott upland & meadow lying at a place called Palmers River near s<sup>d</sup> Jonathan [Blisse's?] house & all that Lott of Salt Marsh lying upon y<sup>e</sup> [Tonng?] in Swanzey which was y<sup>e</sup> meadow of Will<sup>m</sup> Cheesbrooke as also half my Commonage in Rehob<sup>o</sup> as also a lott lying in Rehob<sup>o</sup> of thirty acres & twelve more to be added thereunto out of my common rights in Rehob<sup>o</sup> in & by ye Cartway that leads to Broad Cove." To son Daniel Allen "my now Dwelling house barne & all my other outhouses orchards land meadows improved or not improved with all common rights in both Swanzey and Rehob<sup>o</sup>" not otherwise disposed of. "Unto my Grandchild Elizabeth Daughter of Daniel Allen five pounds... unto all & every of my Grandchildren ten shillings a piece... one cow to

Grandchild Deborah Cole.” To sons John & Isaack Allen “my two Negroe’s Joseph & Matte each of them one as they shall agree & I give & bequeath [Hackarry?] Negroe to my son Daniel.”

Sons John and Daniel were to make annual payments of £6 a year to their mother: John 40 shillings (5 shillings in butter, 15 shillings in meat and 20 shillings in corn); Daniel £4 (10 shillings in butter, 30 shillings in meat and £2 in “Indian Come & English”).

“To my beloved Wife Christian Allen my bed above in y<sup>e</sup> Chamber with all y<sup>e</sup> Furniture thereto belonging & all my Linnen, & all my Silver money I have in my house with all y<sup>e</sup> silver money Debts due...” Christian was made executrix with friend John Peck and son John Allen as overseers. All remainder of the estate was to be divided among his four children: John, Isaac, Daniel Allen and Deborah Buckland, with Deborah “to have y<sup>e</sup> Bed in y<sup>e</sup> lower Roome....” A memorandum added before signing adds that “Bethiah y<sup>e</sup> wife of my son John shall have y<sup>e</sup> house wholly unto her use during her life Also it is my Will that Deborah Cole shall have... a Bed & Rugg & Boulster.” Witnesses were John Peck and Israel Peck.<sup>12</sup>

The will of John Allen [Jr.] of Swansea, dated 1 January 1722/3 and proved 1 November 1723, makes bequests to “John Farewather, James Farewather, Elizabeth Winslow & Christian Simson children of my sister Elisebeth Farewather of Boston ded.; children [not named] of “my Kinswoman Sarah guin that was the Wife of Thomas Guin of boston Deceased”; Daniel, Ebenezer, Samuel & Joseph Allen “sons of my brother Daniel Allen”; “James Addoms son of James Addoms of Barrington”; James Bucklin, Joseph Bucklin, Baruch Bucklin, Isaac Bucklin & Lydia Barrow children “of my sister Deborah Bucklin”; Nehemiah Allen & Deborah Hopkins children of “my brother Isaac Allen ded.”; “grandchildren of my brother Isaac Allen ded., namely his daughter Bethia’s two children & his daughter Sarah’s one child”; “Kinswoman Deborah Cole wife of Hugh Cole of Swanzey”; “James Cole son of Hugh Cole”; “daughters of my kinswoman Deborah Cole, namely Deborah Cole, Christian Kingsley, Mary Cole, Lidia Sisson, Bethiah Luther, Anna Cole & Hannah Cole.” His kinsman Hugh Cole of Swanzey, house carpenter, and Joseph Bucklin of Rehoboth, yeoman, were named executors along with kinsman Ebenezer Allen of Barrington.<sup>13</sup>

**COMMENTARY:** John Allen’s daughter Elizabeth died before he made his will but she left a number of children who are not named therein although they are mentioned in the will of her brother, John Allen, Jr., as seen above. John Sr.’s will mentions a number of grandchildren with great specificity (children of son Daniel, etc.). The only non-specific bequest reads “unto all & every of my Grandchildren ten shillings a piece....” This clause would cover grandchildren who were not named individually. Unless the copy of the will (the original no longer exists) is deficient, this would indicate that John felt Elizabeth’s children would be taken care of by her second husband, John Fayerweather. In a prenuptial deed before his marriage to their mother, he had pledged his warehouse in Boston against payment of £100 each to his step-daughters as legacies from their father’s estate.

