[I searched for a birth certificate in the MA Archives in Boston in 2018 but did not find one. I did find a MA state census 1855 that has a Mary C Richardson, age 3, residing in Boston; father is Alexander, a typecaster, from Ireland, not a teacher, and mother Mary Ann from England, and Mary C from New York, not Mass. This Alexander did remarry twice after Mary the wife died in 1860. In the 1865 MA state census, there are no children in his family. I did not locate Alexander or Mary Catherine in an 1860 US census. I included this Alexander and Mary in my Ancestry family tree to see if would provide any further leads or facts that prove or disprove them as Mary Catherine's parents.](#)

[I do have Mary in Illinois living with the Tallman Libby family in the 1870 US census; it was noted that she was adopted. Tallman Libby and his wife Lucy were born in Maine. I have not been able to find a family connection with the Libbys.](#)

Any additional comments related to consultation #2: [I have been unsuccessful in obtaining any sort of obituary or info pertaining to her death in Barnes County, ND, on 8Nov1892. The Barnes County Historical Society advised that they do not have the May-Dec 1892 editions of the local newspaper, Valley City Times Record, and they have not been microfilmed. According to cemetery records, she \(and her husband George Harvey\) died of typhoid fever, 3 weeks apart, so perhaps there was not an obituary. Their 4 daughters were ages 4 to 13 when their parents died; they went to live with an uncle, brother of George, in Texas, a few months later.](#)

Was James Connell, one of the four children of Ann Matthews Connell, the biological son of Colonel William Crawford (1722–1782), and what contemporary evidence exists to establish or disprove that parentage?

Pertinent information related to your question for consultation #1:

James Connell is my great-grandmother's great-great-grandfather. A privately published, extensively documented study, *The Case For Declaring That Colonel William Crawford And Ann Connell Are The Parents Of William, James, Nancy And Polly Connell* (Diana Glynn and Wayne Bracken, 1992), argues that James and his siblings were the children of Colonel Crawford and Ann Matthews Connell, who was reportedly a niece of Crawford's wife, Hannah Vance Crawford. *I need to locate this document in the library.*

Colonel Crawford's will, dated 16 May 1782, provides substantial support for a close relationship. He left Ann Connell the tract of land on which she lived, together with livestock, household furnishings and farming equipment for her lifetime. At her death, the property was to pass to her four children, William, James, Nancy and Polly. He also made separate substantial bequests to William and James. However, the will consistently identifies them as **Ann's children** rather than Crawford's children.

I will bring a copy of the will to the consultation.

Any additional comments related to consultation #1:

I would particularly like help locating and evaluating contemporary records cited by Glynn and Bracken, and any additional records that may clarify the relationship among William Crawford, Ann Connell, and her children. I am especially interested in evidence identifying Ann's husband or marital status during the children's births; records directly connecting James Connell to Ann Connell; land, probate, court, tax, church, or other records connecting the Connell and Crawford families; and evidence that either supports or eliminates William Crawford as the children's father. I would also like help determining whether the

commonly reported marriage of a Crawford daughter, Anne Crawford, to a James Connell represents the same Connell family or results from a confused reconstruction of these relationships.

I can find nothing else about Gershom III until he turns up in Pittsfield in 1810 when his son is born. Recently someone found a gravestone marking the grave of Lucy Randall died 1815 in Richmond, MA at 36 years of age. Someone on Ancestry has postulated about her parents

Compile genealogical proof (if possible) of Robert Jordan's parentage despite the lack of a record of his birth.

Pertinent information related to your question for consultation #1:

Robert (Elliott?) Jordan (10 Dec 1807-14 Feb 1886) was born and died in Biddeford, York, Maine. The Jordan family history lists him as a son of Ralph Tristram Jordan (1765-1850) and Mary Fernald (1767-1863). By 1860, four of his five living sons were in California. Robert and his son Ralph Tristram Jordan enlisted in the Union Army. After a long journey from Maine, Ralph died onboard a ship near New Orleans, of disease. Robert was captured and fell ill in a Confederate prison; was eventually released and was able to return home.

Robert's wife, Lucinda Staples, mother to his 7 sons and 2 daughters, died in 1855, the birth and death year of their youngest son, Rishworth. Cause of death not found, to date.

His second wife appears to have been the widow of a fellow parishioner.

Robert is listed in probate records of his presumed father, Ralph Tristram Jordan, but their relationship is not stated. Also, Robert lived on the family property between Biddeford and Portland for nearly all his life. Would land and court records, inheritance or tax records provide enough evidence to support the family's assertion of his parentage?

Any additional comments related to consultation #1:

This is a family project in which most of the material was compiled pre-1990, so most of the records are on paper. I'll bring a printed packet for the consultation.

Some sources: "The Jordan Memorial" (printed family history)
Civil War Soldiers records at the National Archives, Washington, DC.
Records at the Maine Historical Society and online, "Maine Memory Network."

Have also reviewed old newspapers, but not since the Library of Congress' "Chronicling America" database was created.

