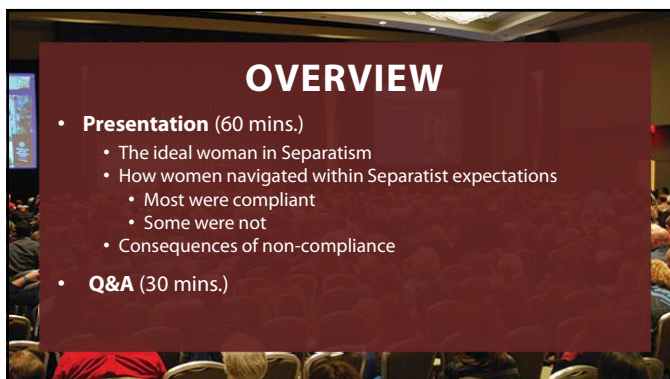
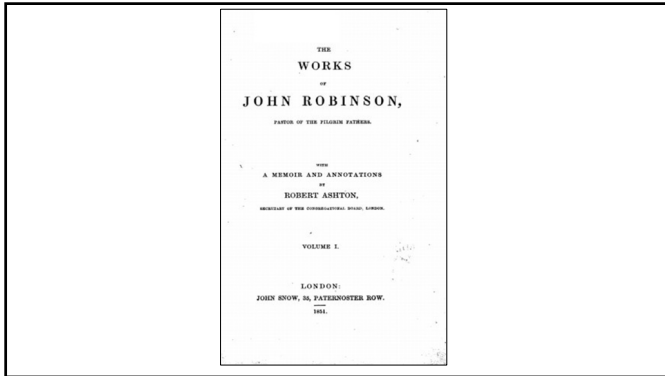


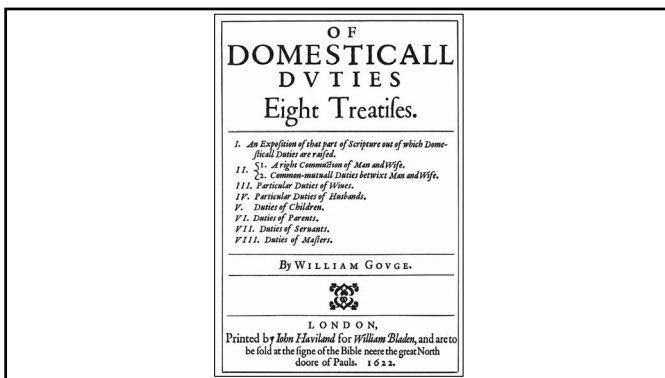

 - Easily transported by impulsive, thoughtless fads.

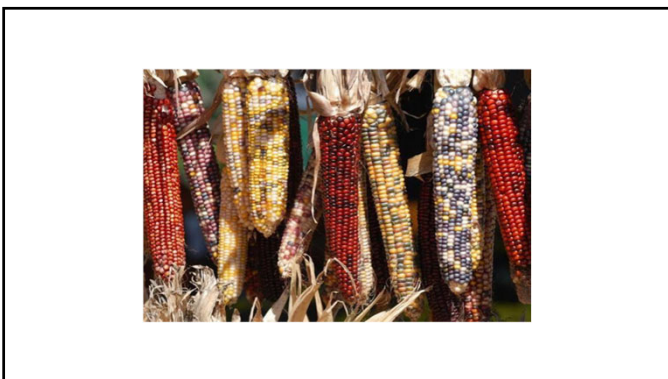

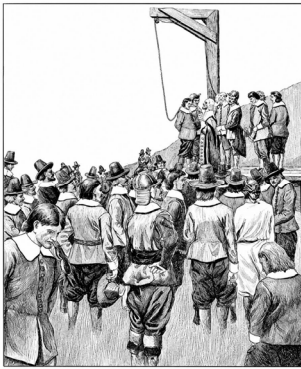


"Sad and Dumpish" in 1648

- In the 17th century, the phrase "**sad and dumpish**" meant deeply **depressed, gloomy**, and mentally **sluggish**.
- **Sad meant** much more than feeling unhappy. It meant being low in spirit and dejected.
- **Dumpish:** Deriving from the word "dumps" (meaning in low spirits or a melancholy state), this meant being listless, unmotivated, or even appearing "dull and stupid."