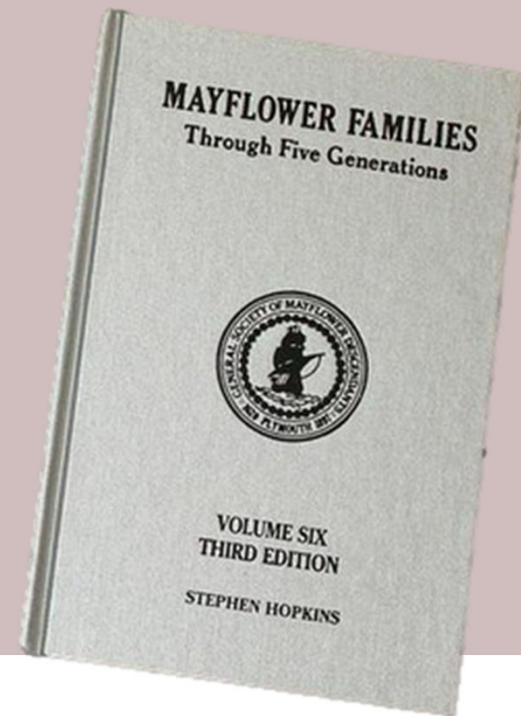

He m. Duxbury 15 Feb. 1704/5 **JOANNA STUDLEY**, b. ca. 1686; d. apparently before 8 May 1767 since she was not mentioned in her husband's will; apparently daughter of Joseph and Sarah (Brooks) Studley.

On 31 Dec. 1718 Henry Culifer, "Taylour," sold 8 acres in Duxborough to Joshua Soule of Duxborough, coaster; neighbors were named as: Stephen Samson, deceased, and Samuel Sprague.

Joshua Soule acquired land in North Yarmouth ME 30 Dec. 1734 and was active as a shipbuilder and trader. On 19 Feb. 1734/5 Joshua Soule of Duxborough, yeoman, bought 2 ½ half shares of salt meadow, being ½ of Lot 18; the sellers were Palatiah West and Ichabod Samson, both of Duxborough, coaster.

On 26 July 1744 Joshua Soule of Duxborough, yeoman, gave land to son Ezekiel Soule of Duxborough, coaster.

On 13 May 1752, Amos Samson of Duxborough sold rights in two pieces of salt meadow in Duxborough to Joshua Soul of Duxborough, yeoman; witnesses were [son] Joseph Soul and Marcy Soul.

The will of Joshua Soul of Duxborough, yeoman, dated 8 May 1767 and proved 20 Oct. 1767, names sons Ezekiel, Joseph and Nathan Soule; grandson Samuel Soule; daughter Zurviah wife of Ebenezer Samson; daughter Abigail wife of Perez Drew; granddaughter Lidia wife of Jedediah Simmons; grandson Samuel Soule, sole executor, with witnesses Joseph and Elizabeth Cushman and Judah Delano.