Find the parents and origins of Philip Blake of Boston; seek records of his father, grandfather (and uncle?) working as harbor pilots in Boston in the Revolutionary War. How did Philip come to be a ship's master?

Family lore describes Philip's father rowing him out to the ships approaching the harbor, and that he (as a young lad) clambering up into the boat and piloting the ship into port. The story goes that either Philip's father or grandfather (or both) were captured and imprisoned by the British for their activities. (6 or 7 generations since, the details are murky).

Pertinent information related to your question for consultation #2:

Philip Blake was the long-time master of a merchant ship, the barque *Apthorpe*, in the first half of the 19th century. *Apthorpe* was one of the ships sunk in San Francisco Bay in 1850-55, when ships were abandoned and then deliberately used to expand the city's real estate. Philip's son, Philip Henry Blake, moved permanently to the Bay Area in 1850, and his father captained river boats on the Sacramento and San Joaquin River Delta thereafter. Philip died and was buried in the Delta town of Rio Vista. Captain Blake's wife, Hannah Haskell Murray, remained in New England for the rest of her life.

Any additional comments related to consultation #2:

The family knows a little about Philip Henry's Blake's sisters and his wife, but not much about the other women in the family.

Philip Henry Blake sailed with his father at least three times in his youth, and at least once, one of his sisters sailed with them.

Rhonda suggested (for another project) that I look in the Library for the military indexes by Virgil D. White. Also, two microfilm publications: "Ledgers of Payments, 1818-1872, to U.S. Pensioners Under Acts of 1818 Through 1858 From

Records of the Office of the Third Auditor of the Treasury, 1818-1872" and "Pension Payment Roll of Veterans of the Revolutionary War and the Regular Army and Navy, 3/1801 – 9/1815." I hope to consult them for the Blake project as well as my other research.

Wealthy Jane's death certificate says father Charles Burley, mother Lucinda Burley, b. Hudson, Columbia Co, NY. Lucinda was the informant. Lucinda's gravestone says "Charles Burley and Lucinda Doolittle, his wife".

1900 federal census says she was b Apr 1830 NY; 1850 says married "within the year"; 1855 & 1875 NY census say b. Greene Co; 1865 says Columbia Co.

Lived in Athens from 1850 to death, buried Athens.

1850 census lists 2 Doolittles in Hudson. Rufus and Jane had 4 boys, b. 1836-43. Reuben and Gertrude show 3 boys, b. 1836-46.

1840 census shows Rufus with 1 female child age 5-9. Reuben lists no female children.

"The Doolittle Family in America" (Doolittle, 1901) lists a couple of Rufus'es, one of whom went to NY, but no further info.

At some point, Amos married Jane Riggins and had more children, beginning in 1831. After Amos died, Jane married Col. Cornelius Race. The Catskill cemetery record reads "Jane A Riggins, w / o Amos Burley, by second marriage Col. Cornelius Race. This makes sense, in that my grandmother spoke of going to "Grandma Race's farm" after her death. She didn't know who she was, except that she thought she was on the Burley side of the family.

Federal Census records from 1790-1830 show a Jirah Bennett living in Dutchess co, Greene Co, and finally in Cairo.

In 1846, a David Bennett petitioned the Greene co probate court for letter of administration in the estate of Jirah Bennett. He says that his father, Jirah, did not have a will, and leaves a widow, Lucinda.

I have requested the death certificate of Charles Burley from the state in May 2024. As of last year they have a 5 year backlog.

I would like to find the town of birth or places of residences in Bavaria of my great grandmother, Elisabeth (Elise) Hoffmann and discover data concerning her ancestry.

Elisabeth (Elise) Hoffmann was born on 23 Jan 1870 somewhere in Bavaria. She immigrated to Wausau, Marathon, WI sometime between 1887 and 1889, allegedly because she had an uncle and aunt there, both unnamed. On 28 July 1890 she married the widower, Georg Gerst, in a civil ceremony in Wausau, although they were both members of St Mary's Catholic church. In the Marathon County registration of marriage she named her father, Johann Hoffmann, her mother, Margarethe Sch...[illegible] and gave as her place of birth, "Kirchlanden", Bavaria. Extensive research has failed to uncover any town or village of that name. The names of her parents are common in Bavaria.

online. The Stammrole are on FamilySearch. Another type of record of possible interest is a Rezess -- a sort of deed. They are also found in the Polish archives.

My ancestors surnames were Braatz (Bratz), Freitag, Lueck and Flach. They immigrated to the US in the period 1850 to 1870, eventually arriving in Wisconsin, Minnesota and South Dakota. The towns in which they lived in Arnswalde include Neuwedell, Arnswalde, Koelpin or Coelpin, Nemischhof, Fuerstenau, Liebenow, Berkenbruegge and Kuertow.