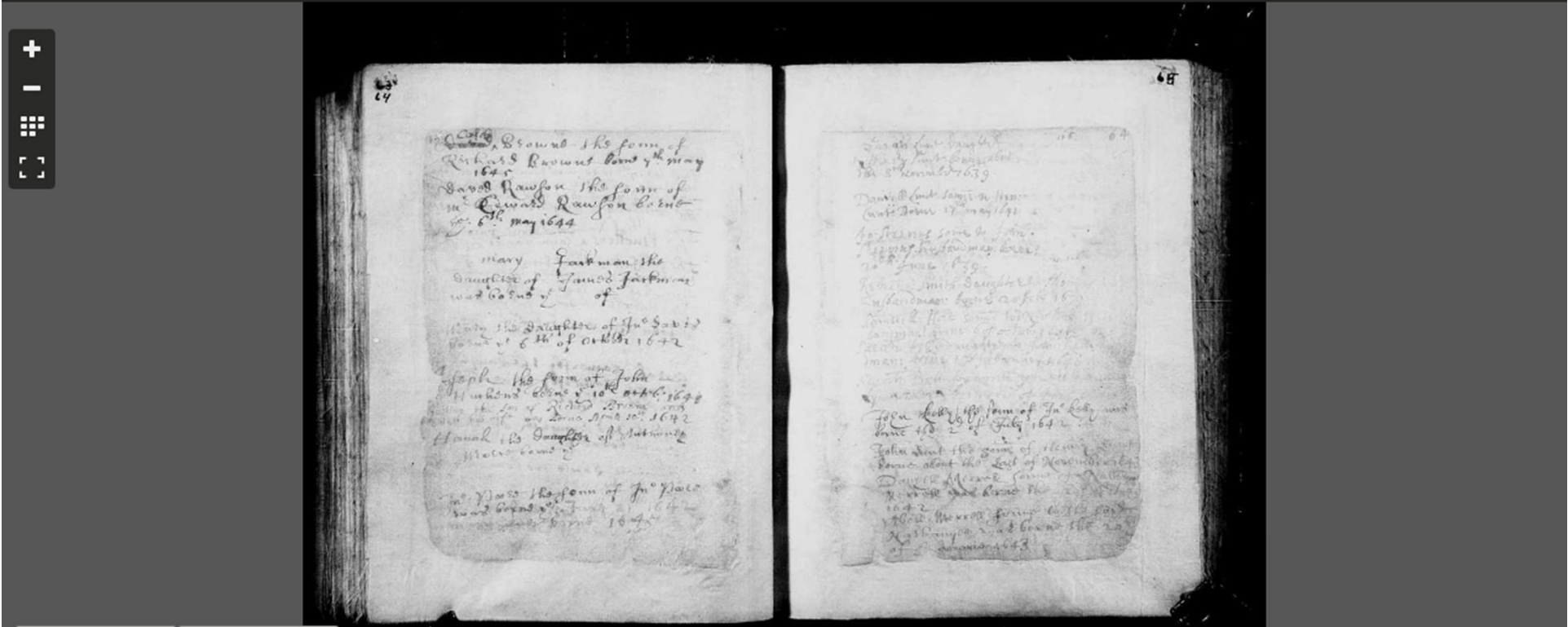

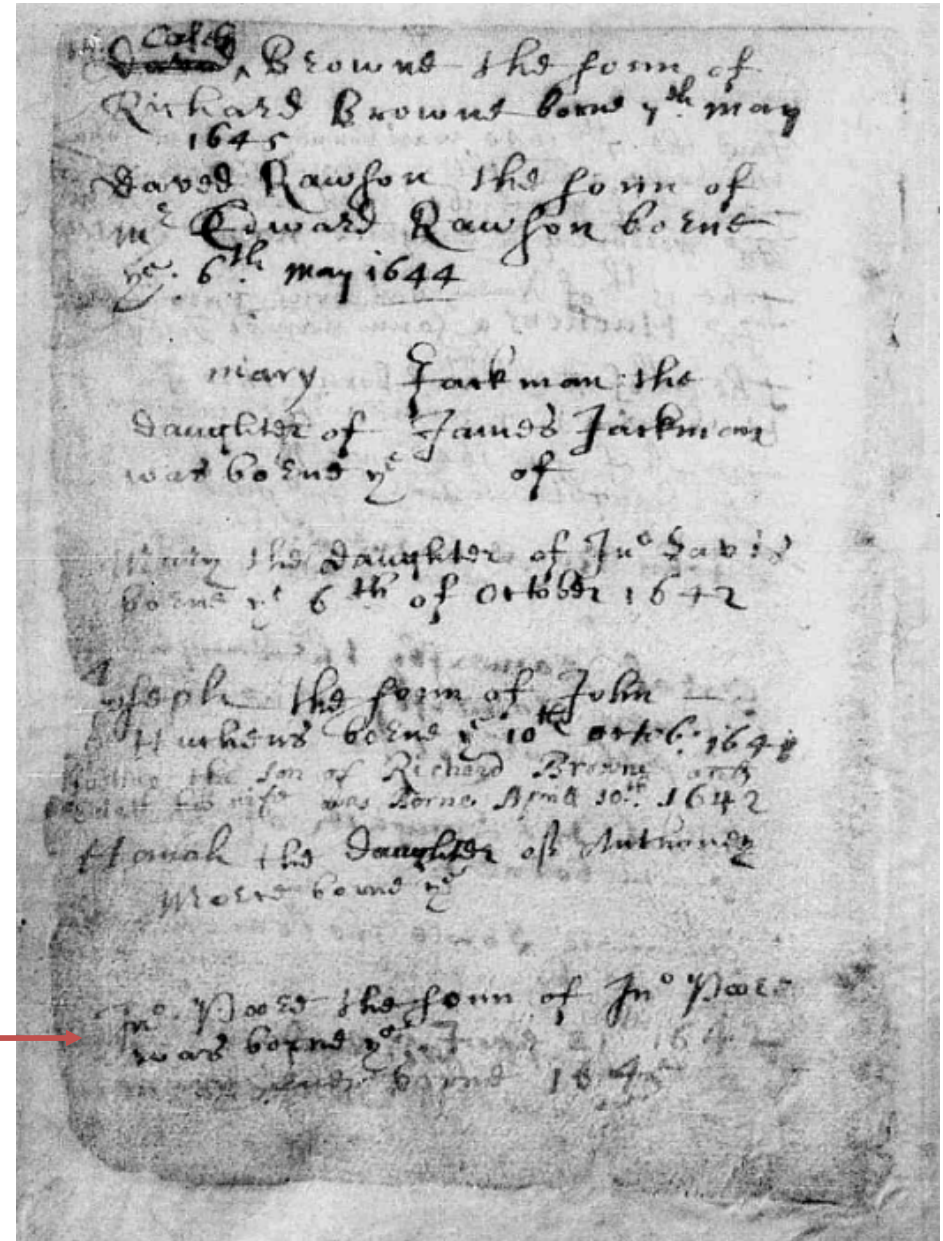

- Events may have occurred in one town, but were recorded in another
- Don't assume that if you can't find a VR, that the event must have happened in a different town
- Event may not have been recorded at all

### Collection History

The Old South Church originated when twenty-eight members of the First Church in Boston separated in 1669 to found the Third Church of Boston. These separatists disagreed with the minister's insistence that adults must have "a regeneration experience of God" before their own children could be baptized. These members instead believed that childhood baptisms assured young adults they were full members and could baptize their children, a belief consistent with the Half-way Covenant.

In 1670, the congregation met for the first time in a building known as the Cedar Meetinghouse, which soon became known as South Church due to its location in the south end of town. The "Old" moniker was added in 1717 to distinguish the church from a newly-formed New South congregation. Prominent members of the Old South congregation included Benjamin Franklin, who was baptized at Old South in 1706, Phillis Wheatley, the renown black female poet, and writer Elizabeth Vergoose, better known as Mother Goose for her nursery rhymes.

During the Unitarian Movement of the early 19th century, Old South was the sole Congregational church in Boston to adhere to the doctrine of Trinitarianism. In 1816 Old South Church joined with Park Street Church to form the City Mission Society, a social justice mission

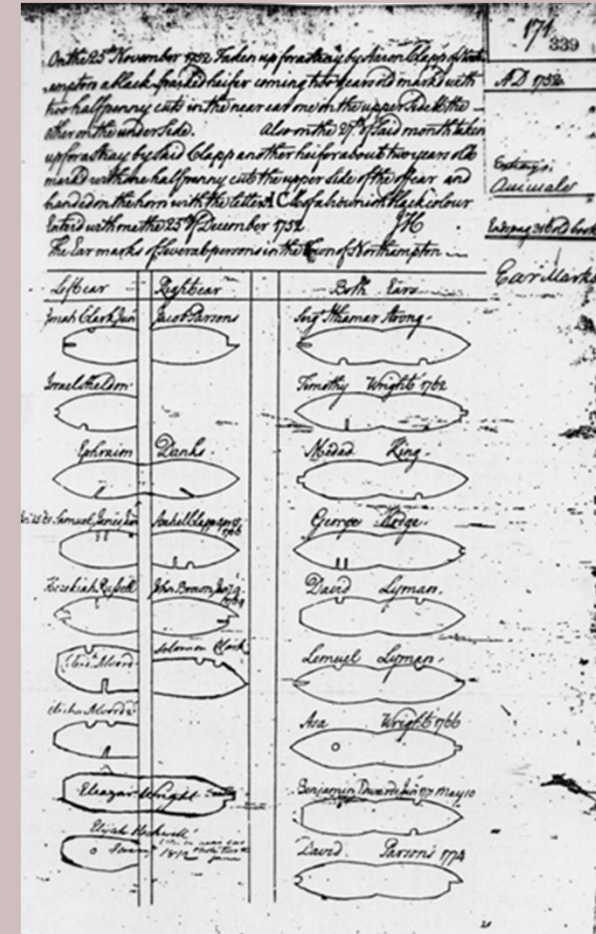

# Why are town records important?

- They are one of the most underutilized resources from 17th to 19th century Town Clerks
- Offer clues to when an ancestor arrived in a town and often when they leave
- Learn about town offices your ancestor held and military service
- Valuable resource for female ancestors

# Where are they located?

- Often not indexed and occasionally in print
- Local town & city clerk's offices, or historical societies have originals
- Some have been imaged on microfilm or digitally from the FamilySearch Library

# Freeman Lists

- Lists establish date of residence
- Free of indenture
- Church membership required prior to freemanship in Massachusetts Bay
- Freemen were allowed to vote for colony officers
- Abstracted in Great Migration series

# Colonial Freeman Lists

- Massachusetts Bay Colony
  - Records started May 19, 1631
  - Freeman admitted at the General Court
  - You had to be free and clear of indenture
  - You had to be a member of the Church
- Plymouth Colony
  - Part of Colony Court proceedings
  - Surviving lists are from: 1633, 1637, 1639, 1658, 1670, 1684