My biggest "Brick wall" is my maternal grandmother. We know very little about her, primarily due to the difficulty in finding records for what was her part of Germany

Elsie Smailus was born 30 April, 1906 in Klein Grabuppon, Heydekrug, East Prussia. (Currently Słute) Her parents were Cristoph Smailus and Katarina Aschmann. Katarina died @ 1901. In 1905 Else applied and was accepted into the Deaconess nursing School in Kaiserswerth, Westfalen. She finished her training, was sent to work at the German Hospital in Constantinople, Turkey, and while there was ordained as a full sister in the deaconess order. She corresponded with my grandfather the entire time she was there, and finally decided to leave the group and go to America to marry him.

I have confidence in this information, as it is based on her nursing school application, immigration records, and information about her known siblings.

I have been unable to find any official document for her, her parents' marriage, or death. I have civil registration records for 3 of her siblings, from Skirweith in Heydekrug. Her eldest sister has no known birth record but Family Search has her marriage information in a badly mislabeled file from Szibben Heydekrug. She married a Catholic, came to the US but has no living descendants.

Pertinent information related to your question for consultation #1:

Before and after WWII Else received letters from her niece Martha (brother George) and a nephew, Willy (he's Martha's cousin so not sure who his family is) Willy settled in Suchteln, NRW, and there are people with the Smailus name living there.

There were also several Smailus families in Essen in the late 1800s. There were a few other Smailus families in East Prussia at the same time. Since I don't know anything about Christoph or Katarina, I have no way to know if they were related.

I started working on a Smailus one-name study, as it is an unusual enough name most people will be related in some way.

I also have a lot of DNA matches from Lithuania and the Baltics.

I find this important as I inherited a big chunk of my DNA from this grandmother. I have done my MTDNA.

I am pretty familiar with the major sources – the church records at the online services, the Prussian State Archives, Polish archives, Lithuanian archives, German reparation records. And east Prussia research groups. People with the surname show up but I haven't been able to find a tie.

Any additional comments related to consultation #1:

I'm really looking for suggestions of will have the most impact to focus on. I think – I haven't looked at this for a while –there are records from the Heydekrug parish – Werden - in the Lithuanian archives, but they aren't digitized or indexed. I would like to find someone in Lithuania who could search those for me. I also want to know if it worth pursuing the DNA information. I have matches in the 3rd-4 th cousin range . I have DNA on Ancestry, FTDNA, My Heritage and Gedmatch.

The other thing is suggestions on how to track down living relatives in Germany. As I said, our last official contact was in the late 40's (my grandmother died and my grandfather did not keep in contact with them) She should have relatives from her brother George's family and Willy, who may be from her other bother Max. He came to the US and pretty much abandoned his family. There is another sibling Ann, and we know nothing more than her birth date. There are some Smailus people mentioned in the deportation and reparation documents who may be related. It is also possible there are still relatives in Lithuania. For my McRae line, I'm trying to find the family of my 2nd great grandmother, whose history is unknown. Her daughter, my greatgrandmother Mary , has two half siblings from a step-mother whose descendants can provide a comparison group to descendants from her father's siblings.

Mary's husband, was also a McRae but from a different branch. I need to how to deal with his side, working with Ydna from my father. Most McRae family lines delve off into fantasy @ 1800 as no one can agree on the identity of the next generation back. I have a lot of people who will matching up if we can get those next two generations straightened out.

I have a first cousin who has tested and 4 second cousins from this couple who I can approach to test. Would this help? I have documented 3rd cousins from both McRae families.

The other DNA project is trying to work with totally unknown DNA matches from the area of Germany (East Prussia, now Lithuania) where my grandmother's family came from. These are registering as 3c1r or 4c possible. I have my MTDNA from her. This is a total unknown situation, with no information past the names of her parents.

Any additional comments related to consultation #2:

If the above does not tie you up too much I have another question: I would like to know if the work I did for another family seems correct. (Casey-Gribble matches)I am attaching the DNA match sheet for an unknown father, who I believe was also the child of an unknown liaison between two families. His daughter's DNA matches quite nicely with both families, including an X match on the maternal side. Using the who was where when research, it points to two people who were between marriages at the time. The child Albert was either conceived before his mother married her second husband, or shortly after that marriage. By the time Albert appears in any record she has divorced, remarried, divorced again and then remarried her 1st husband, John Gribble, and Albert has his last name. 9They got divorced again, too) Albert might have a birth certificate somewhere, and he might be mentioned in some divorce filings, since he was a minor at the time of 2nd and 3rd , but that is the best documentation that may still exist. The first known document with his birth date is his WWII draft form so we can't even be sure how accurate it is.

Albert had no other known children, so there is no DNA to test. He lived down the road from my subject's mother, also passing who was where when test. The mother refused to the end of her life to tell her daughter who her biological father was.

While this may not pass the full test – and I do have lots of documentation to support all these connections – I think it is good enough to say it's pretty likely that Albert is the missing father. His daughter was born in 1933 so just about anyone who might know the truth is dead. The family asked about this more from curiosity than anything else. But these are some of my daughter's ancestors so I'd like to get it as right as I can.