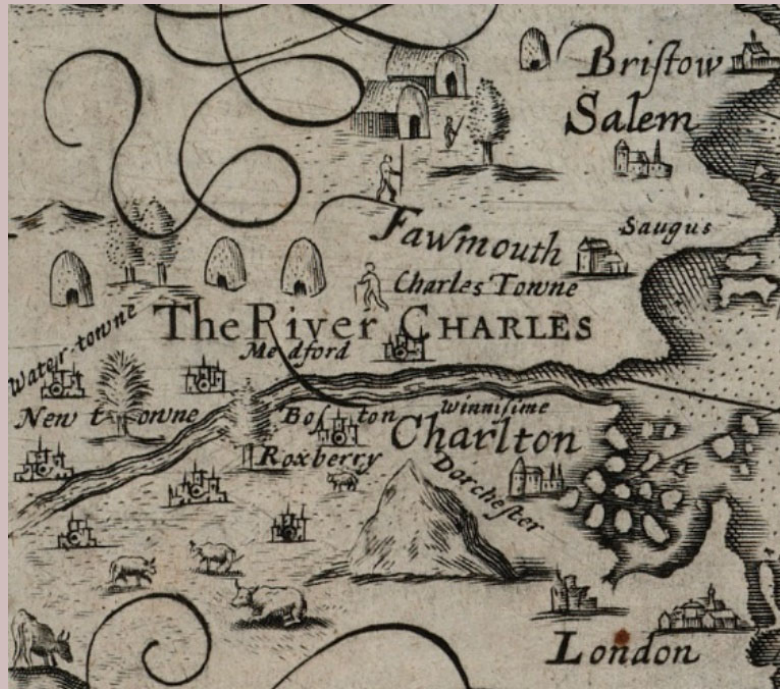

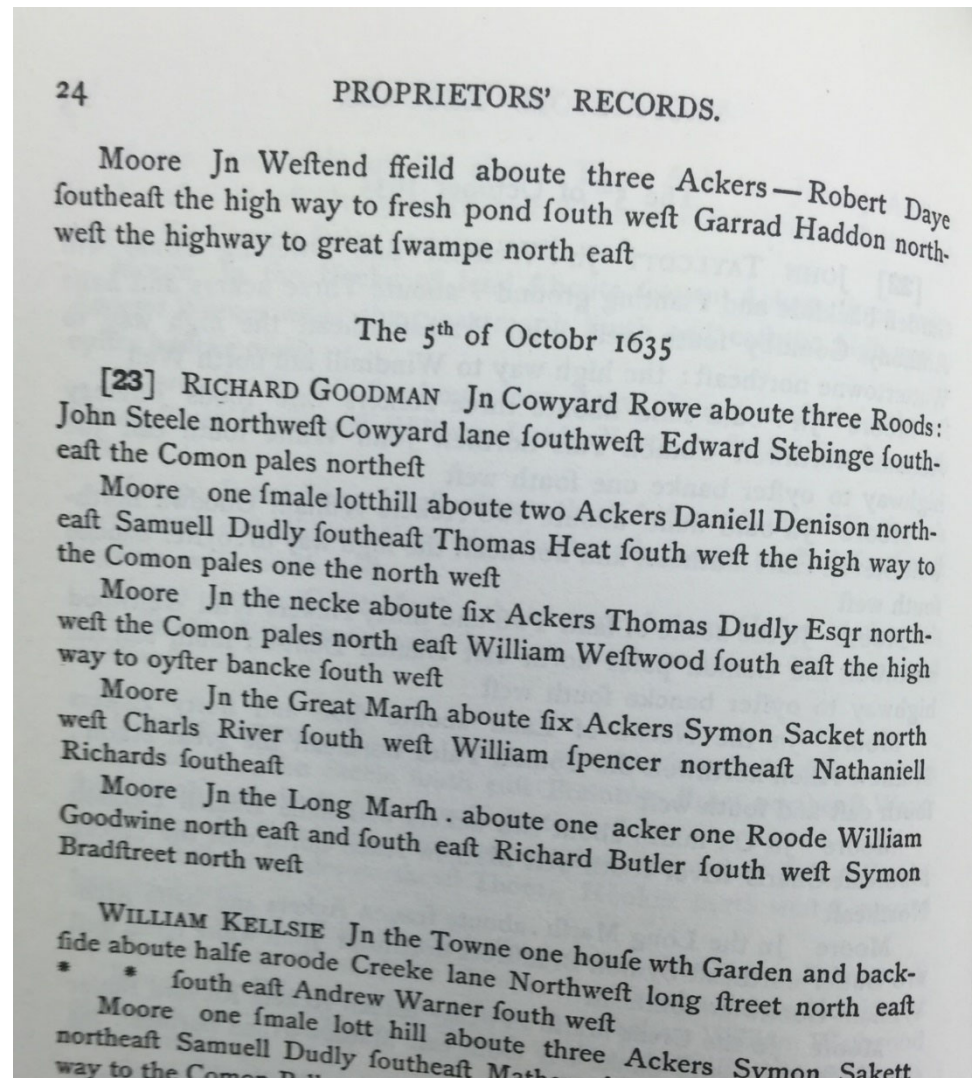
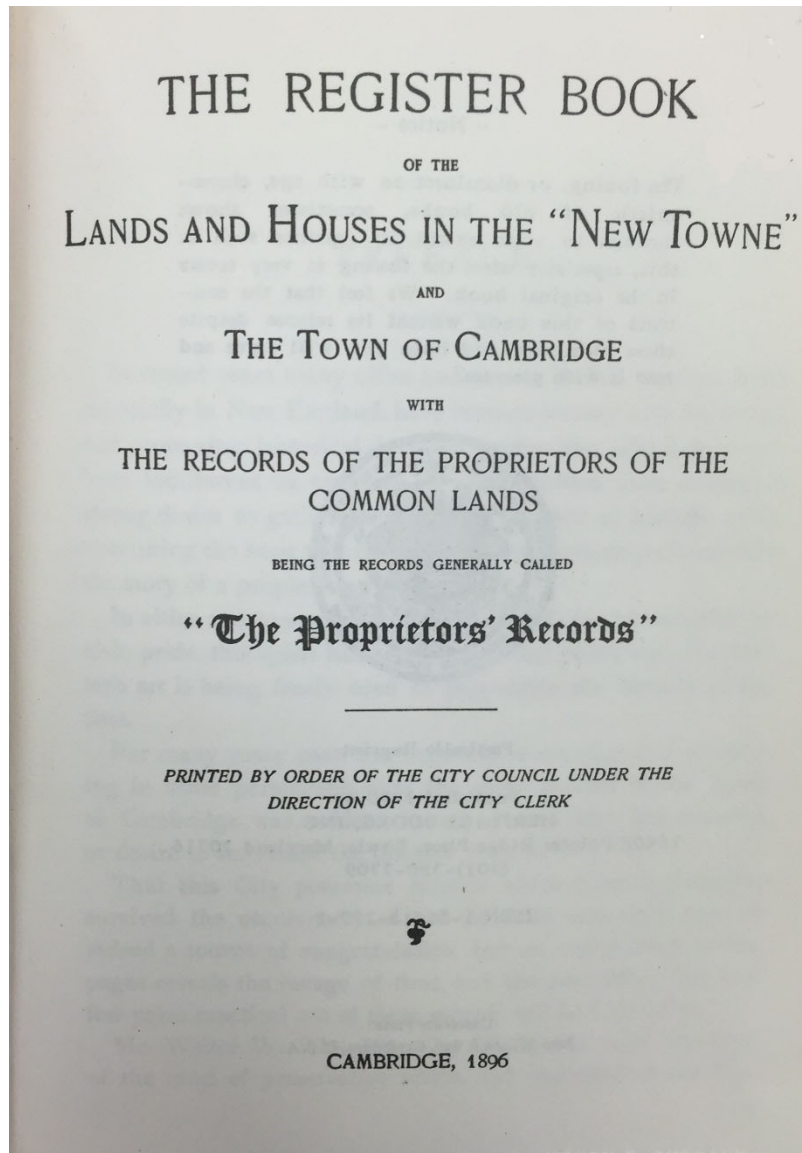
- General Court assigns grants of land to groups of settlers
- These settlers form Proprietorship Committees to distribute land to settle towns

# Proprietors' Records

- Proprietors were responsible for the improvement of the land and were required to enlist settlers and newcomers, assigning lots, building highways, and subdividing land/meadow/forest
- Early record of community
- Can include land grants and early deeds

- Town Halls: town clerk, tax office or assessor
- County Registry of Deeds
- Libraries and local historical Societies
- FamilySearch.org microfilm and online
- Published transcriptions of proprietor records

# Massachusetts Land Deeds

- Organized by county
- Berkshire, Bristol, Essex, Middlesex, and Worcester have multiple deeds registries
- American Ancestors has microfilm for some counties to 1800s or later
- For married male grantors, wife usually signs as well
- Usually lists occupations
- Barnstable County deeds burned in 1827 (only partially reconstructed)
- Be aware of changing county boundaries

# Strategies

# Common Challenges

- Distinguishing between people of the same name in the same community
- Determining parentage when multiple marriages are involved
- Finding women's maiden names
- Origins

# General Considerations and Suggestions

- You may not find one “smoking-gun” record; you may need to rely on a number of records to build a case
- Some records may be less reliable than others
- May have several working theories
- Know when your town was established and if there are any parent/daughter towns that would affect record keeping

# General Considerations and Suggestions

- Create a complete timeline with probate, land records, military, or any possible record
- While not culturally consistent, some families used naming patterns
  - Surnames as first names or less common first names can be clues of earlier kinships and origins
- Do not assume a woman's name at marriage is her maiden name; could be a first married name

## And keep in mind . . .

- Terms of kinship may have different meanings in 17<sup>th</sup>-century Massachusetts:
  - Nephew and nieces may be referred to as “cousins”
  - Sometimes “brother” or “sister” can be indications of brothers and sisters within a faith
  - “Father” and “Mother” could refer to in-laws
- Use of “Jr” and “Sr” don’t necessarily mean kinship

# Summary

- Don't rely on just one record set
- Don't reinvent the wheel - look at published sources in combination with originals
- Keep up with scholarly publications
- More and more records are being indexed and digitized everyday
